*Malaga, February 13.*

**W**E have had such violent Tempests for this Fortnight past, that several Vessels, belonging to different Nations, have been drove on Shore, and others cast away upon this Coast. Some Ships that were in our Road, have been forced from their Anchors, and drove out to Sea; and, by the Number of dead Bodies, and other Things since come on Shore, there is great Reason to believe they are lost.

*Brussels, March 10.* The Corps of the late Duke of Arenberg was carried from hence last Tuesday Night for Enghein, in order to be interred in the Church of the Capuchins in that Town, with all the Pomp and Ceremonies due to his Rank. General Count Chanclos commands, for the present, the Imperial Troops in this Country in his Room. We are informed by private Letters from Madrid, that a Fire broke out on the 16th of last Month in the Palace of St. Ildephonso, the usual Residence of the Queen Dowager of Spain, by which Accident one entire Wing of that magnificent Palace was destroyed.

*Versailles, March 11.* On Tuesday last the King performed the Ceremony of investing the Duke of Burgundy with the Order of the Golden Fleece, in the Name of his Catholick Majesty. The Duke de Châtillon is appointed Lieutenant General of Upper and Lower Bretagne, in the Room of the late Duke his Father; and the Chevalier de Dreux, Marshal of the Camps and Armies of this Kingdom, is appointed Grand Master of the Ceremonies, in the Room of the late Marquess de Breze.

*Hague, March 14.* The Deputies of our East India Company, and Mr. Harinxma, who commanded the Fleet that returned last Year from thence, have been lately introduced to the Assembly of the States General, and have laid before them the present State of the Company's Affairs at Batavia, and other Dutch Settlements in the Indies. Yesterday was observed as a general Fast throughout these Provinces, when the Collection made for the Poor in the Reformed Churches of this Place only, amounted to 3223 Florins.

*St. James's, March 23.*

His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, having, this Day, resigned, into the King's Hands, the Seals of the Office of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness to succeed his Grace, as Secretary of State for the Northern Department, and to appoint the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Robinson, Knight of the Bath, to succeed the Earl of Holderness, as Secretary of State for the Southern Department.
