**W**HEREAS, on the 17th Instant, a Written Paper of Verses was dropt in the Market Place at Oxford, containing the most infamous and audacious Expressions of Treason, Sedition, and Rebellion, and such false, wicked, and traitorous Aspersions of His Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, as must raise the utmost Indignation and Abhorrence in all those, who have any Sense of the Duty, and Gratitude, they so justly owe to His Majesty, or the least Regard to the Peace and Happiness of the Nation, under His Majesty's most mild and gracious Government: In order that the Author, or Authors, of the said presumptuous, seditious, and treasonable Paper, or any Person, or Persons, concerned in writing, publishing, or dropping the same, as aforesaid, may be discovered, and brought to the Punishment due to so high and heinous an Offence; These are, in His Majesty's Name, strictly to require and enjoin, all His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, and all other Civil Magistrates whatsoever, to make diligent Search after the Author or Authors, Publisher or Publishers, of the said seditious, treasonable, infamous, and abominable Paper, and that, on discovering him, her, or them, they do immediately apprehend and seize the said Person, or Persons, and carry him, her, or them, before a proper Magistrate, that the said Offender, or Offenders, may be prosecuted for the said Offence, according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And all His Majesty's loving Subjects, are hereby strictly charged, that they do use their utmost En-

deavours to discover and apprehend the said Offender, or Offenders. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and industrious in their Endeavours to make such Discovery, His Majesty does, hereby, promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, or Persons, who shall discover the Author, or Authors, or Publisher, or Publishers, of the said detestable, treasonable, and seditious Paper, or any of them, so as such Offender, or Offenders, be convicted thereof: For the Payment of which aforesaid Reward, His Majesty hath given the necessary Orders to the Lords Commissioners of His Treasury.

**Lisbon, July 16.** The Navigation of this Kingdom has met with no Interruption from the Barbary Corsairs, since the Squadron of Men of War, under the Command of Commodore Brito, has been at Sea on a Cruize against those Pyrates. We are informed, that the St. Anne, which sailed from hence the 26th of last Month for Goa, is cast away; and that her Cargo, which was very considerable, is all lost.

**Gibraltar, July 18** It having been published here, that the Emperor of Morocco's Son, who commands the whole Southern Coast from Sallee to Cape Mow, has declared War against the English; Orders have been given, that Part of His Majesty's Squadron, under the Command of Commodore Edgcomb, should forthwith repair to that Coast, for the Protection of the British Trade.

**Naples, July 30.** The King, who was some Days ago seized with a violent Fever, is now perfectly recovered. We are assured, that the Differences between this Court, and the Order of Malta, are on the Point of being adjusted, and that the main Articles are already agreed to. 'Tis said that our armed Chebecks took last Week, in the Seas of Tuscany, an Algerine Chebeck of eight Guns.

**Algier, July 31.** On the 29th Instant arrived here, in the Phoenix Man of War, Stanhope Aspinwall, Esq; His Britannick Majesty's Consul, and the next Day had his Audience of the Dey.

**Naples, Aug. 6.** On Friday the 2d Instant the Queen went to Chapel for the first Time since her Lying-in, where her Majesty was attended by all the Ladies of Honour, and afterwards dined in Publick, as usual. There was a great Appearance of the Nobility on this Occasion. The 3d Instant being the Name-Day of the King of Poland, there was likewise a numerous Appearance of the Nobility, &c. at Court in their richest Habits.

**Milan, Aug. 8.** The Duke of Modena is expected here by the 20th Instant, the greatest Part of his Highness's Baggage being already arrived. The Duties upon Tobacco in this Dutchy are farmed out to a Society of Gentlemen, in Consideration of their paying a certain Sum annually into the Chamber of Finances; and even the Houses of Ecclesiasticks are not exempt from being searched by the Officers of this Society, in Case it is suspected that Tobacco, for which the Duty has not been paid, is concealed in them.

**Madrid, Aug. 12.** Yesterday their Catholick Majesties had the Satisfaction to receive Advice, by a Courier from Lisbon, that the Queen Dowager of Portugal was so much better, as to be thought entirely out of Danger. Prince Jaci, the Neapolitan Ambassador, is returned hither from a Tour, which he had Leave to make, on his private Affairs, to Naples; and the Duke de St. Elizabeth, who has resided here during his Absence, with the Character of

Minister Plenipotentiary, is preparing to leave this Place. The King has been pleased to appoint the Marquis de Croix, Lieutenant-General of his Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Province of Andalusia. Monsignor Caraccioli, the Pope's Nuncio, died here a few Days ago.

**Paris, Aug. 16.** We have received Advice, that the Squadron, which sailed from this Kingdom some Time ago for the East-Indies, put in at the Island of Saint Jago, one of the Cape Verde Islands, from whence they sailed on the 6th of April last, for the Place of their Destination.

**Brussels, Aug. 19.** On Wednesday Morning last Prince Charles of Lorraine, our Governor General, went to Mechlin, in order to see some large Pieces of Artillery which have been lately cast at the Arsenal. His Highness having resolved to meet his Sister at Cologne, has ordered all his Equipage to be forthwith got ready for that Purpose.

**Hague, Aug. 22.** Yesterday our Lords the States of this Province opened their Assembly, and this Morning renewed their Deliberations. The Deputies from the States of Guelderland, who came here to execute a Commission of Importance with her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and who have since had a private Audience of her Royal Highness for that Purpose, were Yesterday splendidly entertained at Dinner by Field Marshal the Duke of Brunswick Wolfenbuttel.

**Paris, Aug. 24.** Yesterday Morning about Eight o'Clock, the Dauphiness was delivered of a Prince, to whom his Most Christian Majesty has given the Title of Duc de Berry.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
