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*Kennington, October 2.*

**T**HIS Day Signior Zon, Resident from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Letters of Credence; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Robinson, Knight of the Bath, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

*Rome, Sept. 7.* The Sea having again destroyed the Works that were begun for re-establishing the Port of Anzio, it is at length determined to abandon that Design, the Undertakers finding that the Expences which will attend the Keeping it afterwards in Repair, will far exceed the Advantages that are expected from it. On Thursday last the ordinary Courier who carries the Letters from hence to Naples, was attacked by a Gang of Highwaymen between Terracine and Fondi, and robbed of a Casket of Gold Watches and Snuff Boxes, sent by a Banker of this City to his Correspondent at Naples. We learn by Advices from the Sea Coast, that an Algerine Corsair having landed some Men near Fiumicino, they had the Assurance to march almost up to the very Gates of the Town, being favoured by a thick Fog, and carried off ten Persons into Slavery.

*Genoa, Sept. 7.* We are informed by the last Dispatches received here from the Marquis Doria, our new Commissary General in Corsica, that he has some Hopes the rebellious Subjects in that Island will in the End submit to the Genoese Government, as the Appearances seem at present very favourable.

*Leghorn, Sept. 7.* They write from Calvi in Corsica, that the new Genoese Commissary General in that Island has invited the Malecontents to send Deputies to treat on the Steps necessary to be taken in order to their Return to their Obedience. We have received Advice, by the Way of Marfailes, that three Danish Ships were arrived in the Road of Saffy, in the Kingdom of Morocco, with warlike Stores for the equipping of two Men of War lately built in that Port. The Algerine Corsairs continue to

be extremely troublesome to the Navigation in these Parts. They have lately taken a Neapolitan Ship, but the Crew had the good Fortune to save themselves.

*Florence, Sept. 10.* The Regency, upon Notice that the Dominican Friar of the Del Monte Family, with his two Brothers, and a Troop of Banditti, had lately committed great Insults upon the Estate belonging to a Branch of the same Family establish'd at Florence, whose Factor they barbarously murder'd, have commissioned the Magistrates of the Tribunal for Criminal Causes to publish an Edict, not only to authorize any Body to kill the said Brothers, and their Followers, but to offer a Reward of 2000 Crowns to any one who shall deliver any one of them alive into the Hands of Justice, and 300 Crowns for each of their Followers; 1000 Crowns for each of the Brothers dead, and 100 for any of their Followers, besides other Inducements mentioned in the Edict, which it is thought will very probably produce the Effect, as they are surrounded by Banditti, and Criminals who have fled from Justice, and who not only will obtain the Reward in Money, but likewise a general Pardon of whatever Crimes they stand accused of, or the Power of naming another, in Case they should not stand in Need of such a Pardon for themselves. M. Biglia, the new Nuncio from the Pope, arrived here late last Night, and was this Morning complimented in Person by Count Ruchecourt, who has, for the present, laid aside his Intention of going to the Baths at Pifa, in order to treat with this new Minister, and render compleat the Accommodation with the Court of Rome. By the last Letters from Vienna, Marquis Desarmottes, Captain of the Emperor's Body Guard here, called la Garde Noble, has obtained Leave to resign that Post, and to retire into Lorraine; and the Emperor has granted him a Pension during his Life. No Person will be appointed to succeed him, but that Guard, which is greatly reduced from its original Number of 100, will be commanded by M. de Raschourt, Lieutenant of that Corps, without Addition of either Rank or Appointments.

*Milan, Sept. 12.* The Great Chancellor Count Christiani proposes to set out this Week for Mantua, from whence he is to proceed to

Vienna, agreeably to the Orders he has received from her Imperial Majesty. Last Monday Morning the Marquess de Clerici set out from hence for Hungary, in order to join his Regiment, which is at present quartered in that Kingdom. We learn from Ferrara, that since the Cardinal Legat has ordered the Ring-Leaders of the late Tumults about the Jews to be prosecuted, Tranquillity is restored there, and the Jews meet with no farther Molestation.

*Strasbourg, Sept. 12.* The Troops encamped at Plocksheim, under the Command of Count Maillebois, went through their whole Exercise this Week in the Presence of the Marshal Duke de Belle-Isle, and the Marquess d'Argenson; and Yesterday those two Noblemen set out for the Camp at Saarre-Louis.

*Vienna, Sept. 14.* Last Thursday Morning the Archduke Charles, and the two eldest Archdutchesses, accompanied by the Prince and Princess of Trautson, and other Lords and Ladies of the Court, set out for Hollitsch, in order to wait on their Imperial Majesties, who arrived there last Tuesday. The Archduke Joseph, having been seized with a slight Disorder, was prevented taking this Tour.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 14.* The Queen is near her Time, and as her Majesty intends to lye-in at the Palace in this City, the Court is expected here from Frederichsbourg towards the End of this Month.

*Hague, Sept. 26.* Yesterday our Lords the States of this Province opened their ordinary Assembly, and continued their Deliberations this Morning; and the Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty are expected here the Beginning of next Month, in order to consider of some Affairs of Importance relating to their Department.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Kent Mail to this Office, upon Thursday the 28th of February last, was, between the Hours of Eight and Nine of the Clock in the Evening, attacked and robbed, at a Place called Snipps Hill, about a Mile beyond Sittingborn by three Footpads, one of whom fired a Pistol, seized the Horse which carried the Mail, beat the said Post Boy cruelly, and cut the Mail from the Horse and carried it away.

Two of the Persons who committed this Robbery are described as short Men, dressed like Sailors; and the other a tall Man in a red Coat.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, the Persons, or any of them who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby any one, or more of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of any one, or more, of the said Robbers, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
