*Constantinople, November 6.*

**S**EVERAL Ambassadors and Ministers of Christian Powers having complained to the Porte, that the Regency of Algiers have of late paid very little Regard to their Treaties: The Grand Seignor, after considering the said Complaints, has declared to the said Ambassadors and Ministers, that for the future he will give no Manner of Protection to the said Regency, in case they do not punctually fulfil their Engagements with the Christian Powers, and severely punish all the Officers of their Cruizers who shall not strictly conform to their Instructions; and his Sublime Highness has ordered this Declaration to be dispatched immediately to the Regency of Algiers.

*Moscow, Nov. 26.* The Empress has been a little indisposed for some Days past with a Cold, but we hope it will be attended with no bad Consequences. They have considerably augmented the Number of Workmen employed in rebuilding that Part of the Palace which was lately burnt down; and as they are ordered to work both Day and Night, 'tis imagined it will be ready for the Reception of her Imperial Majesty in about a Fortnight; in the mean while she proposes taking a Tour, if her Health will permit, to the Monastery of Troitzka, in which she will be accompanied by the Great Duke and Great Dutchess. On Thursday last Count Betsutcheff gave an elegant Entertainment to Count Esterhasi, the new Ambassador from Vienna, to which several of the Nobility and General Officers were invited. The Weather proves milder in these Parts than ever was known at this Time of the Year, we having not as yet had the least Appearance of Frost or Snow.

*Rome, Dec. 10.* The Pope has appointed M. Finochietti, heretofore Governor of Civita Vecchia, to be Governor of the Province of Frosinone; M. Maffaei to be Governor of Viterbo; M. Bolognini to be Governor of Ancona; and M. Vinci to be Governor of Spoleto. The Post of Inquisitor of Malta is given to M. Salvati, in the Room of M. Passonie, who is ap-

pointed Vice-Legate of Avignon. A few Days ago Cardinal Monti was seized with an Apoplectick Fit, and as he is far advanced in Years, 'tis fear'd the next Fit may go hard with him. The King of the Two Sicilies has already laid before the Pope the Names of three of his Subjects, out of whom one is to be named to fill up the Archbishoprick of Palermo. We have received Advice from Nettuno, that an armed Vessel, which sailed lately from the Port of Anzio, has attacked and taken, after a smart Engagement, one of the Barbary Corsairs.

*Leghorne, Dec. 10.* The Navigation of this Port was greatly interrupted all last Month by tempestuous Weather, but the Sea being now calm, Navigation and Commerce go on again as before. We are inform'd by our last Advices from Corsica, that the Malecontents continue to act against each other with great Fury; and that the Divisions and Factions run so high amongst them at present, that neither of them will hearken to any Proposals of Accommodation.

*Petersbourg, Dec. 10.* According to the last Advices we received from Moscow, her Imperial Majesty will not return to this City till the Month of May next.

*Copenhagen, Dec. 15.* M. Coyemans, the Dutch Resident, having been appointed Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to this Court, he had Yesterday his first Audience of the King in that Quality. The two Ships belonging to our Asiatick Company, bound for China, are ready to put to Sea with the first fair Wind. A few Days ago M. Laub, the King's first Physician, died here suddenly, but 'tis not as yet known who is to succeed him.

*Prague, Dec. 18.* Last Week a severe Frost set in here, by which the Waters of the Moldau are already frozen so thick as to bear all Sorts of Carriages; and for two or three Days past there has fallen such vast Quantities of Snow, that all the Roads are become almost impassable, which makes the Arrival of Couriers, and even of the common Posts, at present very uncertain. They continue to raise Recruits for com-

pleating all the Regiments quartered in this Kingdom.

*Frankfort, Dec. 24.* Recruiting goes on with great Success in this City and its Neighbourhood, for the Imperial Troops, several considerable Bodies of whom have lately marched from hence. They write from Manheim, that Count Leerodt, Grand Marshal of the Court to the Elector Palatin, died on the 19th Instant, after a short Illness.

*Brussels, Dec. 26.* We hear the 9th of next Month is appointed for renewing the Conference, in order to proceed on the Business for regulating the new Barrier and Tariff.

*Hague, Jan. 1.* This Day her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and the young Prince Stadtholder, received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and the principal Members of the Regency, on the New Year. They write from Utrecht, that the Waters of the River Lecq have fallen considerably, so that all their Fears, for the Safety of their Dykes, are now intirely dissipated.
