Constantinople, May 1.

THE Captain Bashaw is shortly to put to Sea with seven Men of War and twelve Frigats, in order to sail for the Islands in the Archipelago, to receive the annual Tributes which the Inhabitants of those Islands pay to the Grand Seignior. A few Days ago a Man of War of 100 Guns was launched in this Port.

Lisbon, May 10. The Fleet from Rio de Janeiro arrived at the Mouth of the Tagus on Wednesday last, having had a safe and quick Passage. This Fleet is reckoned the richest that has come from that Country for some Years past.

Pofnania, May 18. Count Dzialinsky, Patin of Kalisch, is appointed Commissary General of the Troops of this Republick, in which Quality he has, by the King's Order, made a general Review of all the Regiments, who went through their Exercise with great Exactness, and made a handsome Appearance.

Rome, May 18. On Monday next a private Consistory is to be held at the Palace, in which 'tis thought the Pope will confirm the King of Portugal's Appointment of Cardinal Atalaya to be Patriarch of Lisbon, in the room of the late Cardinal Almeyda. The Pope's Departure for Castel-Gandolfo, which was fixed for the 27th Instant, is deferred till after Whitsuntide.

Florence, May 20. The Reports that have prevailed for some Time, of the Court of Vienna's Intention of sending a considerable Body of Troops into Lombardy, begin to gain Credit; and 'tis even said, that Count Apremont has received Orders to prepare Quarters in the Milanese and Mantuan for about 12,000 Men.

Genoa, May 21. We are informed by the Masters of several Ships arrived here within these few Days past, that two French Tartanes have lately perished off Alaffio, but that their Crews had the good Fortune to save themselves. The Government having been informed by some Dispatches received from Corsica, that the Town of Bastia, and all its neighbouring Forts, are blockaded by the Malecontents, have order'd

the necessary Measures to be taken for giving them an immediate and powerful Assistance.

Stockholm, May 23. The Consumption of Coffee being greatly diminished since laying the additional Duty on that Commodity, the Government has order'd the said Duty to be taken off; and our East India Company are determined to petition the States of this Kingdom, at the Opening of the next General Diet, for a Revocation of the late Edict for prohibiting the Wearing of China Silks. We hear that the Difficulties which have retarded the Regulation of the Limits between this Crown and that of Denmark, are at length happily removed by Baron Flemming, Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to that of Copenhagen.

Prague, May 29. Several Persons are committed to Prison as the supposed Authors of the late great Fire, but as yet nothing of that Nature has been proved against them. By an exact Account taken of the Number of Houses destroyed and damaged on that Occasion, they amount to no more than 360.

Copenhagen, May 31. On Saturday last the King arrived here from Fredericksbourg, and early on Monday Morning his Majesty set out for Holstein. The next Day he passed the Great Belt, and lay that Night at Odensee. Count Berkentin, Secretary of State, the Prince of Saxe Hildbourghausen, and several other Persons of Distinction, accompany his Majesty in this Journey. Last Week eight Ships sailed from hence on the Whale Fishery.

Vienna, June 2. Yesterday her Imperial Majesty was safely delivered of an Archduke at Schonbrun; which happy Event was in the Evening made known to the Inhabitants of this City by several Discharges of the Cannon upon our Ramparts; and the young Archduke is already christened by the Names of Ferdinand-Charles-Antoine-Joseph-Jean-Stanislas, the King of the Two Sicilies standing Godfather by Proxy.

Ostend, June 4. The Regiment of Los Rios, which has been here in Garrison for some Years, is marched from hence for Brussels, and

is replaced by that of Saxe Gotha, which has been for some Time in Garrison at Antwerp.

Frankfort, June 7. Prince William of Saxe Gotha passed through this City a few Days ago for the Low Countries, in order to take the Command of the Regiment of Foot lately conferred on him by her Imperial Majesty. They write from Ratisbon, that the Prince of Tour Taxis, and Prince Schwartzbourg-Rudolstadt, were admitted into the College of Princes on the 30th of last Month, with all the Formalities usual on such Occasions.

Vlaardingen, June 10. The Busses employed this Year in the Herring Fishery will put to Sea on Friday next for Schetland; they amount in the Whole to 160, besides Tenders, viz. 10 for Rotterdam, 10 for Shiedam, 17 for Delfshaven, 22 for Maastrandsluys, and 101 for this Town. And the Ships employed in the Whale Fishery this Year, amount to 95, viz. 2 for Dort, 5 for Rotterdam, 8 for Shiedam, 5 for the Brille, 1 for Delfshaven, 55 for Maastrandsluys, 18 for this Town, and 1 for Swartewaal.

Hague, June 13. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, after having received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, the Members of the Regency, and divers other Persons of Distinction, set out this Afternoon, with her Family, and the whole Court, for Oranje-Woud.

Admiralty-Office, May 29, 1754.

Whereas by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, Money was granted for paying a Bounty for the Year 1754, of two Shillings and Six-pence per Day to twenty Chaplains, and two Shillings per Day to twenty more Chaplains, who have served longest on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, provided it appears by the Books of the said Ships, that they have been actually borne and mustered thereon, for the Space of five Years, during the late Wars with France and Spain; and provided likewise, that such Chaplains do not enjoy the Benefit of some Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment, from the Crown or otherwise, of the present annual Value of Fifty Pounds.

These are to give Notice to all such Chaplains, as are within the aforesaid Description, that they are, on or before the first Day of August next, to apply to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, at their Office in London, to be admitted to the said Bounty; and at the same Time to deliver a List of the Ships they have served in, together with an Affidavit made before a proper Magistrate, that they do not enjoy the Benefit of some Ecclesiastical Living or Preferment, from the Crown or otherwise, of the present annual Value of Fifty Pounds, in order that Lists may be made out for the Payment of the aforesaid Bounty.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the

Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as Short-Men, dressed like Sailors, and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing them, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
