Lisbon, June 5.

TO-MORROW, being the Anniversary of the King's Birth-Day, who then enters into the 41st Year of his Age, the same will be celebrated with great Magnificence. His Majesty has declared his Intention of the Court's Removal to Belem on the 21st Instant. A Frigate of 40 Guns will shortly be launched here, which is to be joined to three Men of War that are now equipping in this Port, in order to cruize on the Corsairs of Barbary; and 'tis said that Captain Brito will have the Command of this little Squadron. The Slaves who were lately redeemed at Algiers, having finished their Quarantine, went Yesterday in Procession to the Church of the Fathers of the Holy Trinity, to return Thanks for their Deliverance. There were 128, amongst whom were five Women.

Warsaw, June 24. Their Majesties, who set out from Dresden on the 17th past, accompanied with the Princes Xavier and Charles, arrived here last Friday in perfect Health; and were saluted, at their Entrance into this City, by several Discharges of our Artillery. The next Day they appeared in Publick, and received the Compliments of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, upon their Arrival.

Stockholm, June 24. The Court is removed from Ulrichsdahl to the Castle of Drottningholm for the Remainder of the Summer. On Wednesday last the famous Banker Hysing was sentenced to be transported to Mastrand, where he is to be confined to hard Labour during Life.

Milan, June 24. Count Christiani, Great Chancellor, and Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress Queen of Hungary, to the Government of this Dutchy, set out last Thursday Morning for Vaprio, in order to regulate the Limits of the Dominions of her Imperial Majesty, and those of the Republick of Venice. The Chevalier Morosini, the Republick's Commissary, arrived there the same Day. Yesterday the Conferences begun, and 'tis expected that Affair will soon be happily adjusted.

Brunswick, June 26. The Duke our Sovereign, and the Hereditary Prince his Son, who went to see the Danish Camp in the Neighbourhood of Sleswick, returned here last Thursday Night.

Besancon, June 28. In Conformity to Orders from Court, they have begun to make Preparations for the Camp that is to be formed this Summer in the Neighbourhood of Gray, under the Command of the Duke de Randan, Lieutenant General of this Province. This Camp is to consist of the following Battalions, viz. two of the Regiment of Royal Marines, two of that of Talaru, two of Cambis, two of Rochefort, and three of Courten. The Regiments of Horse of Berry, Bourbon, Macieux and Tallerand; and the Regiments of Dragoons of Ferronaye and Aubigne.

Copenhagen, June 29. On Tuesday last the King returned to Frederichsbourg from Holstein. His Majesty has appointed M. Hauch, to be Director of the Fortifications. Besides the Bornholm and Nettleblad, that arrived here lately from China, the Sophia and the Queen, two other Ships belonging to our East India Company, are daily expected.

Vienna, June 29. The Empress is to be churched in Form this Morning, and in the Evening her Majesty will appear at the Drawing-Room. Her Imperial Majesty was pleased this Morning to make a very numerous Military Promotion, consisting of 17 Field Marshals, 24 Generals of Foot, 22 Generals of Horse, and 41 Lieutenant Generals. The Duke of Modena is of the Number of the Marshals. Her Imperial Majesty has given the Regiment of Foot late Schertzer, and formerly Arenberg, to the Count de Wied, a Major General. The Prince of Schwartzenberg is declared Great Marshal of the Court, in the Place of the Prince of Diedrichstein, who resigned; and Baron Hagen, an Aulick Counsellor, of the Bank of Nobles, is made Vice-President of that Council, in the Room of Count Hardig, deceased. There was likewise a Promotion of some Privy Counsellors and Chambellans.

Hague, July 9. Friday last her Royal Highness went with the Prince Stadtholder and Princess Carolina to Leuwarden, where she was received with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy; after having dined with the First Princess Dowager, her Royal Highness return'd the same Night to Oranje-Woud. Her Royal Highness is expected to return hither on Monday next. The Princess Royal and her Court is to go into Mourning for six Weeks, on Account of the Death of the Princess of Nassau Dietz.

General Post Office, March 2, 1754.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
