HEREAS, on the 13th Instant, a Written Paper of Verses was dropt in the Market Place at Oxford, containing the most infamous and audacious Expressions of Treuson, Sedition, and Rebellion, and such false, wicked, and traiterous Aspersions of His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, as must raise the ulmost Indignation and Abhorrence in all those, who have any Sense of the Duty, and Gratitude, they so justly owe to His Majesty, or the lenst Regard to the Peace and Happiness of the Nation, under His Majesty's most mild and gracious Government: In order that the Author, or Authors, of the said presumptuous, seditious, and treasonable Paper, or any Person, or Persons, concerned in writing, publishing, or dropping the same, as aforesaid, may be discovered, and brought to the Punishment due to so high and beinous an Offence; These ! are, in His Majesty's Name, strictly to require and enjoin all His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to make diligent Search after the Author or Authors, Publisher or Pub-Ubers, of the said seditious, treasonable, infamous, and abominable Paper, and that, on discovering him, her, or them, they do immediately apprehend and seize the said Person, or Persons, and carry him, her, or them, before a proper Magistrate, that the Jaid Offender, or Offenders, may be prosecuted for the said Offence, according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And all His Majesty's loving-Subjects are bereby strictly charged, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover and apprehend the said Offenders or Offenders. And for the Encouregement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make such Discovery, His Majesty does, hereby, promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, or Persons, who shall discover the Author, or Authors, or Publisher, or Publishers, of the said detestable, treasonwhile and seditious Paper, or any of them, Joss' such Offender, or Offenders, be convitted thereof: For the Payment of which asoresaid Reward, His Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commis-

s of His Treasury.

Naples, June 25. The Queen advances happily in her Pregnancy; and as she is near her Time, publick Prayers are constantly put up in all our Churches for her Majesty's happy Delivery. The King has granted Leave to his Sicilian Subjects, to carry Corn to Malta: Notwithstanding which, we do not? find that the Differences between this Court and that Order are like to be foon reconciled; and the rather, as this Permission feems only meant as a Benefit to our own Subjects, and not as any Favour to the Maltese. The considerable Augmentations that have lately been made to the Troops of this Kingdom, have raised their Number, as 'tis given out, to 50000 Men; and 'tis even said, that a Scheme is laid before his Majesty for keeping up that Number, without burthening the Subjects with any new Taxes.

Florence, June 29. Count Richecourt, President of our Regency, is returned here from Pisa, where he has been, for some Time past, making Use, of the Waters of those Baths for the Recovery of his Health. M. Gaerani, Bishop of Colle, died on Thursday last, in his Diocese, of an Apoplectick Fit, in the 57th Year of his Age. We are informed by our last Letters from Milan, Cremona, Mantua, and other Places, that a confiderable Body of Imperial Troops is shortly expected in Austrian Lombardy, from her Imperial Majesty's Hereditary Countries in Germany, and that Count Apremont de Lynden has actually received Orders to prepare Quarters for them.

Prague, July 8. Field Marshal Count Brown, Commander in Chief of the Troops who are to assemble next Month in the Neighbourhood of Kolin, has already marked out the Ground for the Camp, and is now employed in causing the Magazines to be filled with Provisions and For-

rage for their Subsistance.
