*Lisbon, August 23.*

**T**HE Body of the late Queen, after lying in State for some Days in the Great Hall of the Palace, is interred in the Church belonging to the Convent of the barefooted Carmelites. The Fleet from Fernambuco, consisting of 12 Ships, is safe arrived at the Mouth of the Tagus with a very valuable Cargoe. We have received Advice, that our Men of War, commanded by Don Juan da Costa de Brito, being on a Cruize on the Coast of Algarves, fell in with two African Corsairs, off Aveyro, and attacked them with such Success, that they soon sunk one, and made themselves Masters of the other, which had 32 Pieces of Cannon, and 110 Men on board.

*Petersbourg, Aug. 30.* Her Imperial Majesty has ordered, that for the Future no Traveller shall be obliged to pay any Toll or Duty for passing either of the several Bridges from hence to Schlüsselberg, or those from Narva to Jambourg.

*Warsaw, Sept. 7.* By Letters received from the different Palatinates of this Kingdom we are informed, that the Dietines of Kalisch, Plocko, Troki, Minsko, Czernichow, Bracklaw, Pinsko, Lemberg, Przemiſlaw, Sanocker, and some others, have proved unsuccessful, having broke up without coming to any Choice of Deputies to the General Diet; and particularly at Brzeck and Lemberg, the Disputes ran so high, as to end in the Effusion of Blood. Yesterday three Highwaymen were executed here, for having robbed some Jew Merchants of 1200 Crowns on their Way from hence to Leipſick.

*Turin, Sept. 7.* Publick Prayers are put up in all the Churches of this City for the happy Delivery of the Dutchess of Savoy, who is now near her Time.

*Toulon, Sept. 8.* The Frigats the Topaz and Thetis, which made Part of the Squadron under the Command of M. de la Galiffonniere, that put to Sea some Months ago, returned into Port the 29th of last Month, and are now refitting. And the Frigats the Nymph and Hermione are likewise daily expected, in order to be laid up;

which shews the Report of their being gone to the East Indies, to be without Foundation.

*Stockholm, Sept. 9.* We learn by Express, that the King and Queen arrived the 27th of last Month at Lunden, the Capital of Scania, and were received with great Demonstrations of Joy by the Inhabitants. In their Majesties Passage by Landscreon, they performed the Ceremony of laying the first Stone of a new magnificent Church that is going to be erected there.

*Vienna, Sept. 11.* The Archdukes Joseph and Charles, and the three eldest Archdutchesses, are to set out To-morrow Morning for Hollitsch, in order to meet their Imperial Majesties, who were expected there as Yesterday.

*Breslau, Sept. 12.* The King arrived here last Monday Morning, and was soon after complimented thereupon by a great Number of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, several of whom were afterwards admitted to his Table. On Tuesday his Majesty reviewed the Regiment of Foot of Mutcephal; after which he dined in Publick with some Princes and several General Officers, and in the Evening performed the Ceremony of investing Lieutenant General Baron Lestewitz with the Ensigns of the Order of the Black Eagle.

*Dresden, Sept. 17.* The Hereditary Prince of Anspach, who stopt here five or six Days on his Return from Prague, set out last Monday Morning for the Court of the Margrave his Father. The Princess, Spouse to the Prince Royal, went on Friday last to Ubigau, to see the Princess Christine her Sister-in-Law, who is fallen ill there. They write from Warsaw, that the King has conferred the Title of Privy Counsellor of Conference on M. de Sacken, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from this Court to that of Sweden.

*Emden, Sept. 17.* The Directors of our Asiatick Company have received Advice, by the Way of Copenhagen, that their Ship the Prince of Prussia arrived at the Cape of Good Hope on the 19th of May last, on her Voyage to Canton in China.

*Mons, Sept. 18.* The States of Hainault, and our Magistrates, have sent Deputations to Brussels, to compliment the Princess Charlotte of

of Lorrain upon her Arrival. And as that Princess proposes to take up her Residence in this City, we are very busy in preparing for her Reception. We learn from the Camp at Emeries near Maubeuge, that Prince-Soubise, who Commands at that Place, gave last Sunday a most magnificent Entertainment on Occasion of the Birth of the Duke de Berry.

*Berlin, Sept. 19.* On Thursday last the King set out for Breslau. His Majesty took his Route by Glatz, where he proposed to stay two or three Days in examining the Fortifications of that Place, and in reviewing the Troops of the Garrison. We have received Advice that Count Jules de Schwerin, Lieutenant General of Horse, Knight of the Order of the Black Eagle, and Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons, died on the 11th Instant at Luben in Silesia, in the 59th Year of his Age. On Thursday last we had a prodigious Storm of Thunder and Lightning, the latter whereof falling on the House of the Minister of Zieten, set the same on Fire, and reduced it to Ashes, with five or six others adjoining.

*Versailles, Sept. 19.* The King has appointed the Duke de Brissac to be Governor of Salces in Roussillon, in the Room of Count Coffe. His Majesty has likewise appointed the Marquis de Voyer to be Governor of the Castle of Vincennes, in the Room of the Marquis du Chatelet.

*Brussels, Sept. 23.* The Marquis de Bourbonville and Sars, Member of the Council of State of the Empress Queen, General of Foot of her Armies, Stadtholder, Governor, and Captain General of the Dutchy of Limbourg, and other Countries beyond the Meuse, died in this City last Tuesday Morning, in an advanced Age.

*Hague, Sept. 24.* The States of this Province will open their Assembly To-morrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived. The Baron de Heekeren de Brantzenbourg, and M. vander Mieden, set out Yesterday for Groninguen, in order to execute a private Commission from their High Mightinesses to the States of that Province. We are informed by our last Dispatches from Soestdyk, that her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, with the young Prince Stadtholder, and the Princess his Sister, continue there in perfect Health.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That John Chamberlain, late of Englisham, in the County of Wilts, was, on Tuesday, the 2d of July last, in the Evening, most cruelly and inhumanly murdered, in his own Fields, and put into a Pond; and, that, there is Reason to believe, several Persons were concerned in the said Murder, tho' all the Endeavours, which have been, hitherto, used to discover and bring them to Justice, for the same, have been without Effect: His Majesty, for the more effectual discovering, and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder,) who shall discover his, or her, Accomplice, or Accomplices, in the same, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
