Naples, June 4.

THE Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy, and 'tis expected her Majesty will be brought to Bed towards the Beginning of next Month. We are informed by an Express from Captain Martinez, Commander of a little Squadron that has been for some Time on a Cruize against the the Barbary Pyrates, that falling in with an Algerine Chebeck in the Seas of Calabria, he had the good Fortune to make himself Master of her, after a very smart Engagement, in which he lost but one Officer and two Sailors. We are likewise informed by our last Dispatches from Sicily, that the Report of the Death of the Duke of Viefville, Viceroy of that Kingdom, is without Foundation; on the contrary, he is greatly recover'd from an Indisposition that followed an Apoplectick Fit and confined him to his Bed for several Days, which occasioned the Report of his Death.

Florence, June 8. They write from Naples, that, at the Request of the Pope and some other Powers, the King of the Two Sicilies had declared, that he would desist from his Right of deputing the Bishop of Syracuse to visit the Churches in the Island of Malta, and would consent to such Visitation's being made by an Apostolick Commissary, provided the Grand Master would engage to have two Men of War constantly cruising on the Coast of Sicily against the Barbary Pyrates. Which Declaration having been dispatched to Malta by the Marquess d'Ossun, the French Ambassador; the Grand Master had returned for Answer, that the Order could not consent to any Engagement of that Nature, but that they would be always ready to assist with Men of War and Gallies, in endeavouring to extirpate those Pyrates whenever his Sicilian Majesty should require it.

Genoa, June 8. His Serene Highness the Doge of this Republick having finished his Administration of two Years, quitted the Ducal Palace Yesterday, and returned to his own House; His Successor is not yet chosen. We are informed by the Master of one of our Pink's that arrived in this Port a few Days ago from the Coast of Calabria, that he met in his Passage four Neapolitan Chebecks, convoying an Algerine Chebeck of 24 Guns and 250 Men, which they had taken, on the 17th of last Month, off Cape Stilo, after an obstinate Engagement.

Milan, June 13. The Great Chancellor Count Christiani, who was for several Days confined to his Bed with a violent Fever, is now perfectly recovered, and intends to set out next Week for Vaprio, in order to regulate, with the Chevalier Mocenigo, the Limits of the Dominions of the Empress Queen and those of the Republick of Venice. Count Apremont, Commander in Chief of the Imperial Troops in Lombardy, is actually preparing in this Dutchy,

giments of Foot, who we are assured will arrive from Germany some Time next Month.

Prague, June 15. Their Imperial Majesties having signified to Count Brown their Intention of visiting the Camp that is to be formed in the Month of August next, under his Command, in the Neighbourhood of this City, that General is already making the necessary Preparations for their Reception.

Dresden, June 16. The King intends to set out To-morrow for Warsaw; in which Journey he will be accompanied by the Princes Xavier and Charles.

Strasbourg, June 17. The Marquess de Maillebois is arrived here, and has already marked out the Ground for the intended Camp of a considerable Body of Troops that is to be formed this Summer near the Village of Dachstein, a few Miles from hence.

Berlin, June 21. The King has appointed M. Hamel to be Counsellor of War and Domains of the Chamber of Stettin, in the Dutchy of Pomerania. Baron Pollnitz is arrived here from Prentlow, with an Account, that the Princess, Spouse to the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Darmstadt, was Yesterday happily deliver'd of a Princess.

Hague, June 27. They write from Oranje-Woud, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Family, continue there in perfect Health; and from Leuwarden, that Preparations have been making there for some Days, for the Reception of the young Prince Stadtholder, his Mother and Sister, who intend shortly to take a Tour thither. The States of the Province of Zealand have appointed M. Nolst to be their Counsellor at the Court of Justice here, in the room of the late M. Beukelaer, and he has already taken his Seat in that Quality.
