Nurembourg, Oct. 14.

HE Prince Bishop of Augsbourg arrived here last Sunday about Four of the Clock in the Afternoon: He was saluted at his Entrance into this City by a Discharge of the Cannon upon our Ramparts, and was foon after complimented, upon his Arrival, by two Deputies from the Magistrates; and having spent the next Day in viewing every Thing remarkable in this City and its Neighbourhood, his Serene Highness set out on Tuesday Morning for Augsbourg.

Munich, Oct. 15. The Elector of Bavaria our Sovereign has already disposed of the Com-'mand of the two new Regiments of Foot lately formed by his Order, the one in Favour of Count Holstein, Stadtholder of the Upper Palâtinate, and the other in Favour of Major Ge-

netal Baron de Pechmann.

Vienna, Oct. 16. The Marshal Prince Lobkowitz, who died at Presburg on Tuesday last, after a short Illness of two or three Days, was interred this Day with great Military Pomp.

Copenhagen, Oct. 16. The Queen of Denmark and the young Prince are in a very promissing Way, her Majesty being as well as can be expected. Prince Ferdinand, the Queen's Brother, constantly attends his Danish Majesty in his Diversions. He has been entertained with a Sight of the Fleet and the Stores, which are kept here in exceeding good Order. The Horse Guards have already exercised in his Presence; and it is said the whole Garrison will shortly be drawn out for the same Purpose.

Leipsick, Oct. 17. Their Majesties, who with the Princes Xavier and Charles, spent great Part of their Time in this City during the Fair, are now at Hubertsbourg, where they intend staying till the Middle of next Month. The Directors of the Royal Manufactory at Meissen, have received Orders for preparing two magnificent Services of China, one for the Court of France,

and the other for that of Naples.

Franckfort, Oct. 19. On Wednesday last the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, who has been for these two Months past at Philiperuhe, in the Neighbourhood of Hanau, fet out from thence on his Return to Cassel; and the Elector of Mayence, who has been for some Time past taking the Diversion of Hunting at Steinheim, sets out from thence To-morrow for Aschaffenbourg, where he proposes to stay a Fortnight or three Weeks. We learn from Manheim, that the Elector Palatin has given Orders for the

sending to Neubourg all the curious Marble and other Pieces of Antiquity that have been preser-

ved in the Ducal Palace at Dusseldorp.

Brussels, Oct. 22. On Saturday last M. Neny, first Imperial Commissary to the Conferences for regulating the Barrier and Tariff, returned here from Vienna, having been absent about three Months. The States of Flanders have lately sent Deputies to this City, in order to sollicit, of this Government, some Recompence for the extraordinary Expences that Province it at in supporting the Banks and Sluices of the new Canal. The Count de Spada, having been named Colonel of a Regiment in the Service of the Duke of Modena, is set out from hence in order

to join the same.

Amsterdam, Oct. 24. 'The Directors of our East India Company have appointed M. Riemersdyk to be Counsellor Extraordinary to the Council of Batavia. They have also appointed the Captains Eyken, Klump and Wout, to the Command of their Ships the Bevalligheys, Kievitsbuvel and Oud-Carspel, the first for Bengal, and the other two for Ceylon. On Monday last the Triton Man of War, commanded by Captain Francois de Wys, sailed from hence for Lisbon; and the same Day the following Ships, bound for Batavia, put to Sea from the Texel, viz. The Buytenzorg, Ruytwell, Keukenhoff, Marienbosch, Luxembourg, Giessenbourg, Prince of Orange, and Princels of Orange, commanded by the Captains Swart, Taal, Bot, Corneille de Wys, Toornboom, Hoogland, Krugger, and Kramer.

Hague, Oct. 27. M. de Melto, who has been here for several Months past, has received Credential Letters from Lisbon, appointing him his most Faithful Majesty's Minister to the States General, in the Room of M. de Sylva, who is

gone to Naples. '

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Coronation, the Great Guns were fired in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a numerous Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant upon this Occasion. At Night there was a Play given by his Grace for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and a Ball at the Castle. And this Day, being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1641, his Grace the Lord Lieutemant proceeded in the usual State to Christ-Church, attended by the House of Peers, Judges, &c: and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, where an excellent Sermon was preached by the Bishop of Down and Connor upon that Occasion. The Sword of State was carried to and from the Church by the Lord Knapton. After his Grace's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phœnix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Vollies of Small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out at the Royal Square at the Barracks. And the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
