Gensus, Novemb. 14.

Here are at prefent 12 French Gallies at Monaid, where they feen to keep their flation, with intention to attack the spanish Gallies as they pass by, being on their way from Bar-This laft week, the Fre ach force one towards Meffina. ced afhore at Porto Mauritio a Bask of Majorca, and afterwards feicht her off; they have likewife taken a Sicilian Caper, who of late has us'd to Cruife in these parts.

Marseilles, Novemb. 16. The Sieur de Valbelle is returned to Thenion with the men of War under his command from Meffins, and is gone Post for Park. At Thouton are fitting out fix men of War more defigned to carry men and provisions to the Meffinefer.

Maeffricht, Novemb. 25. The Imperialifts, under the command of General Spork, having poffested them-felves of Huy, and put the Regiment of Pio, confifting in 2000 men, under the command of the Prince of Starenbergh, in Garrifon there, they marched towards Dinant, where being arrived, they battered the Town, which at first seemed refolved to make a notable defence, with ten pieces of Ordnance; fo that the fecond day the Inhabitants being diffident of their own ftrength, fur-rendred, but the Caffle held out flill, in which, amongft others, were 700 French, which those of Dinant had called to their affiftance from Philipville; but they finding themselves wholly unprovided of Ammunition and Provisions to maintain the place any time, refolved to furrender the Caffle likewife the day after, upon condition to march out with their Arms, Ge. to Philipnille.

Charleville, Novemb. 26. General Spork, who commands the Imperial Army on the Meule, having taken the Calife of Dinant, advances towards Thuyn, a place likewife belonging to the Bithoprick of Liege, which he refolves to possels himfelf of, the better to lecure his Winter-quarters in that Countrey. He fent to fummon the City of Bouilion in the Ardennes, but the Governor had little regard thereunto; and Geneal Spork knew too well the difficulty of the paffage, to think fit to march with his Forces thither. The Nobility of the Arrierban have received bis Majeflies orders to return home.

Merz, Novemb. 25. The Mareschal de Crequi will now very fuddenly have here a confiderable body of men rogether, to observe the motions of the Confederates, who (we are told) are on their march from the Meufe, in order to the belieging of Treves, which we the rather believe, because of the great preparations which the E-lector of Treves is making of Arrillery, Ammunicion, and all other things necessary for a fiege; and besides, hath brought what Force he has together, to feize feverat Postsabout Treves, which at prefent besiege the Calific of Riceffle, in which there is a French Garilon. The of Flicefile, in which shere is a French Garifon. ig infant, Monfieur de Turenne marched from Defail-By to Ingueiller, where he is now encamped ; the Confederates had fent out two parties to attack his Rear as he marched, but they coming up, and finding the French in a good posture to receive them, did not attempt any

thing, but returned to their Camp. The Enemy for-tifies the Forts which defend the Bridge of Frrathuge, and Mounsieur de Turenne takes especial care to order, all matters fo as may best conduce to the defence and fecurity of Hagneway and Saverne, where he has great Magazines.

From the Camp at Ingveiller. Rouemb. 24. The ze inftant, Monfieur de Turenze quitted his Camp & Por vieller, and came and posted himfelf here, being about two Leagues from his formet quarters towards Hagnenam ; his Troops lie firetch'dall along the River as far as Pfafenbouen, for their more commodious sublifience, being supplied with Provisions and Forage from Lorrain, as well as to take care the better for the prefervation of Haguenam, a place of very great importance. The Confederate Troops continue in their old Pofts, having only changed their general quarter which was burnt ; in the mean time they fend out feveral confiderable parties to feize the places in the Npper Alfatia, where they may more eafily fublift. fladt on the River III. Cologne, Nivumb. 30. The \$\$ inflant, the Datch Troops, con-fifting in feven Regiments of Foot, and 300 Horfe, under the command of Monfieur Fario, arrived at Truffright and Moring-hen, about three leagues from hence. The 2 i they decamped from thence, and lodged that day near Brevil, the next day they continued their march from thence towards the Countrey of Eyff belonging to the Elector of Treves, and (according to our laft advices) they had their quarters at Mechemberg in the faid County. The Regiment of the Batton de Scarenberg is likewife marched towards Treves. The Marquis de Grana is at Witlick not far from that City, and the Artillery, Ammuni-tion, dre., cefigned by the Elector of Treves for the fiege of that place, is arrived from Coblens at Eern Caffel. The Cardi-nal Baden is gone hence, with intentions to refide fome zime at w Liege. Lug

Paris, Novemb. 28. On Monday laft in the Evening, the Chevalier de Rohan, Madam de Villars, Widow of Gentleman of Normandy, Monfieur Preau, Nephew of Monfieur de la Treaumont, who was killed in the defence he made when the Kings Officers came to arrest him upon the first discovery of this Plot, and Kander Enden a Schoolmalter, being convicted of High Treafon, in endeavouring to raile a Rebellion in Normand, and to deliver up certain places into the hands of the Enemy, were condemned to die; the three first to lose their heads, and the laft to be hanged : and yelterday, at ut two in the atternoon they accordingly fuffered the fall fentence in the place before the Baffile, the King's Guards de Corps, in all about 400 Morie, and iome order Troops, having been drawn up thereduring the execution. We are cold, that the Sieur' de Va belle, upon his arrival at Meffina, having landed what Troops he had on board his mips, refolved formally to befrege the Cafile of Sr. Servader, and accordingly the focond of October, at night opened the Trenches, which were continued till the fourth at night ; that the Spaniards in the mean time were ced from their outmost Palifaddes, and the besider seized on a Well about so paces from the Caftle, from whence they within had all their water. That the fifth of Odober, the spaniards capitulated, and it wasagreed, that the Caftle should be furrendred, if not relieved in eight days ; that during that time, several Batteries were railed by the French, in order to the continuing the fieges, if affiftance should come to the befieged : to hinder which, the Sleur de Vallelle anchored with his thips under St, Salvador. The tenth of Ollober, the Spanif Armada; confiling of 20 Sail, appeared, and came to an anthor, in fome diforder, between le Paradi, and Noftre dame do 11 Giore; the befieged either apprehending them to have been French men of War, and confectiently looking upon themfelves as loft, and therefore not fo careful in keeping their guards, or for Tome other reasons which we know not, gave the Meffine es an opportunity to enter the Caffle, which they did without the least difficulty, and made themfelves Mafters of it, and of the Officers and Soldiers that were there, who were carried priloners to Meffina. That it e'12, the Spanifs Fluer continuing fill at archer, and in the Tame diforder, feveral of the thips having loft their Riedders, or fultained other damage, the Sieur de Valbeffe finding the wind favourable, tet fail with his fquadron, confilting in five large men of War, and three Fireships, with defign to attack the enemy, and to endeayor to buin fome of their ships, in which the favorablenefs of the wind, and the diforder they were in, feemed to promise him success; but the enemy perceiving his intention, immediately fet fail, and retired 3 thether eupon the Sieur de Valbet's went on fhore again, and having given orders for the repairing the Fortifications of St. Salvador, and affured the Senate of Meffina of his Majeflies protection , and received their acknowledgments for the great affiftance his Majefty has already been pleafed to fend them, he parted with his men of War for Thouson or Marfeilles.

Ditto, December. General Spork having put 2 Garrifon of 1800 into Dinan: , and poffeffed himfell of Chinay, and other confiderable Posts in the Country of Liege, is come back to Huy, in order to the reducing likewife the Calile there. To morrow the Prince de Vaudemont parts hence for Stain, to negociate feveral matters at that Court, as well publick as private. It is now faid, that the Dutch Troops which are marched nnder the command of Monfieur Fario, being joined with thole of the Elector of Treves, and fome otkers , will be fufficient to earry on the frege of Treves, and that the Imperialiffs commanded by General operk, will take their Winter-quarters in the Countrey of Liege. We are confidently told, that the Swedes have declared for France, and that they are bringing their Forces together to enter with them into the Territories of the Elector of Brandenburgh; and from the Hague they write ca this fubject, that the Prince of Orange will forthwith. draw together an Army of 12000, to affift the faid Elector, who will (it's faid) have likewife the King of Denmark on his fide.

It is reported here, that the Cafile of May is forrendred to the Imperial: firs, and that they have fent a confiderable party to wards They'n; it is not doubted but the Imperial firs will take their winter-quarters in the Country of Liege, or elfe in the Country of Patters, and the Electorate of Country, where they were the laft Winter. To morrow his Excellence goeshence for Antwerp. From Zealand we have advice, that the Earl of Offory, and the Farl of Arlingun, arrived the 26 paft, at Middleburgh from England, and thence continued their journey for the Hague.
