Messina, September 26.

A CORSAIR from Sallee, that has been cruizing for some Time in these Seas, has taken a Swedish Ship, valued at about 40000 Pieces of Eight, and conducted her to Tetuan.

Naples, Sept. 24. A Knight of the Order of Malta arrived here a few Days ago, and as he has already had several Conferences with the Marquess de Fogliani, and other Ministers of this Government, 'tis imagin'd he is charged with some new Propositions for accommodating the Disputes between this Court and the Grand Master of that Order. The Frigate of 26 Guns, lately launched here, is equipping with all Expedition, in order to join the Squadron of Capt. Martinez, which is now on a Cruize against the Barbary Pyrates.

Genoa, Sept. 28. The Marquess Doria, our new Commissary General in Corfica, has informed the Government, that he has posted his Troops in such a Manner, that the Malecontents will be no longer able to raise Contributions in the flat Country. In Conformity to the Convention lately concluded between this Republick and the Infant Duke of Parma, they are actually at Work on the new Road that is to open a Communication between each other's Territories, from which great Advantages are expected to arise from Commerce.

Rome, Sept. 28. The Sea having twice demolished and washed away the Works which were lately made at Nuttuno, to render that Port more commodious, Orders have been sent to remove the Materials from thence to Civita Vecchia, and totally desist from any Works which are found to be impracticable. On the 16th Instant the Pope held a private Consistory, in which he declared Cardinal Serbelloni, to be Legat of Bologna, and Cardinal Enriquez, to be Legat of Ravenna, and they had their Audiences of Leave on the 21st, in order to repair to their respective Governments. A few Days ago Cardinal Portocarrero received an extraordinary Courier from his Court, whereupon he immediately had an Audience of the Pope, after

which it was currently reported, that the Infant Don Lewis had renounced the Cardinal Hat, with the two Archbishopricks of Toledo and Seville, reserving to himself large Pensions out of them; to which, it is said, the Pope has acquiesced, and that this Event is soon to be made publick. The General of the Order of Mercy has laid before the Secretary of State, a List of the Captives redeemed last Year by that Order at Algiers, by which it appears, that they ransomed 241 Slaves for about 100000 Scudis. Upwards of twenty Persons of Reputation were taken up a few Days ago for Playing at unlawful Games, and were all sentenced to pay considerable Fines, for the Use of the Hospitals in this City, in order to obtain their Liberty.

Milan, Oct. 2. Preparations are making for the Tour the Duke of Modena proposes to take into this Dutchy and that of Mantua, in order to examine the Fortifications and review the Troops. The Magistrates of this City have come to a Resolution to erect a House of Correction for the Reception of all such poor Wretches who rather chuse to procure a Livelihood by begging than by Labour, great Numbers of whom we have been pestered with for a long Time.

Florence, Oct. 4. This being the Emperor's Name-Day, the same was celebrated here with the usual Solemnity, and Count Richecourt entertained the Foreign Ministers, and many of the Nobility, at Dinner. In the Afternoon there was a Race of Chariots, and in the Evening the usual Fireworks, and the Cannon of the Castles; were fired. On this Occasion, Liberty was granted for masking at the Theatre in the Evening, and to continue a Fortnight.

Vienna, Oct. 5. Yesterday being the Feast of St. Francis, whose Name the Emperor bears, the Ministers of State, Foreign Ministers, and principal Nobility, appeared at Schonbrun in their richest Habits to compliment their Imperial Majesties on that Occasion. After Divine Service the Emperor and Empress Queen dined in Publick with the Archdukes Joseph and Charles, and the two eldest Archdutchesses: The principal Nobility and Foreign Ministers being



being seated at two Tables provided for them, each of 100 Covers; and at Night there was a Drawing Room. Count Christiani, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Empress Queen to the Government of Austrian Lombardy, is arrived here from Milan, and has laid before their Imperial Majesties an Account of the State of Affairs in that Country.

Brussels, Oct. 14. The Elders of the different Companies in this City have given their Consent to an Augmentation, for five Years, of the Duties upon Coffee, Tea, and Chocolate, as also upon Wine and Cards; by Virtue of which, Tea is to pay an additional Duty of Fifteen-pence a Pound, Coffee Six-pence, and Chocolate Eight-pence; Wine Two-pence a Bottle, and Cards Two-pence a Pack: And 'tis hoped that the Elders of the Cities of Antwerp and Machlin will likewise Consent to this Augmentation.

Hague, Oct. 17. Her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, and her Family, returned this Afternoon in perfect Health from Soestdyk.

General Post Office, October 14, 1754.

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Hungerford Branch Mail, dispatched from this Office on Thursday the 10th Instant, was, upon Saturday last, between Morden and Lavington in the County of Wilts, attacked and robbed, by two Highwaymen, who opened the said Mail, and took thereout the Lavington and Titehead Bags of Letters, and likewise took from the Post Boy five Shillings, and otherwise used him very cruelly.

The only Description that is yet come to hand, of the two Persons who committed this Robbery, is, that the one was mounted upon a black Horse or Mare, the other upon a brown one.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons, or either of them, who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; Or if any Person or Persons, whether the Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof,

do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

We, therefore, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses, of the said Town of Southampton, in Common Council assembled, this 25th Day of October 1754, for the Encouragement and Revival of the Trade thereof, have unanimously come to the following Resolutions, and do hereby resolve, order, and agree, as follows, viz.

That no Petty Customs shall be demanded or paid for any Goods or Merchandizes whatsoever, to be imported at either of the Keys of this Town, from any Parts of Africa or America; or to be exported, from either of the said Keys, to any of the said Parts, for the Space of twenty-one Years now next ensuing: And that if by this Encouragement the Trade of the said Town shall be revived, and considerably increased, the said Term shall hereafter be enlarged;

That any Merchants, inclinable to carry on any other foreign Trade here, shall, on Application to the Mayor, be treated with, and allowed to compound with the Common Council for the said Duties, upon the most reasonable Terms, for a certain Number of Years, or otherwise: And if they please to come and reside here, their Encouragement shall be the greater.
