Lisbon, March 26.

THE Fleet from Maragnan, consisting of nine Merchantmen, convoyed by a Man of War, arrived in this Port last Week, to the great Satisfaction of our Merchants, who have been expecting it with the utmost Impatience for these two Months past; and the rather, as 'tis reckoned the richest Fleet of Ships that has arrived from that Country for a long Time, having on Board upwards of two Millions of Cruzades for the King's Account only.

Naples, April 2. They go on very successfully in raising Men for compleating the three new Battalions which the King has ordered to be added to the Troops of this Kingdom. His Majesty has named a certain Number of Gentlemen of Learning to examine into the Greek Manuscripts lately taken out of the Ruins of the ancient City of Heraclea. There are several Volumes of them, all fairly wrote on Parchment, and very legible. The Courts of Vienna, Versailles, and Rome, are very assiduous in their Endeavours to accommodate the Differences between this Court and the Order of Malta; and as 'tis said the Prohibition against the Subjects of this Kingdom having any Commerce with the Maltese, will soon be taken off, every Body imagines that litigious Affair is in a fair Way of being amicably adjusted.

Genoa, April 9. We are assured, by the last Accounts received here from Corsica, that the Malecontents are gathering Strength almost every Day, which gives the Government some Uneasiness. The Master of an English Ship that arrived here a few Days ago from Malta, says, that his Neapolitan Majesty's Prohibition against the Maltese being supplied with Provisions from Sicily, has occasioned every Species of that Kind to become very dear; and the rather, as they are now obliged to fetch every Thing they want of that Kind from Sardinia or the Levant. And the Master of an Imperial Felucca, that arrived here on Sunday last from the Coast of Barbary, assures us, that ten or twelve Tunesian Corsairs were returned into the Port of Gouletta from a Cruize, in which they had been very unsuccessful, having taken only two Barks in the Spanish Seas, with about thirty Slaves on board.

Stockholm, April 12. We hear from Gottenbourg, that the Sale of the Merchandize brought by the Company's Ship the Union from the East Indies, began on the 4th Instant, and was likely to prove very advantageous.

Madrid, April 15. On Monday the 8th of this Month died of an inflammatory Fever, in the 53d Year of his Age, Don Joseph de Carvajal y Lancaster, Minister of State, President of the Council of the Indies, and Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece. The Abi-

lities and great Integrity of this Minister, who had been for several Years at the Head of Affairs, have made him greatly lamented, as well by their Catholick Majesties, as by the Publick. The King has been pleased to direct the Duke of Huescar, Grand Master of the Household, to charge himself with the Management of State Affairs, till such Time as his Majesty shall think fit to appoint a Minister for that Purpose. The Marquis de Guevara, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Naples to the Court of Portugal, who has been here for some Months, set out last Week for Lisbon.

Strasbourg, April 16 We are assured, that a Camp will be formed in the Summer in this Province, and that Lieutenant General Court Maillebois will have the Command thereof.

Hambourg, April 18. The Regency of this City, to shew their Approbation of the Conduct of M. Klefeker, in executing the Commissions he was charged with to the Courts of Madrid and Versailles, have presented him with a thousand Ducats. An English Ship, with a valuable Cargo, is sunk at the Mouth of the Elbe near Cuxhaven; but the Crew, and Part of the Cargo, are saved.

Hague, April 25. The Deputies from the Province of Utrecht, appointed to execute a Commission of Importance to her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, arrived here last Night. The Deputies from the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces, continue to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department with great Unanimity. By our last Letters from Madrid we have an Account of the Death of Don Joseph de Carvajal y Lancaster, the King of Spain's Prime Minister.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
