Westminster, April 6.

**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

*An Act for granting to his Majesty a certain Sum of Money therein mentioned, out of the Sinking Fund, and applying certain Surplus Monies remaining in the Exchequer, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Four, and for the further Disposition of the said Sinking Fund, by paying thereout the Remainder of the Sum advanced on the Credit of the Duty on Sweets, and the Interest thereof, and for carrying the said Duty to the said Fund, and for the further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.*

*An Act to continue the Duties for Encouragement of the Coinage of Money, and for removing Doubts concerning the Continuance of the Duty of Twenty Shillings for every Ton of Brandy-wines and Strong Waters imported.*

*An Act to continue several Laws for prohibiting the Importation of Books reprinted Abroad, and first composed or written and printed in Great Britain; for the free Importation of Cochineal and Indico; and relating to Rice, Frauds in the Customs, the clandestine Running of Goods, and to Copper Ore; and for the better Encouragement of the making of Sail Cloth in Great Britain; and to authorize the Payment of the Bounty to Alexander Brown, and others, upon a Ship fitted out for the Whale Fishery, and lost in the Greenland Seas; and for the more effectual Payment of the Bounties upon British made Sail Cloth to Robert Donald, and others.*

*An Act to explain and amend an Act, made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, entitled, An Act for the*

*more effectual punishing wicked and evil disposed Persons going armed and disguised, and doing Injuries and Violences to the Persons and Properties of his Majesty's Subjects, and for the speedy bringing the Offenders to Justice.*

*An Act to continue several Laws relating to the Distemper now raging among the Horned Cattle in this Kingdom.*

*An Act for the more easy and effectual proceeding upon Distresses to be made by Warrants of Justices of the Peace.*

*An Act for making perpetual several Laws for Punishment of Persons destroying Turnpikes, Locks, or other Works erected by Authority of Parliament; and that all Acts, made for erecting Courts of Conscience, shall be deemed publick Acts; and to empower a certain Number of the Trustees of the British Museum to do certain Acts; and for confirming the Table of Fees to be taken by the Clerks to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex; and for giving farther Time for the Payment of Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures or Contracts of Clerks and Apprentices, and for filing Affidavits of the Execution of Contracts of Clerks to Attorneys and Solicitors; and for preventing Persons Driving certain Carriages from Riding upon such Carriages.*

*An Act for Re-vesting in the Crown the Power of appointing the Marshal of the Marshalsea of the Court of King's Bench, and for the better Regulation of that Office, and of the inferior Offices thereto belonging, and for Rebuilding the King's Bench Prison.*

*An Act to indemnify Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Promotions within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.*

*An Act for discharging the Corporation of the Governour, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of the Company of Conservators of the Great Level of the Fens, commonly called Bedford Level, from a Debt due to the Duke of Bedford and Earl of Lincoln, and for enabling the Proprietors of Lands in the North Level, Part of the said Great Level, to raise Money to discharge the Proportion of the said North Level, in the Debts of the said Corporation; and for ascertaining and appropriating*

ating the *Ta e* to be laid on the said North Level, and for the more effectually draining and preserving the said North Level, and divers Lands adjoining thereto in the Manor of Crowland.

An Act for improving and preserving the Navigation from Salter's Load Sluice, in the County of Norfolk, to Standground Sluice, in the County of Huntingdon, and from Floods Ferry, in the Isle of Ely, in the County of Cambridge, to Ramsey High Load, in the said County of Huntingdon; and also the Navigation from Old Bedford Sluice, in the said County of Norfolk, to the River Nene, in the Parish of Ramsey, in the said County of Huntingdon.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor in the Parish of Saint Nicholas, Deptford, in the County of Kent, and in the Parish of Saint Paul, Deptford, in the Counties of Kent and Surry, and for repairing the Highways, and paving and cleansing the Streets, in the said Parishes.

An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Scots Pint of Ale and Beer brewed for Sale, vended, or sold, within the Town and Barony of Alloa, in the County of Clackmannan; and also a Duty of Anchorage for Ships and Vessels anchoring in the Harbour of the said Town, for repairing the Pier of the said Harbour.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act, made in the Eighth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from the Town of Rochdale, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, leading over a certain craggy Mountain called Blackstone Edge, in the same County, and from thence to the Towns of Hallifax and Ealand, in the County of York.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the Borough of Stratford upon Avon, in the County of Warwick, through Alcester, in the said County, and Feckingham, to a Place called Bradley Brook, in the County of Worcester, and from Alcester through Great Coughton and Crabbs Cross, in the said County of Warwick, and through Hewell Lane and Burcott, to the Cross of Hands on a Common called the Leekhay, and out of Hewell Lane, through Church Lane, and Tutnell, to Bromsgrove, in the said County of Worcester.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the North End of Bridgesford Lane, in the County of Nottingham, to and through several Towns and Places in the Counties of Nottingham, Leicester, Rutland, and through Rockingham, to the Bowling Green at Kettering, in the County of Northampton.

An Act for opening, making, widening, and keeping in Repair, a Road from Ratcliff Highway through Cannon Street, in the County of Middlesex, into the Road leading into the County of Essex, and also from the West End of Brook Street into Cable Street, and from Upper Shadwell

Street into the Back-Lane, in the said County of Middlesex.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Leicester to Narborough, and from Leicester to Coventry, and from thence through Kenilworth to Warwick, and from thence to Halford Bridge, and from Warwick to Stratford upon Avon, and from Coventry to Martyn's Gutter, leading towards Stoneleigh Town, and for supplying an Omission in an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, for repairing the Road from Leicester to Ashby de la Zouch, in the County of Leicester.

An Act for amending and widening several Roads leading from the Borough of Truro, in the County of Cornwall.

And to Twenty-three Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

Nothing could have given me greater Satisfaction, at this Time, than the Unanimity, and Dispatch, with which you have gone through the Business of this Session. Though no particular Point of extraordinary Moment hath offered itself to your Consideration, yet you have shewn the most attentive Regard to every Branch of the Publick Service. As to Foreign Affairs, I shall say nothing at present, except, That it is my fixed Resolution to do every Thing, in my Power, to maintain the general Tranquility, and to adhere to such Measures, for that Purpose, as I have hitherto pursued, in Conjunction with the Powers in Alliance with me.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I return you my hearty Thanks for the Supplies, which you have so chearfully granted; and which are the more acceptable to me; as they have brought no new Burthen upon my good Subjects.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

The Time draws near, when the present Parliament must determine by Law; and it is my Intention, very speedily, to call a new one. But it would be unjust to This, not to give It a Publick Testimony of my Approbation. The many eminent Proofs, which you have given, of your Duty and Affection to my Person and Government; of your Zeal for this excellent Constitution; and for the Security of the present Establishment; can never be forgotten by me. By your vigorous Assistance, under the Protection of the Divine Providence, I was enabled to put an End to an expensive though necessary War, by an honourable Peace, which

you have greatly contributed to preserve, by readily and uniformly supporting my Measures. You have gone farther; and, whilst the Difficulties arising from the War were scarce over, seized the first Opportunity, to perfect one of the greatest Works of Peace, by concurring in the most proper Means for a gradual Decrease of the National Debt; and, at the same Time, raising the Publick Credit. You have also, by several new Laws, laid a Foundation, to strengthen and advance the Trade and Commerce of my Kingdoms. Such a Series of wise and steady Conduct cannot fail to recommend you to the Good-Will and Esteem of your Fellow Subjects, as well as mine. For my own Part, I securely rely upon the Loyalty, and good Affections, of my People, and have no other Aim, but their lasting Happiness.

*Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said,*

G O D Save the K I N G.

*Lisbon, Feb. 23.* The Fleet bound for Goa, on board of which was near 4000 Troops, sailed from hence a few Days ago. The Affair of settling the Boundaries between the Spaniards and Portuguese in the Brasils, continues to meet with great Difficulties, the Inhabitants of Pa-

raguay, a Province in the Possession of the Fathers of the Society of Jesus, having not only obliged the Commissaries appointed by the two Crowns to make the proper Divisions according to the late Treaty, to retire from thence, but have likewise promised those Fathers to defend that Country against such Division; alledging, that their Province is not comprehended in that Treaty.

*Naples, March 9.* Count Caraffa, Colonel of the Regiment of Macedonia, has obtained the King's Leave to augment the said Regiment with one Battalion, and they are now raising Recruits for that Purpose. A Treaty of Commerce is said to be on the Carpet between this Court and that of Great Britain. They have actually begun to fill the Arsenals and Magazines of this Kingdom. On Saturday last four armed Chebecks sailed from this Port, in order to cruise on the Corsairs of Barbary, who are continually interrupting our Commerce. 'Tis said his most Christian Majesty has, at the Intercession of the Pope, accepted the Mediation of the Disputes that have lately arisen between this Court and the Great Master of Malta.

*Rome, March 12.* The Government having purchased an English Frigate for 18,000 Scudis in the Port of Leghorn, she is now equipping at Cevitta Vecchia, in order to cruise on the Barbary Pyrates, who are extremely troublesome to the Navigation of this State. A Resolution is also taken at Court, for raising a Battallion of Marines, who are to serve on Board the Pope's Gallies, and other armed Vessels, against those Pyrates.

*Genoa, March 12.* The Great and Little Council have been for some Days past deliberating on the Affairs of Corsica, which continue to give great Uneasiness. General Count Pallavicini, heretofore Governor of Milan, who has been detained here for some Months by Illness, is now much better, and proposes setting out in a short Time for Vienna, where he will be invested with the Ensigns of the Order of the Golden Fleece. We are informed by the Master of a Ship that arrived here a few Days ago from Barcelona, that all the Officers of the Troops in Catalonia, who had obtained Leave to be absent for six Months, are ordered to return to their respective Regiments forthwith. We are likewise informed, that the Men of War that have been lately built at Carthagena, and some others in that Port, are equipping with all Speed. Part of this Armament is intended to reinforce the Spanish Garde Coasts in America, in order to prevent clandestine Commerce, and the rest are to cruise in the Mediterranean, to protect the Ships of the Christian Powers from the Insults of the Corsairs of Barbary.

*Stockholm,*

*Stockholm, March 15.* The King has raised M. Carlberg, Knight of the Order of the Sword, and Chief Engineer, to the Rank of Major-General; and Baron Bildstein is appointed Captain of a Company in the Regiment of Foot of Pöse. His Majesty is perfectly recovered of his late Indisposition, and has since given Audience to Baron Lieven, who arrived here a few Days ago from Landskron, in order to make a Report of the State and Condition in which he found the Fortifications and Magazines of that Place. We hear that some able Engineers will shortly be sent to Finland, in order to draw a new Plan of that Province for the Use of our Commissaries who are appointed to settle the Limits of that Country with those of Russia. We have an Account, by our last Letters from Carlscron, of the Death of Admiral Gerdtén; The King, in order to encourage the manufacturing of Silk, and Stuffs mixed with Silk, in Sweden, has caused an Ordonnance to be published, forbidding the Importation and Selling of all Kinds of Silk Goods manufactured in the East-Indies, till the 1st of January 1755. Orders are sent to Carlscron, to fit out several Men of War and Frigats, in order to cruize in the Baltick, as soon as that Sea is clear of Ice. The Intention of this is only to exercise the Seamen, in the same Manner as was done last Year. They write from Abo in Finland, that a Fire broke out there the Beginning of last Month, which burnt with great Violence, but by the great Care of the Governor it was extinguished in much less Time than was expected; and only five or six Houses were by this Accident reduced to Ashes.

*Vienna, March 16.* They continue to say, that several Camps will be formed next Summer in the Hereditary Countries, and that some of them will be honoured with the Presence of their Imperial Majesties. The Empress Queen has given the Regiment of Foot commanded by the late Count Schulenburg, to Prince Arenberg, Son to the Duke of that Name. on Monday last died here, in the 76th Year of his Age, Count Hartig, actual Privy Counsellor to their Imperial Majesties, and Vice President of the Aulick Council of the Empire. We are informed by Letters received last Post from Hungary, that Count Styrum, General of Horse, and Commandant of Offen, died the 4th of this Month, in that Fortrefs, of an Apoplectick Fit. Baron Pretlack, heretofore Ambassador from this Court to that of Russia, is at length arrived here from Moscow, having been obliged to stop by the Way on Account of his ill State of Health. He is at present confined to his Apartment; but as he is something better than he was at his Arrival, 'tis thought he will, in a few Days, be able to wait on their Imperial Majesties.

*Berlin, March 19.* The King has appointed M. Lange to be Counsellor of War and Domains for the Department of Pomerania, vacant by the Death of M. Tetzlaffs. His Majesty has given his Consent to the raising a certain Sum of Money, by Way of Lottery, for finishing the Church that is building here by the Roman Catholics. The Prince of Brunswick Bevern, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot in the Service of the United Provinces, arrived here last Saturday Night from Stettin, and this Morning he waited on the King at Potzdam. We have received Advice, that the famous Banker Michael Hyffing, who was secured here some Time ago, at the Request of the Court of Sweden, and conducted from hence to Stralsund, where he was ordered to be confined till the Season permitted his being conveyed to Stockholm, had found Means to make his Escape a second Time, and has not been heard of since.

*Amsterdam, March 28.* The Directors of our East India Company have given Notice, that they intend to pay, on the 13th of May next, a Dividend of 20 per Cent. to such Persons as are interested in that Company. The Number of Ships the Dutch propose to send this Year to Greenland, on the Whale Fishery, amount to 132. Last Saturday died here, in the Sixty-first Year of his Age, M. Wettstein, Professor of Philosophy: He was Member of the Royal Society in London, and of the Royal Academy of Sciences at Berlin.

*Hague, March 28.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are to assemble on Wednesday the 3d of April next, for which Purpose they have already dispatched the proper Summonses. M. van der Straaten is appointed Counsellor and Inspector of the Accompts of the Domains of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

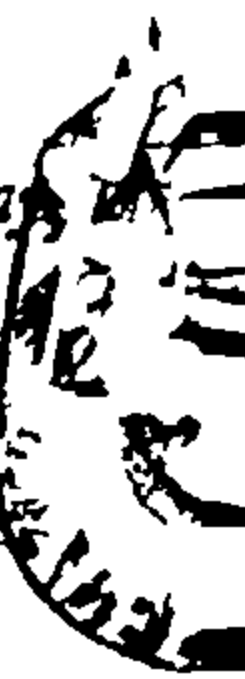
