St. James's, November 9.

THIS Day His Majesty and the Royal Family came from Kensington to reside here during the Winter.

Naples, Oct. 8. We have Advice from Palermo, that Commodore Martinez, being on a Cruize with two Men of War and four Chebecks in the Sicilian Seas, fell in with five Algerine Corsairs, one of which he sunk, and obliged the others to sheer off, after an obstinate Engagement. They continue to raise Men with great Success for compleating the Regiments with which the King has thought proper to augment his Troops.

Genoa, Oct. 14. On Sunday last the Gallies that carried a considerable Reinforcement of Troops to Corsica, returned into this Port; the Commander whereof brought the Government some Dispatches from the Marques Doria, by which we learn, that Things continue at present pretty quiet in that Island.

Parma, Oct. 16. The Duke de Penthièvre, High Admiral of France, who landed at Genoa last Sunday from Antibes, is expected here on Friday next: He proposes to reside for about a Fortnight in the Abby of St. John, which is getting ready for his Reception; after which he will continue his Tour to most of the principal Courts of Italy.

Milan, Oct. 16. We are informed by our last Letters from Venice, that Advice having been received there, that the Plague is ceased at Smyrna, the Senate have thought proper to discontinue the Quarantine required of all Ships coming into that Port from the Levant.

Munich, Oct. 18. Last Friday Morning we had a most violent Storm of Wind, by which several Chimnies were blown down, and the Tops of many Houses greatly damaged. The

Jesuits Church also suffered very much, and many Trees in the Neighbourhood were torn up by the Roots.

Vienna, Oct. 19. The Archdukes and Archdutchesses removed last Wednesday from Schonbrun to their Apartments in the Castle in this City. 'Tis said that some Difficulties have arisen in regard to the Treaty of Commerce which has been for some Time on the Tapis between this Court and that of Berlin, on Account of the Augmentation that has been made by each Party, to the Duties upon the Produce of each other's Dominions.

Frankfort, Oct. 24. On Monday last the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, and the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, had an Interview in the Gardens of Counsellor Schmids at Oberrod. These two Princes received each other with great Marks of Esteem, and after spending some Hours together in the greatest Friendship, the first set out on his Return to Philipruhe, and the other to Darmstadt.

Cologne, Oct. 28. They write from Liege, that they are busy in drawing all the Iron Artillery out of the Cittadel, and replacing them with others of Brass, pursuant to a Resolution of the States of that Principality.

Hambourg, Oct. 29. The Vacancy in this Magistracy, occasioned by the Death of Burghermaster Widow, who is much regretted, was filled up this Morning by the Choice of the Senator Schuback, whose known Capacity in the Law meets with a general Applause from the Inhabitants of this City.

Hague, Oct. 31. The States of Holland and Westsriesland being to assemble on Wednesday the 6th of next Month, the Points upon which they are to delibetate are already sent away to the respective Cities and Towns in those Provinces. M. Dreuten has taken the usual Oaths to the Assembly of the States General, in Quality of Deputy of the Province of Guelderland

to the College of the Admiralty of the Meuse. The Duke of Brunswick is returned to this Place from his Government of Bois-le-Duc. The young Prince of Nassau-Weilbourg is shortly expected here from Germany, and as a House is fitting up for him, 'tis expected he will stay best Part of the Winter.

London, November 9.

Yesterday Stephen Theodore Janssen, Esq; Lord Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhall; when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were surrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, the Aldermen, Recorder, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City-Officers attending, and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges adorned with Streamers and Pendants to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the new Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed, and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryers, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction.

General Post Office, October 14, 1754.

Whereas the Post Boy carrying the Hungerford Branch Mail, dispatched from this Office on Thursday the 10th Instant, was, upon Saturday last, between Morden and Lavington in the County of Wilts, attacked and robbed, by two Highwaymen, who opened the said Mail, and took thereout the Lavington and Tinehead Bags of Letters, and likewise took from the Post Boy five Shillings, and otherwise used him very cruelly.

The only Description that is yet come to hand, of the two Persons who committed this Robbery, is, that the one was mounted upon a black Horse or Mare, the other upon a brown one.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the two Persons, or either of them, who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, do, or shall make Discovery, whereby both, or either of the Persons, who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
