And we being defirous and refolved, as foon as may be, to meet our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all our loving Subjects our Royal Will and Pleafure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, That, with the Advice of our Privy Council, we have this Day given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain, to iffue out Writs in due Form, for calling a new Parliament; which Writs are to bear Teste on Tuesday the Ninth Day of this Instant April, and to be returnable on Friday the Thirty-first Day of May next. Given at our Court at St. James's the Eighth Day of April, 1754, in the Twenty-feventh Year of our Reign. GOD fave the KING.

the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and fummoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to fit in the House of Peers in the faid Parliament; we do, by the Advice of our Privy-Council, issue forth this our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Twenty first Day of May next enfuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to fit and vote in the Houfe of Peers in the faid enfuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then prefent, and of the Proxies of fuch as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers) and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the principal Clerks of the Seffion, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after fuch Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers fo elected, and fign and attest the same, in the Presence of the faid Peers the Electors, and return fuch Certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we do, by this our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the faid City, to take especial Care to preferve the Peace thereof during the Time of the faid Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Diforders, and Violence whatfoever. And we firicitly charge and command, That this our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers, to proceed to fuch Election. The Syndick Klen feger, who happily adjusted the Differences beg tween the Regency of this City and the Court of Spain, by which our Trade was opened again with that Kingdom, and who went af. terwards from Madrid to execute a private Commission at the Court of Versailles, returned here Yesterday. Utrecht, April 2. The Burgomasters and Council of this City have, by an Ordonnand iffued for that Purpose, strictly forbid all the Ind habitants, within their Jurisdiction, from setting up any Kind of Lottery what foever, or from being concerned in any Foreign Lotteries, except those of the Generality, under severe Pains and Penalties. Hague, April 3. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland are to open their Assembly Tomorrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived; and the Deputies of the feveral Colleges of the Admiralty, who have been here for fome Time, will continue to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department till the End of this Week. We hear from Moravia, that Count Hohenembs is fo ill at his Seat in that Province, that his Phylicians have very little Hopes of his Recovery. Her Imperial Majesty has difposed of the Gavernment of the Fortress of Offen, vacant by the Death of Count Styrum, in Favour of General Count Nadasty. We are informed by our last Letters from Constantinople, that the Contagious Diftemper, which had ceased for some Time in that Capital, is broke out again ; whereupon Orders were immediately dispatched to Hungary, Transylvania, and the other hereditary Countries bordering upon Turkey, to take all necessary Precautions for cutting off all Communication with that Country, in order to prevent that fatal Diftemper's being brought into any Part of her Imperial Majesty's Dominions.
