Naples, October 2.

THE Queen, who continues to advance happily in her Pregnancy, is advised to confine herself to her Apartments, till after her Lying-in. The King has appointed Don Francis de Sarno to be Professor of Physick in our University, in the Room of the late Dr. Joachim Porta. On the 27th past Sentence was passed on fifteen Criminals, who have been for some Time confined in the different Prisons of this City, three of whom were condemned to be hanged, and the other twelve to work in the King's Gallies, as Slaves, during Life.

Venice, Oct. 9. The Senate has appointed M. Francois Grimani to be Commander in Chief of the Republick's Troops in Dalmatia. The late Treaty between the Court of Vienna and the Duke of Modena, gives great Satisfaction to the Subjects of this Republick, who seem fully convinced of its being calculated entirely for the Preservation of the Peace and Tranquility of Italy.

Rome, Oct. 10. The 4th of this Month, being St. Francis's Day, whose Name the Emperor bears, Cardinal Alexander Albani, Minister from their Imperial Majesties, received the Compliments of the Members of the Sacred College, and of the principal Nobility, upon that Occasion, most of whom he afterwards entertained at Dinner in an elegant Manner. The Promotion of Cardinals, that has been so long expected, is again deferred till Christmas.

Turin, Oct. 12. Her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy is quite recovered from her Lying-in. Count Monasterole, his Sardinian Majesty's Ambassador at the Court of Naples, will soon return home, but it is not yet declared who is to succeed him.

Vienna, Oct. 13. Her Imperial Majesty has given the Regiment of Cuirassiers, commanded by the late Prince Lobkowitz, to the Hereditary Prince of Modena; and the Chief Command of the Troops in Hungary is conferred on Prince

Winceflas de Lichtenstein. The Sieur Ricci's Project for establishing a Manufacture of Thread and Cotton, having been examined by the Council of Commerce, and approved, Leave is given for his carrying the same into Execution. Count Seilern, Minister from Bohemia to the General Diet of the Empire, set out from hence a few Days ago for Ratisbon; and 'tis said, that Prince Esterhasi, heretofore their Imperial Majesties Ambassador Extraordinary to the King of the Two Sicilies, will set out shortly, with the same Character, to the Court of Lisbon, in order to execute a Commission of great Importance. Count Przychowsky, Coadjutor to the Archbishop of Prague, who arrived here last Week from Bohemia, is nominated to the Bishoprick of Konigsgratz, in the Room of the late Count Wratislaw. The Silver Mine lately discovered in the Mountain called Anna-Berg, in Stiria, is work'd with such Success, that we hope soon to reap very considerable Advantages from it.

Aix in Provence, Oct. 14. On the 2d Instant the Parliament of this City issued an Arret, renewing and confirming those of the 21st of May, and 7th and 27th of June last; which Arrets expressly forbid the Clergy from doing any Act or Thing that may tend to Schism, or to the introducing of arbitrary Professions of Faith; and enjoining them strictly to conform to the received Laws and Constitution of the Church, in administering the Sacrament to sick Persons.

Ratisbon, Oct. 15. Count Aubeterre, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of France to that of Vienna, arrived here the 13th in the Evening, and continued his Journey Yesterday to Vienna. Baron de Haren, late Minister from the Court of Sweden to the Diet for the Suffrages of the Dutchy of Pomerania, died here last Wednesday in the 60th Year of his Age.

Copenhagen, Oct. 16. A Resolution has been taken to erect an Equestrian Statue of the King in the Middle of the Square of Amelienbourg, and accordingly M. Saily, an eminent Sculptor,

is come hither from Paris to execute the same. An Ordonnance was published some Days past, forbidding absolutely the Games at Cards and Dice, and in general all that are called Games of Chance; and they will not be permitted at Court but on Drawing-Room-Days. This Ordonnance not only threatens with severe Penalties all who play at these Games, or who suffer them to be played in their Houses; but promises also to the Informers, even though they should have been of the Party at Play, half the Money which shall be seized on the Tables, and a fourth Part of the Fine which the Offenders are to pay.

Berlin, Oct. 16. His Majesty has declared his Resolution of making another Tour into Silesia, and has fixed the 20th of this Month for his Departure. The Bailly de Froulay, Ambassador from Malta, had on Wednesday last his Audience of Leave of the two Queens, as well as of the Princes and Princesses of the Royal Family; and the Day following set out on his Return to Paris, there to resume the Functions of his Embassy to the Court of France.

Dort, Oct. 17. Upon the Nomination that has been presented to the Princess Governante, her Royal Highness has made Choice of the following Persons to be Aldermen of this Town. Mess. Peter Ouderwater, John de Bech, Peter Mathew Beelaarts, Count Einminkhoven, of Granwyh and of Waarthugsen, and M. John Dierhens.

Paris, Oct. 19. We have received Advice, that M. de Franqueville, Counsellor of the Parliament of Normandy, and one of those who formed the greatest Opposition to the registering the King's Letters Patents, died on the 9th Instant at Rouen, having, on his Death-Bed, retracted all that he had said or wrote, during his whole Life, in Favour of the Jansenists.

Louvain, Oct. 18. The Deputies of the Town of Namur, who came here from Brussels, set out on Friday last with Baron d'Eynatten, our first Burgomaster, in order to go and examine the marking out of the new Road, which is to be made from hence to Namur. We hear that Baron Cronburg, one of the Deputies of the States of the Province of Flanders, will be nominated by her Imperial Majesty to the Bishoprick of Bruges, which has been vacant for some Time. The Preparations that were making, by Order of our Magistrates, for the Reception of Prince Charles of Lorraine, are ordered to be suspended for the present, his Serene Highness having put off his coming hither to view our new Canal to the End of next Month.
