*Constantinople, October 1.*

**B**Y Letters from Bassora, arrived at Aleppo the 7th of September, we have Advice that the Dutch Factory are retired from thence to Bashire, but on what Account is not known; that Azad Khan has defeated Cherim Khan near Hamadan, and obliged him to retire to his Castle of Biri Calhafi, so that the Former has invested Hamadan with an Army of about 10,000 Men.

*Lisbon, Sept. 15.* On Tuesday last Don Louis-Antoine de Brito y Lemos, whom the King lately appointed Governor of Paraiiba in the Brazils, took the usual Oaths, from the Hands of his Majesty, to qualify himself for that important Post, and on the Friday following he sailed from hence, in order to take Possession of that Government. The same Day the Fleet, bound for Fernambuco, consisting of thirteen Merchantmen, sailed from hence under Convoy of a Man of War named the Nostra Signora de Nazareth, commanded by Captain Don Jean de Melo.

*Moscow, Oct. 6.* We are informed by an Express from Constantinople, that the Grand Signior continues in his Resolution of living in Friendship with the Christian Powers.

*Petersbourg, Oct. 8.* They are at Work with great Diligence, not only in repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of this City, and in making good the Damages done some Months ago by the Overflowings of the River Neva; but likewise in erecting some new Works, in order to prevent the like Accidents for the Future. By Letters from our Missionaries in the Governments of Casan and Orenbourg, we are informed, that they have baptized near 5000 Mahometan, and other Idolaters, whom they had converted to the Greek Religion, from the 1st of January to the 30th of June last. They write from Moscow, that M. Jeffremow, Atteman or Captain General of the Don Cossacks,

had solicited and obtained the Empress's Leave to resign that Employment on Account of his great Age; and that her Imperial Majesty, in Consideration of his faithful Services, had thereupon raised him to the Rank of Major General, and appointed his Son to succeed him in the Post of Atteman or Captain General of the Don Cossacks.

*Madrid, Oct. 9.* The Court has received Advice, that on the 26th of last Month, the St. Ignace de Loyola, entred the Bay of Cadiz from the South-Sea, having on Board, as well on the King's Account, as for that of the Merchants, 319157 Pieces of Eight, and 327138 Pistoles, besides a large Quantity of wrought Plate, and a very rich Cargo of Merchandize; and that, on the 27th past and 1st Instant, two Register Ships arrived, viz. the Notre Dame du Piliier, and the Notre Dame du Rosaire, one at the Port of St. Lucar, and the other at Cadiz, having on Board 124589 Pieces of Eight, besides wrought Plate, and very valuable Cargoes of Merchandize.

*Genoa, Oct. 12.* We are informed by the Master of a French Tartane, which came lately into this Port from the Coast of Barbary, that several Corsairs were arming, by Order of the Dey and Regency of Tunis, to cruize on the Ships of the Christian Powers.

*Parma, Oct. 15.* The Infant Duke our Sovereign having received Advice, that the Princess his Spouse set out on the 26th of last Month from Versailles, on her Return to this Country, is preparing to meet her on the Frontiers; for which Purpose his Serene Highness has already named the Nobility and Gentry of both Sexes, who are to attend him in this Journey.

*Turin, Oct. 17.* The Marquis d'Ormea, who is in Garrison with his Regiment in Alexandria, has had Orders from hence to receive and compliment her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Parma on her Entrance into his Sardinian Majesty's Dominions, and to attend her

her Royal Highness in her Passage through them. She is expected at Genoa the 19th, and will stay there only two or three Days. Last Sunday the Neapolitan Ambassador had his Audience of Leave, and the usual Present of his Sardinian Majesty's Picture. The Affairs of Corsica are in a more embroiled Situation than ever. The Malecontents begin to destroy each other; Gafforio, the Chief of the Rebels, having been assassinated by his own People. The Baron Blonay set out Yesterday on his Embassy to Madrid.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 19.* The King has raised M. de Thurah to the Rank of Major General; and M. de Kroge, Colonel of the Regiment of Wester-Lehn, is appointed Governor of the Fortress of Frederichstadt in Norway, in the Room of Lieutenant General Reichau, deceased. Baron Gyldencrone, Counsellor of Conferences, and Knight of the Order of Dannebrog, died here on Saturday last, in the 50th Year of his Age. Lieutenant Colonel Longueville, who was some Time since arrested here, on his Return from Morocco, is set at Liberty.

*Prague, Oct. 19.* Orders having been given, by her Imperial Majesty, for compleating the several Regiments quartered in the different Circles of this Kingdom, they have accordingly begun to raise Recruits for that Purpose.

*Vienna, Oct. 20.* This Court has entered into a Convention with that of Bavaria, with Relation to the Standard of the Money in their respective Dominions. The Viscount d'Aubeterre, Minister from France, arrived here the Night before last. On Monday last, being the Feast of St<sup>a</sup>. Theresa, whose Name the Empress bears, the same was celebrated at Schonbrun with the usual Solemnity. In the Morning their Imperial Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on that Occasion. At Noon their Imperial Majesties, the Archdukes and Archdutchesses, with the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine, and the Pope's Nuncio, assisted at High Mass, and Te Deum, in the Royal Chapel; after which they dined in Publick; and at Night they honoured a new Italian Opera with their Presence. Her Imperial Majesty hath at length nominated the Persons for the four Professorships of Law, the same Time since declared should be added to the University of this City, for the Support of whom she has settled an annual Income, viz. Dr. Rieger, to be Professor of Common Law. Dr. Tzon to be first, and M. Rettenhausen, to be second Professor of Civil Law; and an Italian, whose Name is not as yet publickly known, to be Professor of Canon Law. We are informed by our last Letters from Constantinople, that one of the Under-Dragomans of the Porte, had been lately strangled there, for having com-

municated the Contents of a Paper, delivered by a certain Foreign Envoy to the Grand Vizier, relating, as 'tis said, to the Affairs in the North, to the Minister of another Foreign Power.

*Cobourg, Oct. 20.* Yesterday Morning the Spouse of our Hereditary Prince was safely delivered of a Princess, which joyful News was immediately sent by Express to the Duke and Dutchess our Sovereigns at Rodah, who came here in the Afternoon to assist at the Baptism, which was performed last Night in the Chapel of the Court, and the young Princess named Caroline-Henriette-Amelie.

*Dresden, Oct. 21.* This Court has agreed to a Cartel, for the reciprocal Exchange of Deserters, with the Court of Brandebourg-Culmbach, the Contents whereof are ordered to be published at the Head of every Regiment of the Troops of this Electorate. On Monday last a Fire broke out at Oederan, a small Town near the Misnean Mountains, which burnt with such Violence, that upwards of sixty Houses were reduced to Ashes, and five or six Persons perished in the Flames.

*Brill, Oct. 30.* Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, having been pleased to recommend M. Arnould Gallas, to be first Burgomaster of this Town, in the Room of the late M. Molewater, he was accordingly appointed Yesterday, by our Regency, to fill up that important Post.

*Hague, Nov. 1.* Yesterday the States of Holland and Westfrizeland opened their Assembly, and to Day continued their Deliberations. This Morning an Advertisement was stuck up, in the usual publick Places, offering a Reward of One Hundred Ducatoons for discovering the Author or Authors of the Tumult that happened here on the 27th past at Night, when great Disorders were committed, and many of the Windows broke in several of our Streets.
