Lisbon, March 13.

THE King, in order to ease the Inhabitants of the Brazils of the Trouble and Expence of appealing to the Courts of Lisbon for the final Determination of Causes of different Kinds, has caused a Supreme Court of Justice to be established at St. Sebastians, where all Disputes in Law are for the Future to be heard and determined without Appeal. Last Week a Ship arrived in the Tagus from Maragnan. She sailed from thence with the Fleet near four Months ago, and was separated from it in a violent Storm of Wind off the Islands of the Azores. And as no News has since been heard of that Fleet, which is deemed very rich, having on Board to the Value of nine Millions of Cruizades; we are fearful least some Accident has befallen it; and the rather, as the Voyage from Maragnan to this Place seldom exceeds six Weeks.

Rome, March 30. The great Number of Robberies that have lately been committed in this City, especially after it was dark, occasioned the Pope to order a Patroll to march all Night through the principal Streets, who have already apprehended a great Number of Thieves and Vagabonds, several of whom are confined to hard Labour, and Prosecutions ordered to be carried on against many others.

Genoa, March 30. The Government have lately sent several small Parties of Soldiers drafted from the Regiments in this Garrison, to Corfica.

Marseilles, April 4. Five Transport Ships sailed from hence a few Days ago for Toulon, having on Board 437 Sailors, and a large Quantity of Provisions for the Use of the Ships that are fitting out in that Port.

Munich, April 7. The Hereditary Prince of Modena, who has been here for some Time, set out Yesterday Morning for the Court of the Duke his Father.

Besancon, April 8. We have received Advice from Pontarlier, that a Fire broke out there on Thursday last, which burnt with such Violence, that about forty Houses were soon reduced to Ashes, notwithstanding they had all the Assistance it was possible to give them; and the Convent of the Capuchins, in that Town suffered greatly on the Occasion.

Brussels, April 13. The Dutch Troops began to change their Garrisons on Monday last, when the Regiment of Rechteren marched from Namure for Holland; the first Battalion of the Grison Regiment of Planta, from Maestricht for Bergen-op-Zoom; the second Swiss Regiment of Constant, from Sas van Ghent for Ypres; and the second Battalion of the German Regiment of Waldeck, from Venlo for Namure.

Paris, April 15. They talk of forming several Camps this Summer, in the same Manner as they did last Year; and that, amongst others, there will be one in the Franche-Comte, and another in Alsace; and 'tis even said, that Count Argenson, Secretary at War, has already prepared a List of the Regiments of which each Camp is to consist.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.
