*Moscow, March 14.*

**T**HE Report of the Great Princess being with Child, is in a Manner confirmed, and it is expected the same will shortly be declared at Court; but this will not hinder her Imperial Majesty's Return to Petersbourg in the Month of May next; for which Place the Regiments of Jaroßaskoi, and Nawaginskoi, will receive Orders to march forthwith; and the Regiment of Schetiwanßkoi, and that of Naschebourßkoi, are ordered to replace them in this Garrison.

*Constantinople, March 16.* In the Night between the 10th and 11th Instant, there was a very great Fire in the Armenian Quarter, which burnt from Twelve at Night to Six in the Morning: The Number of Houses consumed are not yet certain, but very considerable. The Grand Signor and Vizir attended at it with great Affiduity.

*Rome, March 23.* On Tuesday the Pope, assisted by the Cardinals Guadagni and Borghese, performed the Ceremony, in the Chapel of the Quirinal, of consecrating Cardinal Malvezzi, Archbishop of Bologna. Cardinal Levizzani died here on Wednesday last, in the 66th Year of his Age; by his Death there is a fifth Vacancy in the Sacred College.

*Leghorn, March 23.* We are informed by our last Advices from Genoa, that the Republick are going to send a Reinforcement of six hundred disciplined Troops to Corsica, in order to reinforce the Garrisons of Bastia, Ajaccio, Calvi, and Bonifacio.

*Vienna, March 30.* On Sunday last the Chevalier Correro, the Venetian Ambassador, made his publick Entry into this City; and on Tuesday he was admitted to his first private Audiences of their Imperial Majesties. General Serbelloni, who commands in Hungary, under Prince Lichtenstein, is set out for Sclavonia, in order to regulate the new Establishment of the Militia in that Province.

*Vienna, April 6.* They have already begun, by their Imperial Majesties express Orders, to make the necessary Preparations for forming several Camps this Summer in the Hereditary

Countries. Yesterday M. Jacob, Abbe of Maria-Zell in Austria, received, from the Hands of the Emperor, with the usual Formalities, the Investiture of the Estates which the Abbe Prince of Berchtolßgaden holds as Fiefs of the Empire.

*Berlin, April 8.* 'Tis said the Regiments that are to form the different Camps this Summer will soon be named. We are informed by our last Letters from Halle, that twenty three of the principal Houses in that Town have been lately reduced to Ashes.

*Amsterdam, April 10.* The Regency of this City have forbid the setting up of private Lotteries, without Leave of the Magistrates, under the Penalty of one thousand Florins. The Inhabitants are also forbid to have any Concern in private Lotteries that may be set on Foot in any of the other Provinces.

*Paris, April 12.* On Monday Morning last M. Quillet, Counsellor of the Chatelet, was seized, by Virtue of the King's Letter de Cachet, and committed to the Bastile; but M. Pelletier, another of the Members of that Tribunal, against whom a Letter de Cachet was likewise issued, found Means to get away. A few Days ago some Thieves got into the Apartment of the Dauphiness at Versailles, and carried off a large Sum of Money, and other Things of Value.

*Hague, April 18.* On Saturday last the States of Holland and Westfrizeland adjourned for the Holy-Days, and are to re-assemble on the 8th of next Month. M. van de Wall, lately appointed Aid Major of the City of Zutphen, has taken the Oaths, in that Quality, before the Council of State.

*Kensington, April 21.*

This Day M. Rosenkrantz, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had a private Audience of Leave of his Royal Highness the Duke.

And afterwards a private Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia: To both which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
