HEREAS, on the 17th In-stant. a Weissen stant, a Written Paper of Verses was dropt in the Market Place at Oxford, containing the most infamous and audacious Expressions of Treason, Sedition, and Rebellion, and such false, wicked, and traiterous Aspersions of His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, as must raise the utmost Indignation and Abborrence in all those, who have any Sense of the Duty, and Gratitude, they so justly owe to His Majesty, or the least Regard to the Peace and Happiness of the Nation, under His Majesty's most mild and gracious Government: In order that the Author, or Authors, of the said presumptuous, seditious, and treasonable Paper, or any Person, or · Persons, concerned in writing, publishing, or dropping the same, as aforesaid, may be discovered, and brought to the Punishment due to so bigh and heinous an Offence; These are, in His Majesty's Name, strictly to require and enjoin all His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to make diligent Search after the Author or Authors, Publisher or Publisters, of the said seditious, treasonable, infamous, and abominable Paper, and that, on discovering him, her, or them, they do immediately apprehend and seize the said Person, or Persons, and carry him, her, or them, before a proper Magistrate, that the said Offender, or Offenders, may be proseculed for the said Offence, according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And all His Majesty's loving Subjects are bereby strictly charged, that they do use their utmost Endeavour's to discover and apprehend the said Offender, or Offenders, And for the Encoutagement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make such Discovery, His Majesty does, hereby, promile a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, or Persons, who shall discowet the Author, or Authors, or Publisher, of Publishers, of the said detestable, treasonable, and seditious Paper, or any of them, forus such Offender, or Offenders, he conmated thereof s For the Payment of which oforesaid Reward, His Majesty bath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commisfigures of His Treasury.

Petersbourg, July 16. The Empress set out last Thursday from Petershoff, to pass some Days at Czarkafelo. The Great Chancellot Count Bestuchest, the Count de Rasumossky, Hetman of the Cossacks in the Ukraine, General Apraxin, and divers foreign Ministers who followed the Court to Moscow, are returned here within these sew Days.

Naples, July 16. The Queen is so well recovered fince her Lying-in, that the Court proposes to leave Portici in a few Days, to spend the Remainder of the Summer at Caserta. The four Galleys, which returned lately into this Port to be refitted, and take in Provisions, are ordered to sail immediately to continue their Cruize against the Corsairs of Barbary.

Posnania, July 18. There has appeared for feveral Days past, in the Neighbourhood of Biala, an Estate belonging to Count Koloctzkowsky, a very great Swarm of Locusts, which have done an infinite Deal of Damage to the Fruits of the Earth; but the Inhabitants are uling their utmost Endeavours to destroy those

Prague, July 26. The Regiment of Foot of Wenceslas-Wallis arrived here last Saturday, where they are ordered to be garrisoned; they have been fince reviewed by General Fields Marshal Count Browne, who was extremely well satisfied with their good Appearance and Condition. In the Night between the 21st and 22d Instant, a Fire broke out in a House situated near the Shambles; but by timely Affistance it was prevented from spreading its Flames to the neighbouring Houses.

Venice, July 27. Last Thursday there was an extraordinary Assembly of the Senate, at which the Chevalier Nicolas Erizzo was appointed Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of France. The Count de Rosenberg arrived here Yesterday, in order to reside in Quality of Ambassador from their Imperial Majesties, in the room of the Marquis de Prie, who, upon

Hildesheim, July 27. Yesterday Morning a dreadful Fire broke out in the Village of Emmerke, situated about a League from this Place; and the Wind being high, the Flames communicated themselves from House to House with so much Rapidity, that, in the Space of sour Hours, the whole Village, which was very considerable, was reduced to Ashes, except the Church and sisteen Houses. It is impossible to express the Calamity to which the greatest Part of the Inhabitants are reduced by this deplorable Accident.

Bonn, August 4. The Elector our Sovereign, who went the Day before Yesterday from Poppelstorff to Augustusbourg, set out from thence Yesterday Morning for Uldingen, where his Serene Highness intends to stay five or six Days, in order to take the Diversion of Hunting the Wild Boar.

Hague, August 8. M. Calkoen, Minister Plenipotentiary from this Republick to the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, is arrived here from Dresden, and has had the Honour to be introduced to their Royal and Serene Highnesses, by whom he was very graciously received. He has since been in Conference with the President of the Assembly of the States General, and several other Members of the Government.
