*Kensington, June 25.*

**S**ATURDAY last, being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Succession to the Throne; at Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and at Night there were Bonfires and other Illuminations of Joy throughout London and Westminster: And on Sunday His Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and others Persons of Distinction, upon that Occasion.

*Carlton House, June 25.*

On Sunday last the Chevalier d'Abreu, charged with the Affairs of the King of Spain, had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales; to both which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

*Lisbon, May 14.* The Lordship of Ilha-Grande-de-Joanne, situate at the Mouth of the River Amazonas, is annexed to the Domains of the Crown, the King having given Don Louis de Macedo, in exchange for it, the Lordship of the Town of Misquitella, in the Province of Beyra, with the Title of Viscount. Last Week the Chevalier de Guevara, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of the Two Sicilies, had divers Conferences with the Ministry, on Affairs of Importance.

*Moscow May 25.* Yesterday her Imperial Majesty set out from hence for Petersbourg; the Great Duke and Great Dutchess having taken the same Route three Days before.

*Aranjuez, June 3.* Thursday the 30th of last Month being the King's Name-Day, the same was celebrated with the usual Magnificence. In the Morning their Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction: After which the Marquis de Ensenada, Secretary of State, gave an elegant Dinner at his House; and at Night a new Serenata was performed in the Theatre at the Palace. The Duke of Huescar, who has been much indisposed for this

Week past, is now perfectly recovered. By Letters from Cadiz we are informed, that on the 17th past, arrived in that Bay, from Vera Cruz, the Nostra Senora del Carmen, with 280,000 Dollars, and a large Quantity of Cochineal, Indigo, and other valuable Effects, of which, it is said, the greatest Part is damaged.

*Copenhagen, June 8.* The King is expected back from Holstein towards the End of this Month. M. Eigtwed, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, Architect to the Court, and one of the Directors of the Royal Academy of Painting and Sculpture in this City, died here Yesterday.

*Dresden, June 10.* The Equipage of the Princes Xavier and Charles, who are to accompany his Majesty into Poland, is already sent to Warsaw. Publick Prayers are put up, in all the Churches of this City, by the King's express Order, for the happy Delivery of the Queen of the Two Sicilies, who is near her Time.

*Sleswick, June 10.* The Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel, and the Hereditary Prince his Son, arrived here on Friday last, and were received with great Marks of Distinction by his Danish Majesty. The next Day the King accompanied them to the Camp, attended by great Numbers of Persons of Quality and Distinction, and saw the Troops go through their Evolutions and Fireings; with whose Behaviour and Appearance, they expressed great Satisfaction. Notwithstanding the Concourse of People from all Parts, who come daily to see the Camp, such wise Precautions are taken to prevent Impositions, that the Price of Provisions, in all the Neighbouring Towns and Villages, is very reasonable. Mess. Faber and Dresky, Counsellors of the Regency of Hambourg, who came here in Quality of Deputies from that City, to compliment the King upon his Arrival in these Parts, were Yesterday introduced to his Majesty, and met with a gracious Reception; and having acquitted themselves of the Commission with which they were charged, they were afterwards admitted to his Majesty's Table; and on Friday the Deputies from the City of Lubeck had also

also an Audience of his Majesty, and likewise the Honour of being admitted to his Table. This Camp is formed in the following Order: On the Right Wing is the Regiment of Dragoon Guards, that of the Horse Guards, and those of Jutland and Sleeswick, Cuirassiers. The Foot are in the Centre, and consist of the Queen's Regiment, and those of Ahlesfeld, Oldenbough, Sleeswick, Bornholm, Moen, and Jutland: And, on the left Wing, are the Regiments of Cuirassiers of Oldenbough, Fuhnen, and Seelande. All these Troops, with one Battalion of the Train of Artillery, are commanded by the Margrave of Brandenburg Culmbach, and are daily exercised in the same Manner as in Time of War.

Berlin, June 11. The King, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and followed by a great Number of General Officers, returned here from Pomerania on Wednesday Morning last. His Majesty immediately repaired to the Queen-Mother's, with whom he dined, and in the Evening set out for Potzdam. The Regiments that were assembled, by his Majesty's Order, at Stargard, and which were reviewed by him, were those of Foot of Jeetz, Uchlander, Brunswick-Bevern, and Prince Maurice of Anhalt Dessau; the Regiment of Cuirassiers of the Margrave of Brandebourg-Schwedt; those of Dragoons of the Margrave of Bareith, Ahlemann, and of Prince Frederick Eugene of Wirtembourg; and the Regiment of Hussars of Seyd tz. These Troops went through their Exercise to his Majesty's entire Satisfaction, who likewise expressed his Approbation of their good Appearance. They are all since marched to their respective Quarters. The Queen-Mother, and Princess Amelia, are gone to Montbijou, with their Attendants, in order to spend the Summer at that Palace.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.
