Admiralty Office, October 22, 1754:

CAPT. Maplefen, of His Majesty's Sloop Fortune, in his Letter of the 22d of last Month from Gibraltar Bay, gives an Account, That upon his receiving Intelligence of the Barbary Cruizer belonging to Larrach, being ready for the Sea, he, on the 19th, with His Majesty's Sloops Fortune and Raven, proceeded thither, where he found the said Cruizer. On his Arrival, the Alcáide, in the Name of the Grand Bashaw of Sallee, with the Master of the Cruizer, came on Board, desiring to renew the Peace with the English, which was done accordingly, the Bashaw declaring, "That the Ship now fitted out for a Cruize at Larrach should never commit any Hostilities on the English, wherevèr she should happen to meet with any, as they are now in profound Peace with them, and desire always to continue so". The Bashaw farther declares, That the Prince of Saffee, who has Half the Vessel, has no Authority or Command over her, but only shares in the Profits as a Merchant, and that the English need not be under any Apprehensions, he the said Prince having neither Ships nor Men of his own, nor any Notion of Sea Affairs. And that he, the Bashaw, has given particular Orders to the Capt. of the said Cruizer, never to molest any English Ship furnished with a proper Pass.

Kensington, October 20.

This Day Signior Zon, Resident from Venice, had his first private Audience of His Royal Highness the Duke; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrèll Dotmer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Lisbon, Sept. 10. The King has given Orders for rebuilding the Church belonging to the Convent of the barefooted Carmelites, pursuant to the Will of the Queen his Mother, who left 20000 Cruzades for that Purpose. They continue to work with great Diligence in rebuilding the General Hospital of this City, which was destroyed by Fire in the Year 1750. This Edifice, which is much more spacious than the former, will be finished in the Course of this Year.

Petersbourg, Sept. 20. The 16th Instant, being the Feast of St. Elizabeth, whose Name the Empress bears, there was a brilliant Appear-

ance at Court. In the Morning her Imperial Majesty, accompanied by the Great Duke, and attended by the Lords and Ladies of the Court, went to the Chapel of the Palace, and assisted at Divine Service; during which there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Fortress, which was answered by the Regiment of Guards, and the other Troops of the Garrison, who were drawn up in several Parts of the City. After Divine Service, her Imperial Majesty returned to the Palace, where she received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, and afterwards dined in Publick with the Great Duke. Another Table, consisting of 110 Dishes, was provided for the principal Nobility, &c. The same Day the Great Chancellor Count Bestucheff gave an elegant Entertainment to the Foreign Ministers. In the Evening the Windows of the Palace were finely illuminated, and the Whole concluded with a grand Ball, which her Imperial Majesty and the Great Duke honoured with their Presence for several Hours.

Petersbourg, Sept. 23. The King of Poland having in the last Creation of Knights of the Order of the Black Eagle, comprehended the Counts de Scafronsky and Schuwalow, two of her Imperial Majesty's Chamberlains, the last Monday invested them, in the Name of his Polish Majesty, with the Collar and other Ensigns of that Order. The same Day the Empress made a Promotion of Military Officers, when the Counts Czeremetoff and Czernichoff, and Baron Strogonoff, were raised to the Rank of Lieutenants General, and Prince Galitzin to that of Major General.

Genoa, Sept. 23. The Duke de Penthievre, High Admiral of France, who is visiting the Maritime Places in Provence, is shortly expected here. This Prince, after having seen what is most remarkable in this City, proposes to go directly to Milan, to spend some Days with the Duke of Modena his Father-in-Law; after which he will proceed to Venice, and other principal Cities of Italy.

Florence, Sept. 24. The Emperor having considerably reduced the Guard in this Duchy, called La Garde Noble, has settled a considerable Pension on the Marquess Desormoises, who had the Command thereof, with Permission to retire to his Estate in Lorrain; and Count Racheourt, Lieutenant of that Corps, succeeds him in that Command, but without any Advance of Rank or Appointments.

Warsaw

Warsaw, Sept. 29. The Opening of the General Diet of this Kingdom is fixed for Tomorrow, when they are immediately to proceed to the Choice of a Marshal, which 'tis imagined will go in Favour of Count Mnisczeck, Brother to the Marshal of the Crown, and Son-in-Law to the Prime Minister Count Bruhl.

Vienna, Oct. 2. Count Ladislas de Giluff, one of her Imperial Majesty's actual Privy Counsellors, died here on the 28th past, in the 55th Year of his Age.

Saare-Louis, Oct. 4. The Troops encamped in this Neighbourhood, under the Command of M. de Chevert, are all marched from the Camp to their respective Quarters.

Copenhagen, Oct. 5. The King has appointed Count Danneschiold to be Great Master of the Horse, in the Room of his late Father. The Queen continues to advance happily in her Pregnancy, and confines herself to her Apartment. We had prodigious Rains in this Country almost all last Month, but the Weather is now set in fine, and his Majesty takes again the Diversion of Hunting.

Berlin, Oct. 8. The King has lately made a numerous Promotion of Military Officers, when thirteen Lieutenant Colonels were raised to the Rank of Colonels, and nine Majors to that of Lieutenant Colonels. We have received an Account from Fidichow, a Town in Upper Pomerania, situate upon the River Oder, that a Fire broke out there in the Night between the 27th and 28th of last Month, which burnt with such Violence, that twelve Houses, besides Barns and Stables, were soon reduced to Ashes.

Fontainebleau, Oct. 10. The King, Queen, and Mesdames de France, arrived here on the 4th Instant, as did the Dauphin and his Princess on the 7th, so that the whole Court is at present here.

Paris, Oct. 11. The Court having been informed, that great Disorders have been committed for some Time past by a numerous Gang of Smuglers in Dauphine and Auvergne, have ordered several Detachments of Horse and Foot to march into those two Provinces, in order to put a Stop to the same.

Utrecht, Oct. 12. The Prince of Anhalt-Bernbourg, accompanied by Baron de Bornstedt, arrived here on the 5th Instant, and on the 10th set out for the Court of Hesse-Cassel. During his Highness's Stay here, he went to Soestdyk, to pay his Compliments to her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Family, by whom he was received with great Marks of Distinction.

Amsterdam, Oct. 15. The Directors of the East India Company held a General Meeting last Saturday, when several considerable Employments, vacant at Batavia, were filled up. At the same Time M. Dekker was appointed Governor and Director of Malacca, and M. Biddom, Director at Bengal.

Hague, Oct. 15. The Court is expected here on Thursday next from Soestdyk. Her Royal Highness proposes to take the Route by Leyden, in order to view what is most remark-

able in that City. The States of Guelderland, who have been assembled for some Days past at Arnheim, are to separate next Saturday.

Admiralty Office, October 21, 1754.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, That Information has been sent to this Office, that a Ship called the Margaret of Dublin, whereof Morgan M'Donnell was Master and Owner, Burthen 140 Tuns, bound from Dublin to Cork, in order to take in a Freight of Beef and Butter for Bourdeaux, put into the Port of Milford on the 9th Instant in a violent Storm, and the next Day about Ten o'Clock in the Morning she parted her Cable; the Crew, who all betook to the Boat, perished. The said Ship went ashore under some Cliffs, where she was cut and tore to Pieces by the People of the Country, notwithstanding the utmost Endeavours of Mr. Kymer, Justice of the Peace, and Mr. Coytmore, Surveyor of the Customs of St. Davids, to prevent it. One Main-sail, Value about Six Pounds, one Eight Inch Cable of about the same Value, cut in many Places almost through with Hatchets, a small Stream Anchor Value about 15 s. and one of the Ship's Boats somewhat damaged, and some Trifles, as Shrouds, Ropes, &c. were the only Things that could be saved and secured, and even that was done at very great Labour and Expence.

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Hungerford Branch Mail, dispatched from this Office on Thursday the 10th Instant, was, upon Saturday last, between Morden and Lavington in the County of Wilts, attacked and robbed, by two Highwaymen, who opened the said Mail, and took thereout the Lavington and Tinehead Bags of Letters, and likewise took from the Post Boy five Shillings, and otherwise used him very cruelly.

The only Description that is yet come to hand, of the two Persons who committed this Robbery, is, that the one was mounted upon a black Horse or Mare, the other upon a brown one.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted,

committed, the two Persons, or either of them, who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers well, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
