*Kensington, October 13.*

*Boston in New-England, July 22.* On Tuesday Evening came to Town, the Hon. Thomas Hutchinson, Esq; Judge. of Probate for this County, and one of the Commissioners at the late Convention at Albany. By whom we are informed, that the Indians of the different Nations left that City in a good Temper; and that all the Commissioners had left Albany on the 12th Instant. On the 10th arrived here from Falmouth in Casco-Bay, the Ship Bureau, Captain Joseph Inches, Commander, in the Government's Service, with several of his Majesty's Council, the Speaker, and divers Members of the Honourable House of Representatives, who attended his Excellency the Governor to the Eastward, and were present at the Conference with the Indians. By whom we have received the agreeable News, that the Norridwacks and Penobscots, readily ratified and confirmed the former Peace; and told the Governor, they had no Objection to his Excellency's building Forts wherever he thought fit; and, as a Proof of their Sincerity, several of their young Men desired to come and reside among us, five of whom are already in Town, and several of their Children are expected in the

Fall, for the Benefit of Education: And Major General Winslow, with the Forces under his Command, is accordingly gone up Kennebeck-River, in order to build several Forts thereon. His Excellency the Governor intends to stay at Falmouth some Time longer, to expedite the important Affairs now carrying on in the Eastern Parts, where our Forces amount to about 1000 Men.

*New-York, July 29.* On the 16th Instant, our Lieutenant-Governor arrived here from Albany, having settled Matters to the entire Satisfaction of all the different Nations of the Indians that attended the Congress at that Place. And the next Day the Commissioners from Philadelphia, Maryland, and Virginia, with several others, arrived here from the same Place. From whence we learn, that at the said Congress, the Commissioners from the several Governments were unanimously of Opinion, That an Union of the Colonies was absolutely necessary; and a Plan of Union was accordingly drawn up by the said Commissioners, in order to be laid before their respective Constituents.

*Rome, Sept. 14.* Cardinal Valenti, Secretary of State, who has been for some Time past in a lingering State of Health, is now so well recover'd, that 'tis thought he will soon be able to apply himself again to Business. On Monday next will be held a private Consistory, when 'tis expected that Father Orlandi, of the Order of St. Benedict, and the Abbe Leoni, will be named Bishops, one of the Bishoprick of Molsetta in the Kingdom of Naples, and the other of that of Villa Nova in Istria.

*Florence, Sept. 14.* M. Biglia, who arrived here a few Days ago from Rome, in Quality of the Pope's Nuncio, has already had divers Conferences with Count Richecourt, President of the Council of the Regency, and other Principal Members of the Government.

*Milan, Sept. 22.* On Sunday last the Great Chancellor Count Christiani set out from hence for Mantua, in order to settle the Marriage Articles between his Daughter and the Marquess de Castellone; from whence he will, by Order of the Empress Queen, continue his Journey to Vienna.

*Vienna, Sept. 22.* On Wednesday last died in this City, in the 60th Year of his Age, Count Mallepine. This Nobleman was Count of the Holy Roman Empire, Marquess of Podenzana, Avulla, Corasco, Bibola, Valmont, &c. Actual Privy Counsellor to the Empress Queen, and Colonel in their Imperial Majesties Service.

*Frankfort, Sept. 28.* The Chamberlain Baron Hildebrand, the new Swedish Minister to the Court of Spain, passed through this City last Sunday on his Way to Madrid. We hear from Weilbourg, that the young Prince of that Name is declared to be of Age, and has accordingly taken upon him the Government of that Principality.

*Brill, Oct. 2.* Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante having been pleased to approve of the List of new elected Magistrates of this Town, they were accordingly all Sworn and admitted Yesterday into their respective Offices.

**Navy-Office, October 4, 1754.**

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 1st of January 1754, to the 30th of June following, according to his Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf;

These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad Street, on Monday the 21st Instant, at Nine of the Clock in the Morning, and continued the two following Days, beginning at the same Hour; That all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable unto them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to his present Majesty. And in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

**Victualling Office, October 9, 1754.**

**General Post Office, October 14, 1754.**

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Hungerford Branch Mail, dispatched from this Office on Thursday the 30th Instant, was, upon Saturday last, between Morden and Lavington in the County of Wilts, attacked and robbed, by two Highwaymen, who opened the said Mail, and took thereout the Lavington and Tinehead Bags of Letters, and likewise took from the Post Boy five Shillings, and otherwise used him very cruelly.

The only Description that is yet come to hand, of the two Persons who committed this Robbery, is, that the one was mounted upon a black Horse or Mare, the other upon a brown one.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons, or either of them, who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
