**W**HEREAS, on the 17th Instant, a Written Paper of Verses was dropt in the Market Place at Oxford, containing the most infamous and audacious Expressions of Treason, Sedition, and Rebellion, and such false, wicked, and traitorous Aspersions of His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, as must raise the utmost Indignation and Abhorrence in all those, who have any Sense of the Duty, and Gratitude; they so justly owe to His Majesty, or the least Regard to the Peace and Happiness of the Nation, under His Majesty's most mild and gracious Government: In order that the Author; or Authors, of the said presumptuous, seditious, and treasonable Paper, or any Person, or Persons, concerned in writing, publishing, or dropping the same, as aforesaid, may be discovered, and brought to the Punishment due to so high and heinous an Offence; These are, in His Majesty's Name, strictly to require and enjoin all His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to make diligent Search after the Author or Authors, Publisher or Publishers, of the said seditious, treasonable, infamous, and abominable Paper, and that, on discovering him, her, or them, they do immediately apprehend and seize the said Person, or Persons, and carry him, her, or them, before a proper Magistrate, that the said Offender, or Offenders, may be prosecuted for the said Offence, according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And all His Majesty's loving Subjects are hereby strictly charged, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover and apprehend the said Offender, or Offenders. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make such Discovery; His Majesty does, hereby, promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, or Persons, who shall discover the Author, or Authors, or Publisher, or Publishers, of the said detestable, treasonable, and seditious Paper, or any of them, or as such Offender, or Offenders, be convicted thereof: For the Payment of which aforesaid Reward, His Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of His Treasury.

**Gibraltar, July 4.** Some Advices received here mention, that the Prince, who commands the Southern Provinces on the Coast of Barbary, has declared War against the English, and all other Nations, except Denmark. Commodore Edgcumbe, who is now here, designs to sail for Tetuan, with the first Westerly Wind.

**Naples, July 23.** The Queen is so well recovered since her Lying-in, as to appear again in Publick. We are assured that the Differences which have for some Time subsisted between this Court and the Order of Malta are in a fair Way of being adjusted to the Satisfaction of both Parties. We are informed by a Vessel that arrived Yesterday in this Port from the Coast of Sicily, that his Majesty has named Mess. Cusani and Testa, one to the Archbishoprick of Palerme, and the other to that of Mont-real.

**Genoa, July 27.** By a Felucca that arrived in this Port on the 23d Instant we are informed, that within these few Days past, three armed Chebecks and two Gallies sail'd out of the Road of Toulon, for the Coast of Provence, where they are ordered to cruize, to protect the Merchant Ships from the Corsairs of Barbary, that have been for some Time hovering about that Coast.

**Turin, July 27.** Frequent Councils are held at Court in Relation to the Measures that are proper to be taken to secure the Tranquility of Italy. The Count de Fuentes, the new Ambassador from Spain, accompanied by his Lady, and attended with a numerous Retinue, arrived here last Monday Night; his Excellency will immediately have his first Audiences of the King and the rest of the Royal Family. The Count de Sade, his Predecessor, is making Preparations in order to return to his Court.

**Rome, July 27.** Last Week six Bailifs and a Lieutenant, who lately arrived here from Turin, sat out on their Return thither, with a Pilgrim, who, after having committed a most barbarous Murder there, took Refuge in this City. This Government consented to deliver him up, agreeable to a mutual Convention for this Purpose between the two Courts. M. Brancifort is set out for Venice to take charge of that Nunciature. On the 14th Instant, the Cardinals Serbelloni and Enriquez made their publick Entry into this City on Horseback, attended by the Gentlemen of the College of Cardinals, those of the Foreign Ministers, Princes, &c. and were, by Cardinal Valenti, introduced to an Audience of the Pope at the Quirinal, from whom, on the 18th, they received the Cardinal Hats, and on the 25th were invested, the former with the Title of St. Stefano Rotondo, and the latter with that of St. Eusebio. The Pope, for the Benefit and Encouragement of Commerce, has approved the new Plan for re-

establishing



establishing the Silk Manufactures in the Ecclesiastical State, having caused a printed Institution to be published, whereby he prescribes the Method for that Purpose; and has appointed M. Lazzarine to be Superintendant of that new Branch of Commerce.

*Bologna, July 30.* Cardinal Malvezzi, our new Archbishop, took Possession, on the 22d Instant, of the Archiepiscopal Palace; and his Eminence gave, the next Day, a magnificent Entertainment, at which were present divers Persons of the greatest Distinction of this City. M. Archinto, who has resided for several Years at the Court of the King of Poland Elector of Saxony, in Quality of Nuncio from the Pope, passed through here last Week, on his Return to Rome, of which City he has been lately appointed Governor by the Pope.

*Prague, July 30.* In the Course of this Month divers Regiments, that are to form the Camp at Kollin, have passed through this City, amongst which are the Archduke Joseph's Regiment of Dragoons; and the Regiments of Foot of Henry and Leopold Daun, Francis de Lorraine, and Joseph Esterhazy. These Regiments are all new clothed, and make a very fine Appearance.

*Florence, Aug. 2.* On the 28th past Count Finochietti, Minister from the King of Naples to the Republick of Venice, arrived here from Rome on his Way to Venice. From Lombardy we are informed, that the Duke of Parma, jointly with the Republick of Genoa, is actually making a new Road, fit for Carriages, from Sestri di Levante to Parma, by the Mountain called Cento Croci, which will open a convenient Passage from the Coasts of Genoa into that State.

*Venice, Aug. 3.* M. Erizzo, who was a few Days since appointed Ambassador from this Republick to the Court of France, having received his last Instructions, is preparing to set out for that Court. The Count de Finochietti arrived here last Week, to reside in Quality of Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Two Sicilies. In the Night between the 23d and 24th past, six Vessels sailed from this Port, laden with Provisions for the Subsistence of our Troops in the Isle of Corfou.

*Genoa, Aug. 5.* Letters of the 30th past from Bastia advise, that the Commissary General being apprehensive that the Malecontents may very soon march against Part of the Suburbs of Bastia, had provided the exterior Fortifications with every Thing necessary to defend the Place, which the Malecontents have a Design against. Orders are given to the Marquis Doria, who is appointed Commissary General, and to succeed the Marquis de Grimaldi, to depart To-morrow, and two Galleys are to be ready to carry him over.

*Madrid, Aug. 5.* M. Acciaoli, who is going to reside as Nuncio at Lisbon, in the Room of Cardinal Tempi, arrived here last Week in his Way to that Place; and had the Honour of being presented to their Catholick Majesties, Prince Jaci, Ambassador from the King of Naples, is expected here in a few Days. The last Courier from Lisbon brought an Account, that the Queen Dowager of Portugal was something better, though her Majesty was still thought to be

in a dangerous Way. By Letters from Cadiz of the 30th past, we have Advice, that four Portuguese Men of War, that have been cruising against the Moors, have anchored at the Mouth of that Bay, and that Sr Don Juan de Braganza is on Board one of them. The same Letters mention, that Don Julian de Arriaga, lately appointed Secretary of State for the Department of the Marine, set out, on the 29th of last Month, for this Place.

*Nuremberg, Aug. 7.* Last Saturday, about Four in the Afternoon, we had a violent Storm, accompanied with Hail and terrible Claps of Thunder. The Lightning fell upon the Church of St. Sebastian, and broke to Pieces one of the principal Beams that supports the Roof of that Edifice; but providentially it did no other Damage. The Body of Baron de Diemar, General of Horse in their Imperial Majesties Service, was carried a few Days ago to Sautendorff, and interred with all Military Honours.

*Amsterdam, Aug. 14.* Last Monday Night, about Eleven o'Clock, a Fire broke out in the French Theatre, and the Wind being high, the Flames spread themselves with such Rapidity to the different Parts of that Edifice, which was built of Wood, that, notwithstanding all the Assistance that was given, it was entirely burnt to the Ground.

*Hague, Aug. 15.* Divers Foreign Ministers have been in Conference with the President of the Assembly of the States General. The young Baron de Torck took this Day the usual Oaths in the said Assembly, in Quality of Bailiff of Maestricht, in the room of his Father, who has resigned that Employment.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
