Moscow, April 5.

THE Commissaries of War have received Orders to buy up Corn, Hay, &c. for filling the Magazines on the Frontiers. 'Tis said the Troops of this Empire will shortly be augmented with 30,000 Men, and the Fleet with 60 new Gallies. A very great Fire broke out a few Days ago, by which most of the spacious Buildings, lately erected near the Physick Garden, were entirely reduced to Ashes.

Modena, April 10. The Duke has ordered the necessary Preparations to be made for the Court's Removal to Reggio immediately after the Arrival of the Hereditary Prince, who is daily expected here on his Return from Germany.

Rome, April 13. The Pope, who a few Days ago was pretty much indisposed, is now perfectly recovered. The Smuglers, who took up their Residence in large Bodies in the Romagna, and carried on all Manner of illicit Trade, are at length all drove out of that Province by the Detachments sent from hence, and those Troops are now actually on their March back again. A Courier is arrived here from Lisbon with an Account of the Death of Cardinal Almeyda, which makes a sixth Vacancy in the Sacred College.

Loghorn, April 13. We are informed by our last Advices from Corsica, that the Marquess de Grimaldi, the Republic's Commissary General in that Island, having received Information that the Inhabitants of Capo Corse were carrying on a secret Correspondence with the Malecontents, marched against them with a strong Detachment of Troops, and set Fire to the Habitations of those who did not pay the Contribution he laid them under for their Treachery. The same Advices add, that the Malecontents had assembled a Body of 7 or 8000 Men, with an Intent, as 'twas thought, to make themselves Masters of San Fiorenzo.

Dresden, April 15. The King intends to set out on Wednesday next for Elstwerda, in order to spend ten or twelve Days in Hunting; after which he proposes going to the Fair of Leipfick. His Majesty's Departure for Poland is fixed for the 17th of June; for which Purpose several Officers of the Household are to set forward next Wednesday, in order to make the necessary Preparations for the Reception of him and his Retinue.

Marseilles, April 16. The Masters of several Ships arrived here lately from the Coast of Africa say, that the Dey and Regency of Algiers were disposed to send a solemn Embassy to the Court of France, to make Satisfaction for the Insults committed by the Corsairs of that

State against the Flag of his most Christian Majesty.

Vienna, April 17. Their Imperial Majesties have signified their Intention to remove to Luxembourg the Beginning of next Month, in order to spend some Weeks, and accordingly that Palace is ordered to be immediately prepared for their Reception. They write from Constantinople, that in the Night between the 10th and 11th Instant, a Fire broke out in the Armenian Quarter of that City, which burnt down near 600 Houses. The whole Loss, occasioned by this Fire, is reckoned to amount to about two Millions of Piaftres.

Altena, April 18. In Conformity to the Orders received from Copenhagen, we are at Work with great Diligence in getting ready several hundred Tents for the Use of the Troops that are to form a Camp in Holstein this Summer.

Worms, April 19. The Weather continued so very severe in these Parts, that we have great Reason to fear the Vineyards will suffer greatly this Year on that Account.

Franckfort, April 19. We are informed by our last Letters from the Weteraw, that Prince Ernest of Birstein, Chief of the House of Ysenbourg Budingen, and Knight of the Order of the Seraphins, &c. died at the Castle of Birstein, on the 15th Instant, in the 68th Year of his Age, after a tedious Illness.

Rochfort, April 20. We have received Advice from the Spanish Coast, that a Ship named the Intrepide, bound from Martineco to St. Malo's, with a valuable Cargo on board, was cast away on the Coast of Galicia, and all the Crew drowned, except eight Men.

Berlin, April 23. They write from Sonnenbourg, that the Church, and almost all the Houses in that Village, were entirely destroyed by Lightning on the 13th Instant.

Paris, April 26. The Duke de Valliere has obtained the King's Permission to resign his Government of the Bourbonnois in Favour of Count Peyre. Madame la Dauphine is now actually in the fifth Month of her Pregnancy; and enjoys a perfect State of Health.

Hague, April 30. The Deputies from the Province of Utrecht had, on Thursday last, their Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante. Her Royal Highness has lately made a numerous Promotion of General Officers, by which seven Colonels have been raised to the Rank of Majors General of Horse; and eight other Colonels to that of Majors General of Foot. We hear from Gouda, that M. Lestevenon, ancient Burgomaster of that Town, died there on Wednesday last, in the 72d Year of his Age.
