Dublin, October 1.

Hurlday last His Grace the Lord Lieutenant went hence for Kilkenny, where he intends to continue for three weeks: The Councel here have confilered of a way for the raifing 15000 Bullocks, to be fent over for the relief of the City of London, and a Committee are appointed to consider of a way for their speedy Transportation.

Newcastle, October 4. This day arrived an Hamburgher from Northbergen, laden with Deeles and Tar, leaving in that Harbor three or four West India men, that had lately

put in there.

Plymouth, October 5. Here is newly arrived a Venetian ship lagen with Oyle and Currants, who taken former ly by the Victory, a private Man of War, was by him fent into Falmouth upon suspition, and fince cleared from thence.

B'emouth, October 6. Great guns have been heard from Sea the most part of this day, but as yet we know not upon what account: This morning the Nonsuch Kouch arrived here from Crufing, but brings no news: that lying for the pace of 24 houres together in the middle of the Channel, he neither saw nor heard of any sail that passed.

Venice, Sept. 17. Our Letters frem Dalmatia informes us, that the condition of our affaires are in that posture to quit us from all apprehensions of the Enemies farther attempts this year, Almiss: being reinsorced with fresh Men, and all sorts of necessaries: That the Bassa designed to command the Turkish forces against them, has lately dispatche a Courrier to that Court, to require a greater power, he not being able to do any considerable service, with the small forces he already has: however our Soldiers keep good guards, and are exactly kept to duty, to avoid surprises, especially the Morlaques who having lately defeated a party of 4000 Turks that lay in Ambuscado before Mascar, have reason to suspect something may be deligned against them for a revenge, but the season of the year being neer past for field service, and the Enemy in great wants, by reason of the scarcity that is among it them of all Provisions, we are induced to believe, that nothing considerable will be this year attempted ; yet the Senate not willing to give them encouragement by their focurity, has embarqued four German Companies at Palmanova, which are suddenly to goe for Dalmaria, and iffued out Commissions for the leavying 1700 Seamen to serve in the Gallies they intend in short time to put to Sea.

Vienna, Septemb. 23. The Princes and Provinces sub-Ject to this Empire, have generally resolved to use as much state, and make as glorious an appearance as is possible at the solemn Entry of the Emprels into this City: A great number of the Principal Nobility and grand Personages of Hungary, intending to be p. elene at the Solemnity; who, according to their Custom, intend to appear in great Iplendor; which doth not 2 little raile an Æmulation in others, to Vie with them in

pomp and bravery.

Rome, Sept. 23. His Holiness has this week past through four fits of an Ague, which came to him regularly each day at the same hour, but have now left him; but the cause of them still continues, as generally does the dispair of his recovery. Tis confidently said, That his Holine's is now resolved for a Promotion of Cardinals, although the vacancies are not at Present sufficient to satisfie the Crowns; and intends to make his solemn Declaration of it, as soon as his condition shall enable him to endure the troubles of that Ceremony.

The Ambassadors are much distatisfied, that since June lak they could never be admitted to any audience about their affairs; besides several Cardinals of the Squadron have given his Holiness to understand, That if he continue thus retired from all business, they shall be forc'd to take some care for the ordering the affairs of the Church, and Government of the State.

Since this, the Pope has fent for the Governor Borromeon who was (without the Formal affiftance of the Ministers that use to attend him) admitted to a short audience, which at prefent perswades them he will again return to the Functions of

his charge.

To morrow Cardinal Chify, intends with a numerous train of Bishops, and great personages, to take possession of the Arch-Priesthood of the Great Church of St. Fean de Lateran, conferred on him by his Holiness upon the death of Cardinal

Legorn, Sept. 28. The Genouese having established an Ambassador at Constantinople for the opening a Trade into the Turks Countreys, in pursuance of that delign, sent out a very considerable fleet of Merchants under the Convoy of Four Men of War richly laden for Smyrna, and the adjacent places; who were met within the Arches by the Venetianfleet, and arrested upon pretence of carrying counterband Goods, but (as we are informed by a thip newly arrived from the Levant) the Venerians have fince taken out all their Moneys and Merchandiles, to the value of Three Millions of Crowns; which (if true) will put a great stop, if not an end to that Trade.

Genoua, Septemb. 29. The Courrier Burattino dispatche from Rome to her Imperial Majesty, with a Brief from his Holiness, and Letters from the Cardinal Chift, both of them excusing his Eminency from his intended Legation, is returned much diffarished; neither the Brief, nor the Letters, finding the acceptance he expected : The Sieur Turriani Bishop of Como, to whom the Dispatches were addressed, in vain endeavouring the Cardinals Apology to Don Laws Ponce de Leon, who with the rest of the Spaniards expound it rather to proceed from his inclination to the French Faction, than the Popes indisposition; returning the Courrier rather with reproaches, than any formal answer.

All things are putting into order for the toleran and publick Entry of her Imperial Majesty, which ended, the intends specdily to part thence for Vienna, where the is expected with much imparience : All the Officers of her Houshole are now at Trente; the Cardinal de Harach, and the Prince Dictrichfiein upon their way towards her.

The greatest part of the Spanish Gallies are arrived at Naples, particu'arly the Squadrons of Szigneur Gianettino Doris, the Marqueis de Bayonna, and the Duke de Ferrandine; who as foon as they are Re-fitted, intend for Barcellona, to Transport some Foot raised there by the Viceroy Don Pedro

d' Arragon for the service against Portugal.

Hamburgh, Seps. 29. The Treaties between the Swedes, and the Town of Bremen, are wholly broken of, and the feveral Deputies returned; those of Bremen being very civilly treated in the Swedes Leaguer, while they came to take their leave of Count Wrangle: So that all probabilities of reconciliation are vanished, and the war in all probability to proceed vigorously. The Swedes, every day growing more numerous, keep their Posts with that vigilancy, that the City have but little hopes of receiving any succors. The Bremers sometimes do execution upon them with their great Guns, but have not of late made any Sallies.

The Senate within the Town is reduced to fixteen persons onely, for the more secret carrying on of their designs. The number of the Swedes forces before it, is now said; their Regiments are few, but all of them full, the Feldi-Heres Regi-

Some additional Horse are come to Wismar, and a ship arrived here with 500 Foot: The Horse were immediately ordered to march for the Elbe, the Wismar Foot are to be drawn our, and to sollow them, and the new raised 500 to lie there in Gerrison. The great Gans that lately passed by upon the Elbe, were yesterday sent to

Stadt, and fix Mortar-pieces to follow.

Paris, Offob. 1. We are informed by Letters from savoy, that the Duke of the Countrey has deputed feveral perfons to the Cantons of Zurick, Berne and Friburg, to equire fatisfaction for feveral injuries done him by their Republique, which if refused, its conceived he intends to feek it by force, having all things in readiness for that purpose, and already prohibited Commerce with them. On the other file, the Magistrates of Geneva, against whom (as they suppose) all this design is framed, have written to all the Protestant Can-

cons to be in readines, if occasion be to make their dest uce.

The Duke de Verneil is gone to take possession of the Government of Languedoc conserved on him, having sent his Train and Family before him for Careassone, where he intends to reside.

Ditto, Octob.8. His Majesty hath made several Magazines upon the Frontiers of Flanders and Picardy, where he has ordered great quantities of Hey and Octors be laid in, which gives some jealousies of some design upon those parts, and it seems confirmed from the new Levies of Horse we are of late making.

We are informed from Brest, That the Fleet under the Duke de Beaufort was so suriously lost by the late storm, and scattered, that the Admiral was lest alone without any other company, but one Fireship. The Ruby sell into the hands of the English; the Rouan hardly escaping, endeavored to enter the Fosse at Mardine; but not having water enough, she was sorced to go sorwards for Zealand. The Bourbon and Mararine hardly escaping the English, got into Haure de Grace much torn and shattered with a sight they had for some time with sive English: And the Dragon as much damnished, escaped into Diepe, wearing some marks of the English shot. The Vendosme with two others, and one Fireship rejoyned the Admiral, after a long separation.

new Troops of Horse; one of them under the Command of the Prince his Son, the other under Monseigneur Fax Degenfield.

The Lorrainers continue fill their Rapines and Spoile, and render themselves very terrible to the Inhabitants; they returned veiterday from towards Niderolme, well laden with plunder, and 60 good Horses.

Bruges, October 17. Buats execution being pass, without the consent of Zealand, extreamly distrisses that Province, and much widens their differences with Holland: The late stormes have besides the great loss suffered by the wreck of the rich East-India ship, driven several others of them to Sea, of which we have yet no account, divers other Methants being cast away, and most of them forst to cut down their Masts: On Wednesday last sive or six men of Warcame into Zealand, and his said the greatest part of the Fleet are gone to their several stations, except only such as are intended for the security of their Trade.

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Hague, Officher 4. Our left Letters from the Fleet, are full of the great dangers our Fleet have run through, by reason of the violence of the late Tompest: What camage they received, is not yet fully known that thips have been much scattered, or threshive electrically, whereof many are ship missing, and two of them have. The Lieutenant Armiral Bankart having been long departed, is again temped to the Fleet, which missing us not despair of hearing news of the rest of them.

This morning the Pensionary de Witte is returned from Sea, giving an account of the state of our affairs there, and to morrow the States of Holland and West-Friesland are to meet.

Our people are generally impatient after the issue of the Mediation endeavored by the Swedes Ambassador, being infinitely tired out by the War, and impoverished through the general decay and want of Trade.

Amsterdam, Octob. 15. The season of the year, and the extraordinary Tempests at Sea, have forced our Fleet to think of returning to their feveral Ports; some of them being already come into the Macs, others into the Texel, and feveral others kave been feen before the uly : 90 that, we suppose the whole is laid up for this winter, except 25 under the command of Enne Doedes, and Commander Vander Zaen, who have order to continue at Sea for the security of our Merchans, who s have not a little suffered by Rorms. A Rosterdam Galliot speaks of many great Wrecks he faw at Sen, befices fix or leven ships on the Coaste off of Catwicke, who kad all of them loft their Masts. Many Merchants ships were likewife much damnified about the Uly, and of the East India thip that was unfortunately loft in the Mouth of the Port, all the Goods are loft, onely about 22 of her men faved, without Indian Woman; who by her skill in swimming, saved fix or s seven men that had otherwise perished.

Plymouth, Octob. 7. On the fifth instant, arrived here a Vessel of Dartmouth bound homewards, laden with Ovis from Portugal. Yesterday an Hamburgher, and two Oseaders came in f. om Rochelle, laden with Salt and new Wines. They less Rochelle eight dayes since, and about an 100 Sail of Merchants loading there with Wines, Brandy and Sait, &c. bound for Haure de Grace, Diepe, and other places upon those Coasts.

Whitehall, October 10. This day according to His Mijesties Proclamation, was very Sclemnly kept the day of Fathing and Humiliation, in confideration of the late dreads Fire in the City of London, Doctor Sandcrost Dean of St. Pauls, Preaching here before His Mijesty.
