Moscow, October 19.

ER Imperial Majesty has ordered the Sum of 250,000 Rubles to be paid out of the Imperial Treasury for repairing the Roads from hence to Petersbourg, which will doubtless be of great Service to Commerce. The Prince of Holstein-Beck, heretofore Governor of Revel, is appointed to command the Body of Troops afsembled in the conquered Provinces; and he is to set out forthwith for Nerva, in order to take upon himself that Employment.

- Rome, Oct. 27. A few Days ago the Congregation de propaganda Fide received the agreeable News, that their Missionaries at Grand Cairo have obtained a very kind Letter from the Emperor of Ethiopia, in which he not only expresses his entire Disapprobation of the tyrannical Conduct of his Predecessors towards the Christians, but invites them to return into that Empire, and promises them his Protection, and the free Liberty of Preaching.

Bologna, Oct. 30. There has lately fallen such prodigeous Quantities of Rain in this Country, that most of the Rivers have overflowed their Banks, by which all Communication is for the present cut off with the Ferrarois.

Vienna, Oct. 30. On Sunday last their Imperial Majesties, accompanied by the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain, came here from Schonbrun, and assisted at the solemn Thanksgivings and Procession which are annually made for the happy Deliverance of this City from that dreadful Distemper the Plague in the Year 1679. Last Week her Imperial Majesty distributed the Prizes the bestows yearly for the Improvement of Arts and Sciences, when the best Prize was adjudged to the Sieur Christopher Unterberger, . Native of Fleims in Tyrol, for the best Piece of Painting; that for Sculpture was adjudged to Ignace Gundter, Native of Altmanstein in Bavaria; but Disputes arising about that of Architecture, which could not readily be determined, it was referved for the next Year.

Prague, Nov. 3. Last Week an Ordonnance was published here, by Order of the Empress Queen, forbidding, under severe Penalties, all unqualified Persons whatsoever, from hunting in any of the Parks, Woods or Forests in this Kingdom, without express Licence for that Putpole. We are preparing, in our Arlenal, a complete Sett of Arms for 9000 Militia, who are now raising in the different Provinces of Bohemia.

Breslau, Nov. 5. On Saturday last his Prussian Majesty set out from hence on his Return to Potzdam.

Berlin, Nov. 6. Yesterday Morning the King returned to this City from Silesia. His Majesty stopt in his Return at Great Glogau to review the Regiment of Foot of Du Moulin, when some Vacancies in that Regiment were filled up. The Professorship of Chymistry, vacant in the Royal College of Physicians, is conferred on the celebrated Dr. Brander. Last Week the Frost set in very severe in this Country; and as we have fince had much Snow, there has been great Diversion's upon it amongst the Nobility and Gentry in Sledges.

Leipsick, Nov. 7. We hear from Zerbst, that great Prepreations are making at that Court Q/ for the Reception of the future Spouse of Prince Frederick-Augustus, who is expected there from

Cassel on the 14th or 15th Instant.

Hague, Nov. 15. On Saturday last, being his Britannick Majesty's Birth-day, Colonel Yorke gave a grand Entertainment, on that Occasion, to a great Number of the Nobility and Gentry of both Sexes; and afterwards a Ball, which was opened by his Grace the Duke of Richmond, and the French Ambassador's Lady. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante has lately made a very numerous Promotion of military Officers, several of whom have already taken the usual Oaths before the Council of State, to qualify themselves for their different Employments. Count Henry de Nassau is fafely returned here from England with the Countess his Spouse. By Letters received last Post from Germany we have Advice, that Prince Charles Augustus de Nassau-Weilbourg, General of Horse in the Service of their Imperial Majesties, died on the 9th Instant, at Weilbourg, in the 69th Year of his Age,

Paris, Nov. 17. His most Christian Majesty has, by his Letters Patent of the 11th Instant, established a Court of Justice, by the Name of the Royal Chamber, for the taking Cognizance of, and determining all Civil and Criminal Affairs, as well as those of the Police. Chamber, which met on Tuesday last for the first Time at the Louvre, in the Presence of the Sieur Lamoignan, Chanceltor of France, and registered the above Letters Patent, has great & Power, being to do all the Buffness of the late Parliament, for which Purpose the Clerks as commanded, on Pain of Death, to deliver up all Papers belonging to the Parliament, which Gener
