Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That a Set of Corn-Mills, in the Parish of Houghton, in the County of Huntingdon, belonging to Mr. John Jackson, of Godmanchester, in the said County, were set on Fire on the 13th of May last, between the Hours of Twelve at Night and One in the Morning, and were entirely consumed; together with a large Quantity of Corn, and Flower, and all the Utensils, and Furniture belonging to the said Mills; and that there is very strong Reason to suspect the said Mills were purposely set on Fire; His Majesty, for the better discovering, and bringing to Justice, the Person or Persons concerned in setting the said Mills on Fire, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said Mills) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, I do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said Mills) to be paid, by me, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Offenders.
