*Genoa, Nov. 19.* The Murder of M. Gafforio, by his Brother, seems to have entail'd greater Embroils amongst the Malecontents than was at first foreseen. The Republick refusing to give him Refuge in Calvi, upon his being sent out of that Town he has immediately seized, and conducted to Prison, whither M. Matra went with a Priest; and after allowing him only Time to confess, immediately put him to Death. An Estafette is arrived from St. Remo to the Government, with Notice, that a Body of near 500 Men are in Arms, with a Design to revenge themselves on the Inhabitants of La Colle, for withdrawing themselves from their Community, which occasioned the late Rebellion at St. Remo, and the Loss of the Privileges and Immunities hitherto enjoyed by the St. Remasios.

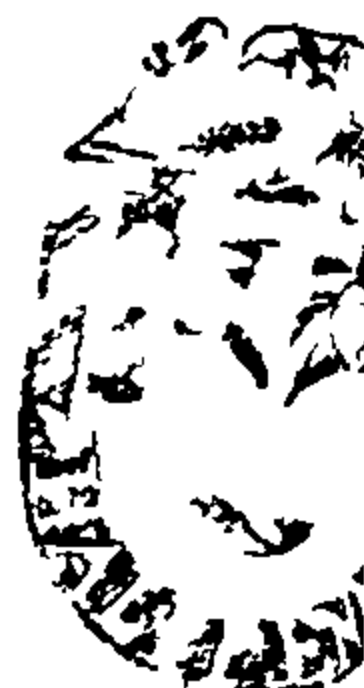
*Madrid, Nov. 19.* Their Catholick Majesties intend to return hither To-morrow Evening from the Escorial, where they have resided above a Month. The Beginning of last Week died, after a long Illness, the Marquis de Villa Franca, Grand Master of the King's Household: He is succeeded in Title and Estate by his eldest Son the Duke of Fernandina. His Majesty has been pleased to confer the Employment of Grand Master of his Household, on the Duke of Huefear, Captain of the Spanish Company of Life Guards; as also to give that Company of Guards to the Duke of Bannos, Commander of the Royal Regiment of Carbineers; and to appoint the Marquis of Coria, Son to the Duke of Huefear, to succeed the Duke of Bannos in the Command of the Royal Carbineers. The Marquis de St. Marsan, who has resided at this Court for three Years, in Quality of Ambassador from the King of Sardinia, will set out in a few Days on his Return to Turin, his Successor being already arrived.

*Turin, Nov. 21.* General Baratieri, who commanded the Spanish Artillery during the late War, is come hither from the Infant Duke, to thank his Sardinian Majesty for the Attentions that were shewn to the Infanta Dutchess in her Passage through his Sardinian Majesty's Dominions.

*Vienna, Nov. 21.* Orders are sent to the Officers appointed to regulate the new Establishment of the Militia in the Hereditary Countries, not to enroll any who are not five Feet three Inches high. The States of Lower Austria continue their Deliberations on the Demands made by her Imperial Majesty for the Year ensuing, with such Unanimity, that there is no Doubt of their being complied with. The Chamber of Finances have contracted for between 14 and 15000 Horses to remount the Imperial Cavalry, which are to be delivered before the Month of May next.

*Versailles, Nov. 29.* On Monday last the King arrived here with the Royal Family. Madame Victoire is quite recovered of her late Indisposition,

disposition, and appears again in publick. His Majesty has appointed the Marquis de Stainville to replace the Duke de Nivernois as Ambassador at Rome.

*Paris, Nov. 30.* We hear the Members of the Chatelet have, after great Debates, come to a Resolution to register the King's Letters Patents for establishing the Royal Chamber.

*Hague, Dec. 4.* M. Steyn is appointed Keeper of the Seals, and Master of the Registers of the Fiefs of the Provinces of Holland and Westfrisland, in the Room of the late Baron Vander Duyl; and he has taken the usual Oaths, before the Assembly of their High Mightinesses, to qualify himself for those important Posts. The States General have issued an Ordonnance, dated the 28th of last Month, forbidding, under severe Penalties, the melting down or exporting any of the Silver Coin of these Provinces.

And whereas Richard Paice and John Cutler have been, since, committed to Prison in the Borough of Reading aforesaid, on a violent Suspicion of burning and destroying the said Pot-Ash House; soon after which Commitment the following anonymous Letter, written in the same Hand Writing as the former Letter, was left at the House of Mr. Harry Austin Deane, Attorney at Law, and one of the Justices of the Peace for the said Borough, viz.

To Mr. Deane, and Plomer, and Davenport.  
Damn you all if you dont directly Let Pais go

and Cutler you shall all be burn't or murderd every thing as belongs to all three of you.

In order to bring to Justice the Offender or Offenders concerned in writing or sending the said Letters, or in setting the said Pot-Ash House on Fire, as aforesaid; of any one will discover the Person or Persons, who wrote, or sent, or left the said Letters, or either of them, or who set the said Pot-Ash House on Fire, as aforesaid, so as he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof, the said Mr. Deane doth hereby promise to pay to any Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery or Discoveries (except the Person who actually set the said Pot-Ash House on Fire) the Reward of Twenty Pounds upon such Conviction.
