Genoa, January 30.

THE Marquis de Grimaldi, the Republick's Commissary General in Corsica, has inform'd the Government, that the Malecontents in that Island obstinately persist in their Resolution of harkening to no Terms of Accommodation whatsoever, till the Murderers of their late Chief Gafforio are delivered into their Hands: These they alledge have taken Shelter at Calvi, and in some other Places of the Dominions of the Republick.

Stockholm, Feb. 1. The Season is very severe in this Country: So much Frost and Snow have not been known for some Years. 'Tis thought that this Severity of the Weather has brought on a Kind of Spotted Fever, which now rages in one of the Quarters of this City, and has carried off seven or eight Persons in a House. On Saturday last died the Senator Count Possie; and we hear that Baron Sparre, General of Foot, and Knight of the Order of the Seraphins, and of that of the North Star, died a few Days ago at his Seat at Giöckholm, in the Province of Nerricie.

Madrid, Feb. 4. The Operas, as well as the other Diversions of the Carnival, have been interrupted by the Queen's having been indisposed for this Week past with a violent Cold; but her Majesty is To-day much better. From Barcelona we have Advice, that the French are equipping at Toulon ten Men of War and three Bomb-ketches, in order to revenge themselves upon the Algerines for their late Behaviour to the French Flag. The last Letters from Malaga mention a most violent Storm, which it was feared had done great Damage upon that Coast. Four Ships, which lay in the Road Wind-bound, were driven from their Anchors and stranded within a Mile of the Town, but by timely Assistance all their Crews were saved. The Wind continued blowing very hard when the Letters came away.

Vienna, Feb. 9. 'Tis reported that a Camp of 35 or 40000 Men will be formed in Bohemia in the Spring, and that they are shortly to begin furnishing the necessary Magazines for that Purpose. Field Marshal Count Schulenburg, who lay at the Point of Death, is now somewhat better. The Hereditary Prince of Modena returned here on Saturday last from Dresden.

Berlin, Feb. 12. The Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle is broke out again in the Old Marck, and all the necessary Precautions are taking to prevent its spreading itself into any of the neighbouring Provinces.

Manheim, Feb. 13. For several Days together a Report prevailed here, and in all the Towns round about, that an Epidemical Distemper was broke out in the Circle of Leutmeritz in Bohemia, which 'twas said carried off great Numbers of People; but we are inform'd,

by good Authority, that there was not the least Foundation for any such Report.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament of the 26th Year of his present Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, that a French Brigantine called the Brave Marlborough, of Le Flotte, Peter Hoin, Master, Burthen about Seventy Tons, Laden with Wine, Brandy, Vinegar, and other Liquors, for Dunkirk, was drove, by Strefs of Weather, to the Isle of Portland, where being embayed, the Weather stormy and foggy, the Sea running very high, and the Ship very leaky, they anchored; but driving near the Shore, the Master and Crew took to their Boat, and left her to her Anchor, and were all drowned in getting ashore except one Man, named Isaac Bruffoe: That the said Vessel was afterwards boarded by some Men sent to her by the Collector of Lyme Regis, and finding no Person on board, and the Vessel in great Danger, they carried her into Lyme Cobb, where she now lies securely moored.

Swaffham, 19 Feb. 1754.

Whereas on Friday the 1st of this Instant February, about One o'Clock in the Morning, a Fire broke out at Swaffham in the County of Norfolk, at an Oatmeal Office, the Property of Edward Harvey, of Watton in the said County, Gent. and consumed the same, and a Stable thereto adjoining: And whereas on Monday the 18th of this Instant February, a Barn standing in the same Yard where the said Oatmeal Office stood, the Property of the said Edward Harvey, was, about Eight o'Clock in the Evening of the said 18th of February, feloniously, wilfully, and maliciously set on Fire and consumed, by some Person or Persons unknown; Therefore as an Encouragement to bring to Justice, and discover the Offender or Offenders concerned in the said Felony, so as he, she, or they, may be convicted thereof, the said Edward Harvey doth hereby offer a Reward of Twenty Pounds, to be paid on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And as a further Reward for bringing to Justice such Offender or Offenders, the Minister, Churchwardens, Overseers, and other the Inhabitants of Swaffham aforesaid, do hereby offer and promise to pay the further Sum of Thirty Pounds, on the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders as aforesaid, to the Party or Parties making such Discovery for bringing such Offender or Offenders to Justice.
