Naples, June 18.

THE Algerine Chebeck, that was taken, after an obstinate Engagement, by four of our Chebecks under the Command of Don Joseph Martinez, on the 30th of last Month, off of Cape Stilo, is named the Termo. She mounted 12 Guns and 10 Patteraroes, and was full of small Arms, but those they threw over board before they surrendered. The whole of the Crew, including three Spanish Slaves, amounted to 98 Persons, 12 of whom were wounded.

Turin, June 26 Count Argenteau, who arrived here a few Days ago in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from their Imperial Majesties, had his first private Audiences of the King and the Royal Family, on Monday last at the Palace of the Venerie.

Modena, June 26. On Sunday last the Duke our Sovereign invested Count Palavicini with the Ensigns of the Order of the Golden Fleece. This Ceremony was performed in the Presence of the whole Court, and the new Knight had afterwards the Honour of dining with his Serene Highness. On Monday the Count took his Leave of the Duke, and Yesterday he set out for Bologna, on his Way to Vienna. We are informed by our last Letters from Genoa, that the Marquess de Grimaldi, Commissary General of that Republick in the Island of Corsica, hath at Length obtained his Recall; and the Marquess Doria is appointed to succeed him.

Vienna, June 29. The Departure of the Princess Charlotte of Lorraine for the Low Countries, is fixed for the 20th of next Month. They write from Crems in Lower Austria, that they had last Week a violent Storm of Hail, which greatly damaged the Fruits of the Earth, and particularly the Vines. We are informed by Letters from Brinn in Moravia, that a Detachment of the Regiment of Dragoons of Prince Lichtenstein had come up with a large Gang of Robbers on the Confines of that Province, several of whom they had killed and wounded, and dispersed the Rest; and that the Chief of the Gang was found amongst those who were slain.

Copenhagen, July 2. The Bornholm, a Frigate belonging to the Royal Navy, which was sent to the East Indies about two Years ago, in Company with a Man of War called

the Nettleblad, is now returned with a Cargo of the Products of those Parts, for the Use of the Asiatick Company. The other is daily expected, having been separated from her Companion by Stress of Weather on the Way Homeward. These Ships are said to be richly laden, but have considerably suffered by Mortality, the commanding Officer of each of them being dead, together with a great Number of Sailors, insomuch that they were forced at the Cape of Good Hope, to take in the Assistance of several Hands to bring them on. Since the King's Return from Holstein, several Councils have been held at Fredrichsbourg, but the Result of them is kept secret. On Wednesday Morning last died M. Malling, Counsellor of State, by whose Death the Place of Comptroller of the Duties upon stamp Paper and Parchment is become vacant.

Paris, July 7. The King went to Compeigne on Tuesday last, where the Court is to reside for about six Weeks. His Majesty has appointed M. Condorcet, Bishop of Gap, to be Bishop of Auxerre, vacant by the Death of M. Caylus; and the Bishoprick of Gap is conferred on the Abbe de Perouse. The Marquess de Paulmy set out on Saturday last, accompanied by several experienced Officers and Engineers, to view the Fortifications, and examine the Magazines, in Normandy and Brittany. The Recall of the Parliament does not seem so near as has been suggested.

Brussels, July 8. Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, who has taken up his Residence at Ter-Vuren, comes here from Time to Time to assist at the Councils which are oft held upon the Subject of extending the Commerce and improving the Manufactures of these Countries.

Hague, July 16. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, set out, this Day, from Oranienwood, and is to stay To-night at Hoorn, where she will assist, in Person, at the Assembly of *Gecommitteerde Raaden* of the Province of North Holland. To-morrow Night her Royal Highness will lye at Berkenrode, where she will be received by Monsieur de Zoelen, one of the Deputies of the Province of Guelderland at the Assembly of their High Mightinesses; and Thursday she will dine at the House in the Wood. The States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow. Letters from Treves of the 12th Instant inform us, that the Day before, Baron Walderdorff,

Walderdorff, Great Dean of that Archbishoprick, was chosen Coadjutor to the Elector of Treves, with the unanimous Consent of the Chapter. Baron Reischach, who had assisted at the Election, as Imperial Commissary, was to set out from thence the 13th, and is expected here To-night, or To-morrow Morning.

Whitehall, July 20.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Colin Campbell, Mansfelt Cardonnel, Alexander Le Grand, and Joseph Tuder, Esqrs. together with Thomas Ogilvie, Esq; commonly called Lord Deskford, in the Room of George Lord Ross, deceased, to be Commissioners for the Receipt and Management of his Majesty's Customs and other Duties in Scotland, and the Duties on all Salt and Rock Salt imported, and upon Salt made there.

General Post Office, March 2, 1754.

Whereas the Post Boy bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn, by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
