Algiers, April 24.

ON Thursday last three Fathers of the Order of Mercy arrived here from Portugal on board a Swedish Ship, having brought with them a Letter and several rich Presents from his Portuguese Majesty. The next Day they had a private Audience of the Dey, and having delivered their Letter and Presents, and agreed for the Redemption of 226 Captives, among whom were five Women, they all sailed the Day following for Lisbon.

Naples, April 30. The King has consented to a Suspension of Hostilities between his Majesty's Ships and those of Malta, but the Prohibition of trading with that State is still to continue, and fresh Orders are given to the Commanders of our Gallies to seize all Neapolitan or Sicilian Vessels that shall attempt to supply the Maltese with Provisions, as many of them have done notwithstanding the Prohibition. They go on very successfully in raising Recruits for filling up the old Regiments, and for completing the new ones. The Fortifications on the Frontiers of this Kingdom are ordered to be repaired with great Diligence; and the Magazines of those Places are ordered to be forthwith filled with all Sorts of Ammunition and Provisions.

Barcelona, April 30. The Fleet that has been for some Time equipping in this Port, is now ready to put to Sea; it is extraordinary well manned, and they have put a great Quantity of Ammunition and Provisions on board; but we are yet Ignorant as to its Destination.

Lisbon, May 6. On the 23d of last Month the Court removed from hence to Salvaterra for the Summer. A few Days ago a Fire broke out in this City, which burnt with great Violence; by which Accident about thirty Houses were reduced to Ashes in a few Hours. The Chevalier de Guevara has had his first Audiences of their most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family, in Quality of Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Two Sicilies, and has since notified his Arrival in Form to all the Foreign Ministers residing at this Court.

Rome, May 11. The Pope has declared his Intention of going, on the 27th Instant, to

Castel Gandolfo, in order to spend best Part of the Summer. M. Salviati is preparing to set out for Malta, with some new Propositions from the Pope for accommodating the Disputes between the King of the Two Sicilies and the Knights of that Order.

Prague, May 11. The Camp that is to be formed this Summer in the Neighbourhood of Kolin, for which they are already making the necessary Preparations, is to consist of the following Regiments, viz, those of Foot of Francis of Lorraine, Henry and Leopold Daun, Saxe Hildbourghausen, Old and Young Wolfembuttel, Harsch, Baden Dourlach, that of the Teutonic Order, and those of Nicholas and Joseph Esterhazy, the nine first of four Battalions each, and the two others of three; the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Hohenembs, and those of Dragoons of Archduke Joseph, and of Batschiany. The Regiment of Wallis being the only one that is to remain here in Garrison.

Warsaw, May 13. A Fire broke out in this City in the Night between the 9th and 10th Instant, which burnt down fifteen Houses. And we have since received an Account, that the Village of Przedbortz, in the Neighbourhood of Petrikau, is almost reduced to Ashes; only five or six Houses remaining unconsumed.

Stockholm, May 14. The King assists very regularly at the Deliberations of the Senate. We are informed, that in the Night between the 2d and 3d Instant, a Fire broke out at Hedemora, a Town in the Province of Dalecarlia, which in a short Time reduced almost all that Town to Ashes; the principal Church, the Hospital, and about fifty Houses, being all that remain.

Vienna, May 15. On Monday last, being the Empress's Birth-Day, their Imperial Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction: But no Promotion, either Civil or Military, was made on that Occasion.

Aranjuez, May 20. His Excellency Lieutenant General Wall, late Ambassador at the Court of London, arrived here on the 17th Instant, and met with a most gracious Reception from their Catholick Majesties, who were pleased, next Day, to appoint him Secretary of State for

for Foreign Affairs, in the Room of the late M. de Carvajal. At the same Time a Decree, signed by the King, was published, constituting the Duke of Huefcar, President of the Council of State. By Letters from Andalucia we are informed, that, in those Parts, the Barley is already reaping, and the Wheat quite secured, so that they are entirely freed from the terrible Apprehensions they were under of having such another Year as the last.

Copenhagen, May 21. The King's Departure for Holstein remains fixt for Monday next, but 'tis not determin'd whether his Majesty will go to Altena, as was at first intended, on Account of the Small-Pox, which at present is very rife in that City. The Regiment of Foot of the late Count Reventlau is given to Colonel Kleift. Yesterday the Merchandize, brought lately from the East Indies, began selling at our Asiatick Company's Office at Christianshaven.

Dresden, May 21. The King and Queen of Poland arrived at St. Hubertzbourg last Friday from Leipfick, and came here the next Day. They stayed at Leipfick, attended by several Lords and Ladies of the Court, almost all the Time of the Fair, which was very brilliant. Their Majesties Departure for Poland is fixed for the 22d of next Month.

Berlin, May 21. On Friday last we had a most dreadful Storm of Thunder and Lightning, accompanied with the largest Hail Stones that have fallen in this Country for some Years. The Gardens have suffered prodigiously on this Occasion; and several Houses have been destroyed by the Lighthing at the Village of Wilmersdorff.

Hague, May 28. On Wednesday last the Regiment of Dutch Foot Guards were reviewed by her Royal Highness the Princess Governante and the young Prince Stadtholder, attended by several General Officers. They went through their Evolutions and Firings with great Exactness; and being dressed in their new Cloaths, they made a very fine Appearance. Yesterday the Swiss Regiment of Guards was reviewed in like Manner, and gave great Satisfaction to all present.

PURsuant to an Act of Parliament of the 26th Year of his present Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, That Information has been sent to this Office, that a Vessel called the Swan of Uddevalla in Sweden, Andris Borgeson Isberg, Master, Burthen about Forty Tuns, laden with Deals, Iron, Pitch, and Tar, and ten Cases of Merchandize consigned to the Order of Thomas and Adrian Hope of Amsterdam, bound to Dunkirk, having on the 24th of May last sprung a Leak on the Northward of Dogger Bank, and the Water encreasing upon them until it was above the Cabbini Deck, the Crew took to their Boat to save their Lives, and got to Yarmouth, having, while in Distress, thrown the ten Cases of Merchandize and some

Iron over Board. The Vessel has been since taken up at Sea, and brought into the Port of Yarmouth, where she now lies.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That a Set of Corn Mills, in the Parish of Houghton, in the County of Huntingdon, belonging to Mr. John Jackson, of Godmanchester, in the said County, were set on Fire on the 13th of May last, between the Hours of Twelve at Night and One in the Morning, and were entirely consumed; together with a large Quantity of Corn, and Flower, and all the Utensils, and Furniture belonging to the said Mills; and that there is very strong Reason to suspect the said Mills were purposely set on Fire; His Majesty, for the better discovering, and bringing to Justice, the Person or Persons concerned in setting the said Mills on Fire, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said Mills) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Fact, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, I do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except the Person who actually set Fire to the said Mills) to be paid, by me, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Offenders.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingbourne, by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall

apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
