

# The London Gazette.

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Dublin, October 1.

**T**hursday last His Grace the Lord Lieutenant went hence for Kilkenny, where he intends to continue for three weeks: The Council here have considered of a way for the raising 15000 Bullocks, to be sent over for the relief of the City of London, and a Committee are appointed to consider of a way for their speedy Transportation.

**Newcastle, October 4.** This day arrived an *Hamburger* from *Northbergen*, laden with Deales and Tar, leaving in that Harbor three or four *West-India* men, that had lately put in there.

**Plymouth, October 5.** Here is newly arrived a *Venetian* ship laden with Oyle and Currants, who taken formerly by the *Victory*, a private Man of War, was by him sent into *Falmouth* upon suspicion, and since cleared from thence.

**Weymouth, October 6.** Great guns have been heard from Sea the most part of this day, but as yet we know not upon what account: This morning the *Nonfush Ketch* arrived here from *Crusing*, but brings no news: that lying for the space of 24 hours together in the middle of the Channel, he neither saw nor heard of any sail that passed.

**Venice, Sept. 17.** Our Letters from *Dalmatia* informes us, that the condition of our affaires are in that posture to quit us from all apprehensions of the Enemies farther attempts this year, *Almiss*; being reinforced with fresh Men, and all sorts of necessaries: That the *Bassa* designed to command the Turkish forces against them, has lately dispatch a Courier to that Court, to require a greater power, he not being able to do any considerable service, with the small forces he already has: however our Soldiers keep good guards, and are exactly kept to duty, to avoid surprizes, especially the *Morlaques* who having lately defeated a party of 4000 Turks that lay in Ambuscado before *Mascar*, have reason to suspect something may be designed against them for a revenge, but the season of the year being near past for field service, and the Enemy in great wants, by reason of the scarcity that is amongst them of all Provisions, we are induced to believe, that nothing considerable will be this year attempted; yet the Senate not willing to give them encouragement by their security, has embarked four German Companies at *Palmanova*, which are suddenly to goe for *Dalmatia*, and issued out Commissions for the leavying 1700 Seamen to serve in the Gallies they intend in short time to put to Sea.

**Vienna, Septemb. 23.** The Princes and Provinces subject to this Empire, have generally resolved to use as much state, and make as glorious an appearance as is possible at the solemn Entry of the Emperess into this City: A great number of the principal Nobility and grand Personages of *Hungary*, intending to be present at the Solemnity; who, according to their Custom, intend to appear in great splendor; which doth not a little raise an Emulation in others, to vie with them in pomp and bravery.

**Rome, Sept. 23.** His Holiness has this week past through four fits of an Ague, which came to him regularly each day at the same hour, but have now left him; but the cause of them still continues, as generally does the dispair of his recovery. 'Tis confidently said, That his Holiness is now resolved for a Promotion of Cardinals, although the vacancies are not at present sufficient to satisfie the Crowns; and intends to make his solemn Declaration of it, as soon as his condition shall enable him to endure the troubles of that Ceremony.

The Ambassadors are much dissatisfied, that since *June* last they could never be admitted to any audience about their affairs; besides several Cardinals of the Squadron have given

his Holiness to understand, That if he continue thus retired from all business, they shall be forc'd to take some care for the ordering the affairs of the Church, and Government of the State.

Since this, the Pope has sent for the Governor *Borromeo*, who was (without the Formal assistance of the Ministers that use to attend him) admitted to a short audience, which at present perswades them he will again return to the Functions of his charge.

To-morrow Cardinal *Chisy*, intends with a numerous train of Bishops, and great personages, to take possession of the Arch-Priesthood of the Great Church of *St. Jean de Lateran*, conferred on him by his Holiness upon the death of Cardinal *Celonna*.

**Legorn, Sept. 28.** The *Genouese* having established an Ambassador at *Constantinople*, for the opening a Trade into the Turks Countreys, in pursuance of that design, sent out a very considerable fleet of Merchants under the Convoy of Four Men of War richly laden for *Smyrna*, and the adjacent places, who were met within the *Arches* by the *Venetian* fleet, and arrested upon pretence of carrying contraband Goods, but (as we are informed by a ship newly arrived from the *Levant*) the *Venetians* have since taken out all their Moneys and Merchandises, to the value of Three Millions of Crowns; which (if true) will put a great stop, if not an end to that Trade.

**Genova, Septemb. 29.** The Courier *Burattino* dispatche from *Rome* to her Imperial Majesty, with a Brief from his Holiness, and Letters from the Cardinal *Chisy*, both of them excusing his Eminency from his intended Legation, is returned much dissatisfied; neither the Brief, nor the Letters, finding the acceptance he expected: The *Sieur Tavriani* Bishop of *Como*, to whom the Dispatches were addressed, in vain endeavouring the Cardinals Apology to *Don Lays Ponce de Leon*, who with the rest of the *Spaniards* expound it rather to proceed from his inclination to the French Faction, than the Popes indispofition; returning the Courier rather with reproaches, than any formal answer.

All things are putting into order for the solemn and publick Entry of her Imperial Majesty, which ended, she intends speedily to part thence for *Vienna*, where she is expected with much impatience: All the Officers of her Household are now at *Trente*; the Cardinal *de Harach*, and the Prince *Dietrichstein* upon their way towards her.

The greatest part of the Spanish Gallies are arrived at *Naples*, particularly the Squadrons of *Seigneur Gianettino Doriz*, the *Marquis de Bayonna*, and the *Duke de Ferrandinez*; who as soon as they are Re-fitted, intend for *Barcellona*, to Transport some Foot raised there by the Viceroy *Don Pedro d' Arragon* for the service against *Portugal*.

**Hamburg, Sept. 29.** The Treaties between the *Swedes*, and the Town of *Bremen*, are wholly broken off, and the several Deputies returned; those of *Bremen* being very civilly treated in the *Swedes* Leagues, while they came to take their leave of Count *Wrangle*: So that all probabilities of reconciliation are vanished, and the war in all probability to proceed vigorously. The *Swedes*, every day growing more numerous, keep their Posts with that vigilancy, that the City have but little hopes of receiving any succors. The *Bremers* sometimes do execution upon them with their great Guns, but have not of late made any sallies.

The Senate within the Town is reduced to sixteen persons onely, for the more secret carrying on of their designs: The number of the *Swedes* forces before it, is now said, their Regiments are few, but all of them full, the *Feldt-Heres* Regi-

ment of Guards being full 2000. Some additional Horse are come to *Wisnar*, and a ship arriv'd here with 500 Foot: The Horse were immediately ordered to march for the *Elbe*; the *Wisnar* Foot are to be drawn out, and to follow them, and the new raised 500 to lie there in Garrison. The great Guns that lately pass'd by upon the *Elbe*, were yesterday sent to *Stadt*, and six Mortar-pieces to follow.

*Paris*, Octob. 1. We are inform'd by Letters from *Savo*, that the Duke of the Countrey has deputed several persons to the Cantons of *Zurick*, *Berne* and *Friburg*, to require satisfaction for several injuries done him by their Republicque, which if refused, 'tis conceived he intends to seek it by force, having all things in readines for that purpose, and already prohibited Commerce with them. On the other side, the Magistrates of *Geneva*, against whom (as they suppose) all this design is fram'd, have written to all the Protestant Cantons to be in readines, if occasion be to make their defence.

Great care is taken by this Court for our Manufactures, particularly that of Points and Bone-laces; which his Majesty, with the Grandees of the Court hath been to visit in the *Rue Quinquempoix*, and is much satisfied with the great variety and excellent workmanship of them; and another Magazine for the same Manufacture is to be encouraged at *Sedan*. And care is taken for the discouraging of Foreign Manufactures, which are seized upon by the Magistrate, wheresoever they can be discovered. Mounseur d'Offemont Son to the late Lieutenant *Civil*, is by his Majesty promoted to his Fathers charge, and will speedily take possession of it.

The Duke de *Verneil* is gone to take possession of the Government of *Languedoc* confer'd on him, having sent his Train and Family before him for *Carcaffone*, where he intends to reside.

*Ditto*, Octob. 8. His Majesty hath made several Magazines upon the Frontiers of *Flanders* and *Picardy*, where he has ordered great quantities of Hay and Oats to be laid in, which gives some jealousies of some design upon those parts, and it seems confirm'd from the new Levies of Horse we are of late making.

We are inform'd from *Brest*, That the Fleet under the Duke de *Beaufort* was so furiously lost by the late storm, and scatter'd, that the Admiral was left alone without any other company, but one Fireship. The *Ruby* fell into the hands of the English; the *Ronan* hardly escaping, endeavored to enter the *Fosse* at *Mardike*; but not having water enough, she was forced to go forwards for *Zealand*. The *Bourbon* and *Mazarine* hardly escaping the English, got into *Havre de Grace* much torn and shattered with a fight they had for some time with five English: And the *Dragon* as much damnified, escap'd into *Diepe*, wearing some marks of the English shot. The *Vendosme* with two others, and one Fireship rejoyn'd the Admiral, after a long separation.

*Dantzick*, Octob. 1. Letters from *Warsaw* of Septemb. 27. tell us, That some few dayes since the two Deputies were there arriv'd from the Governour of *Cracovia*, to complain against the Generals *Potocki*, and the present Crown Marshal *Sobieski*, for the ill orders of the people under their command: And great complaints have been likewise made to the King from great Poland, of the Insolencies of the Army in those parts. The Governour of *Radom* has lately received his dispatch, which does not at all please *Lubomirski*; who is suddenly expected at Court, to receive satisfaction in his own Affairs.

*Mayence*, Octob. 4. The Ambassadors from *France* and *Sweden*, though continually expected, are not yet arriv'd at *Heibrun*, the place of Treaty; nor are the Deputies from the two Electors, or their Allies, yet named: His Highness the Elector *Palatine* has lately order'd the raising of two

new Troops of Horse; one of them under the Command of the Prince his Son, the other under Monsieur *Vax Degenfeld*.

Orders are likewise issued out, That every Cavalier through the Court, every Counsellor, and Professors; as likewise all Ministers and Officers of the Chancery; and generally all persons of Condition, shall furnish out one Horsemans apiece, for the carrying on of the War.

'Tis said also that Reprisals are given out against the Bishop of *Spyre*, whose Countrey has already suffered infinitely by this Quarrel.

The *Lorrainers* continue still their Rapines and Spoile, and render themselves very terrible to the Inhabitants; they returned yesterday from towards *Niderolme*, well laden with plunder, and 60 good Horses.

*Bruges*, October 17. Buats execution being past, without the content of *Zealand*, extremely distresses that Province, and much widens their differences with *Holland*: The late stormes have besides the great loss suffer'd by the wreck of the rich *East-India* ship, driven several others of them to Sea, of which we have yet no account, divers other Merchants being cast away, and most of them forst to cut down their Masts: On Wednesday last five or six men of War came into *Zealand*, and 'tis said the greatest part of the Fleet are gone to their several stations, except only such as are intended for the security of their Trade.

*Hague*, Octob. 14. Our last Letters from the Fleet, are full of the great dangers our Fleet have run through, by reason of the violence of the late Tempest: What damage they received, is not yet fully known; our ships have been much scatter'd, and some of them burnt: The Lieutenant Admiral *Bankart* having been long separated, is again return'd to the Fleet, which makes us not despair of hearing news of the rest of them.

This morning the Pensionary de *Witte* is returned from Sea, giving an account of the state of our affairs there, and to morrow the States of *Holland* and *West-Friesland* are to meet.

Our people are generally impatient after the issue of the Mediation endeavor'd by the *Swedes* Ambassador, being infinitely tired out by the War, and impoverish'd through the general decay and want of Trade.

*Amsterdam*, Octob. 15. The season of the year, and the extraordinary Tempests at Sea, have forced our Fleet to think of returning to their several Ports; some of them being already come into the *Macs*, others into the *Texel*, and several others have been seen before the *Uly*: So that, we suppose the whole is laid up for this winter, except 25 under the command of *Enne Doedes*, and Commander *Vander Zaen*, who have order to continue at Sea for the security of our Merchants, who have not a little suffer'd by Storms. A *Rottterdam* Gallion speaks of many great Wrecks he saw at Sea, besides six or seven ships on the Coast off of *Cartwicke*, who had all of them lost their Masts. Many Merchants ships were likewise much damnified about the *Uly*, and of the *East-India* ship that was unfortunately lost in the Mouth of the Port, all the Goods are lost, onely about 22 of her men saved, with one Indian Woman; who by her skill in swimming, saved six or seven men that had otherwise perished.

*Plymouth*, Octob. 7. On the fifth instant, arriv'd here a Vessel of *Dartmouth* bound homewards, laden with Oyls from *Portugal*. Yesterday an *Hamburgher*, and two *Ostenders* came in from *Rochelle*, laden with Salt and new Wines. They left *Rochelle* eight dayes since, and about an 100 Sail of Merchants loading there with Wines, Brandy and Salt, &c. bound for *Havre de Grace*, *Diepe*, and other places upon those Coasts.

*Whitehall*, October 10. This day according to His Majesties Proclamation, was very Solemnly kept the day of Fasting and Humiliation, in consideration of the late dreadful Fire in the City of *London*, Doctor *Sandcroft* Dean of *St. Pauls*, Preaching here before His Majesty. Serb Lord Bishop of *Exeter* before the House of Lords in the Abbey Church; and Mr. *Stilling-Fleet*, and Mr. *Frampton* before the House of Commons at *St. Margarets* in *Westminster*.
