Kensington, June 27.

THIS Day Count Haflang had a private Audience of His Majesty, to present his Credential Letter as Minister Plenipotentiary from the Elector Palatine; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

As likewise the Chevalier d'Abreu, charged with the Affairs of the King of Spain, had a private Audience of Her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia: To which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Kensington, June 30.

This Day Count Haflang, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Elector Palatine, had a private Audience of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; and afterwards of Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales; at Carlton House: To both which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

As likewise the Chevalier d'Abreu, charged with the Affairs of the King of Spain, had a private Audience of His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland: To which he was introduced by Charles Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Dublin, June 25.

Last Saturday, being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the Great Guns were fired at His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon their Excellencies the Lord Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Lisbon, May 21. On the 13th Instant an Advice Boat, commanded by Capt. Bayam, arrived in our Road from the Bay of All Saints. She is richly laden, and was only ten Weeks in her Passage. The two Fathers of the Redemption of Slaves, who sailed from hence about four Months ago in a Swedish Ship for Algiers, returned safe into this Port last Saturday, with 226 Captives, whom they released from Slavery.

Rome, June 4. The Pope has granted to the Inhabitants of Nocera and Gualdo, an Exemption from all Taxes whatsoever for the Space of ten Years, in Consideration of the great Losses and Damages they have sustained by Earthquakes.

Stockholm, June 12. They write from Carlscroon, that, in pursuance of an Order received from Court, several Vessels were sailed from thence on a Cruize of five or six Weeks in the Baltick, in order to exercise the Seamen. Prince Gustavus, who was last Week confined to his Apartment by a slight Fever, is now perfectly recovered. The King intends to set out for Scania the Beginning of next Month, in order to review the Troops quartered in that Province. We are informed by Letters from Gottenbourg, that our East-India Company's Ship the Esperance, commanded by Capt. Treutiger, is safely arrived there from Canton, with a very valuable Cargo on board.

Sleswick, June 13. His Danish Majesty goes constantly every Day to the Camp, to see the Troops go through their Exercise; and Yesterday he dined in the Tent of the Margrave of Culmbach, with the Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel, and several other Persons of Distinction. His Majesty, who has declared his Intention of setting out on his Return to Copenhagen the 20th Instant, will be accompanied by the Duke of Saxe Hildbourghausen his Brother in Law.

Vienna, June 15. The Camp intended to be formed this Summer in Bohemia, under the Command of Field Marshal Brown, is to consist of 42 Battallions, 21 Squadrons of Cavalry, 10000 Grenadiers, and 22 Companies of



Grenadiers, who have all Orders to assemble by the first of August next. Her Imperial Majesty is so well recovered of her late lying-in, as to be already able to see Company in her Apartment.

Aranjuez, June 17. Last Week the Conde de Fuentes, who was lately appointed Ambassador to the King of Sardinia, set out for the Court of Turin. On Thursday the Venetian Ambassador's Son was confirmed in the Chapel at the Palace, when their Catholick Majesties, who were pleased to assist at this Ceremony, made him a Present of their Pictures, richly set with Diamonds. We have Advice from Malaga, that four French Frigates are arrived there from the East; and that two Ships of greater Force are soon expected; two of the former will proceed to Cadiz, as soon as the Wind permits. These Letters add, that the Algerines are very busy in those Seas; and that two Tettuan Cruizers sailed lately from that Port, one of them with 120 Men on board, and the other with upwards of 80. From the Corunna they write, that his Catholick Majesty's Ship, the Dragon, arrived at Ferrol from Cadiz, on the 21st past, with eight hundred thousand Dollars: She is to be careened, and fitted out for Sea again, as soon as possible. By Letters from Gibraltar of the 31st past, we are informed, that General Fowke was arrived there with the Troops to relieve that Garrison; and that two Men of War had passed on with those for Mahon.

Brunswick, June 18. We are informed by Letters from Sleswick, that the Duke of Brunswick Wolfembuttel our Sovereign, who went thither to see the Danish Camp, proposes to leave that Place To-morrow on his Return Home; and his Highness is accordingly expected here on Monday next.

Frankfort, June 20. The Nobility of the Circles of the Upper and Lower Rhine, and of Swabia, Franconia, and Westphalia, who have assembled here for some Time past, having finished the Business that was laid before them, are separated, and most of them are already set out for their respective Homes. We learn from Fulde in the Weteraw, that five Coiners were executed there last Friday. They write from Alsace, that Preparations are making in that Province, for forming a Camp of a considerable Body of French Troops this Summer.

Brussels, June 20. On Sunday last we had a prodigious Storm of Thunder and Lightning; but the same happily went off without doing any considerable Damage. 'Tis now said that the Conferences for regulating the Barrier and Tariff will not be resumed till the Month of August next.

Hague, June 25. Their High Mightinesses the States of this Province have caused a Plac-

card to be published, by which a Penalty of 2000 Florins is laid on every Person who shall hereafter be convicted of selling Wines or Spirituous Liquors without paying Duty; and in Case they are convicted of a second Offence, they are to suffer perpetual Banishment.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, who were their Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers,

Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
