LINCOLN RACES, 1754.

HIS Majesty's Plate of One Hundred Guineas will be run for on Tuesday the 3d of September next, on the four Miles Course on the South Side of Lincoln, by any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, being no more than six Years old last Grass, to be certified under the Hands of the Breeders; to carry twelve Stone, three Heats; and to be shewn and entered at the Nag's Head in Waddington, on Monday the 2d Day of September in the Evening before they run: And if any Difference arise in Betting or Running, the same to be determined by his Grace the Duke of Ancaster, or whom he shall appoint, according to such his Majesty's Orders as will be then and there produced.
