Whitehall, May 11.

IT being his Majesty's Royal Intention, That the Parliament, which is summon'd to meet on Friday the 31st of this Instant (May) should then meet, and sit; The King has been pleased to direct a Commission to pass the Great Seal, appointing, and authorising His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, Thomas Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and other Lords, to open, and hold, the said Parliament, on the said 31st Day of this Instant (May,) being the Day of the Return of the Writs of Summons.

Moscow, April 16. The Great Princess advances happily in her Pregnancy, and enjoys a good State of Health. The Regiments of Moskoffkoy and Kourinskoy, quarter'd in this City, have received Orders to march to Peterbourg; and those of Ruterskoy, Jarslowskoy and Nawaginskoy, have already taken the same Route.

Naples, April 23. They talk of another Augmentation being soon to be made to the Forces of this Kingdom, which 'tis said is to consist of six more Battalions of Foot; but this is only Conjecture. We hear that the Duke of Parma intends shortly to visit this Court with the Princess his Spouse. His Majesty has given a very favourable Answer to the two Knights of Malta, who lately arrived here; which makes it believed that the Disputes between this Court and that Order, are in a fair Way of being soon accommodated.

Rome, April 27. On Monday last a secret Consistory was held at the Quirinal, in which the Pope named the Bishop of Syracuse to be Archbishop of Montreal in Sicily, the Bishop of Ariano to be Archbishop of Tarento, and the Bishop of Lanciano to be Archbishop of Matera; at the same Time M. Bussey was nominated to the Bishoprick of Toul in Lorrain, M. Roquelauze to that of Senlis in the Island of France, and Don Stabili to that of Venafre, in the Terra de Labour, one of the Neapolitan Provinces. The Chevalier Ricci, Commander of the Pope's Gallies, is set out for Civitta Vecchia, in order to put to Sea on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates.

Stockholm, April 30. The King has conferred on Admiral Ridderstolpe, the important Employment of President of the Chamber of Finances, vacant by the Death of Count Bielke. The Weather continues extreme cold in this Country, the Rocks being still cover'd with Snow, and every Thing frozen as in the Depth of Winter, so that we scarce remember a more severe Season.

Prague, May 4. 'Tis reported that the Bavarian Troops are to form a Camp this Summer in the Upper Palatinate; and that they are already preparing Magazines of Provision and Forage for that Purpose.

Strasbourg, May 6. We hear the Camp that is to be formed in this Province in the Summer, is to consist of 20 or 30,000 Men, under the Command of the Marquess de Maillebois; and, according to all Appearance, by the Preparations that are making, 'tis thought it will be marked out in the Plain between Hagenau and Bischweiler, along the Side of the River Moter.

Copenhagen, May 7. The King has declared his Intention of reviewing the Troops in this Garrison next Week; and, on the 22d Instant, his Majesty proposes to set out for Holstein.

Brussels, May 13. On Monday last the Emperess Queen's Ordonnance was published here, expressly forbidding her Subjects in the Low Counties to enter into any Foreign Service, on Pain of Confiscation of all their Estates and Effects whatsoever, and of rendering them incapable of inheriting any Estates that may be left them hereafter. And in Case any Person shall be convicted of enlisting any of them after the Publication of this Ordonnance, he is to pay 100 Crowns for the first Offence; be publickly whipped and burnt in the Hand for the second; and for the third to suffer Death.

Hague, May 16. This Afternoon the Regiment of Horse Guards passed in Review before her Royal Highness the Princess Governante and the young Prince Stadtholder, attended by several General Officers, and made a very fine Appearance; And the Dutch Regiment of Foot-Guards, as likewise that of the Swiss, are to be reviewed the Beginning of next Week.

The King has been pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Thomas Clarke, Esq; one of his Majesty's Counsel at Law; and to grant unto him the Office of Master, or Keeper, of the Rolls and Records in Chancery, in the room of Sir John Strange, deceased.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrent Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checques at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Charles Fearn, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st Day of May next; This is to give Notice thereof, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, by the 31st of next Month, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingburn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
