Madrid, October 28.

THE Augmentation that is making in the Spanish Infantry consists, for the present, of two Companies in each Regiment, which will amount to about 4000 Men. These new Companies are to be formed out of the old ones, each of the latter being ordered to furnish five Men for that Purpose, whom they are further directed to replace with the utmost Expedition. That as soon as these Vacancies are filled up, the Colonels may go on forming, in the same Manner, fresh Companies, and recruiting the old ones, till they have added six to each Regiment. The Whole of this Plan amounts to about 12000 Men, which will restore the Spanish Infantry to the same State it was in before the last Reformation. The Cavalry is not included in the present Augmentation; neither have the Foreign Regiments, as yet, received any Orders upon this Subject. The Officers for the two Companies, that will immediately be formed in each Regiment, are already named.

Cadiz, Oct. 29. It is expected that an Order will soon be published, for putting Commerce upon the ancient Footing of Flotas and Galeons; which, it is not doubted, will raise the Price of European Goods in the Spanish West-Indies, where, at present, on Account of the great Number of Register Ships that have been granted of late, they sell for less than in Old Spain.

Pofnania, Oct. 29. We are informed by our last Advices from the Ukraine, that a Detachment of the Crown Army, which was ordered to march towards the Frontiers of that Country, in order to prevent the Incursions of the Heyducks, having come up with a Body of about three hundred, had cut several of them to Pieces, and put the rest to Flight. Count de Sapiha, Palatin of Smolesko, is dangerously ill at his Seat at Filehne in this Neighbourhood. Last Week Count Ofialynsky, Palatin of Kalish, set out from hence for Warsaw, where he is to reside till their Majesties Return into Saxony.

Genoa, Oct. 29. The Man of War of 60 Guns, that has been building here for the King of Portugal, is compleatly finished, and will sail for Lisbon with the first fair Wind. The Duke de Penthievre, High Admiral of France, who arrived here on the 19th Instant, set out Yesterday for Parma, from whence his Highness intends to make the Tour of Italy.

Prague, Nov. 2. Orders are given for raising Recruits in the flat Countries, not only to compleat the Regiments of Horse and Foot in this Kingdom, but also to supply the Places of those worn out in the Service by Age and Infirmities. We are informed by several Foreign Merchants, who passed through this City last Week from the Fair at Leipsick, that the Demand for Goods in general was not so great this Year as was expected.

Escorial, Nov. 4. This being the King of Naples's Birth-day, their Catholick Majesties received the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, upon that Occasion.

Brussels, Nov. 11. The States of Brabant are lately separated, without coming to any Resolution, either in regard to the new Subsidy demanded of them by the Empress Queen, or to the making a Present to the Princess Charlotte of Lorrain. We hear from Antwerp, that the Representations, which have been made to the Magistrates of that City, in order to engage them to consent to the laying a new Tax on Coffee, Tea, and Cards, have hitherto proved ineffectual. The States of Namur having agreed to furnish the necessary Sums for making a new Road from that City to Louvain, that Work will be undertaken forthwith.

Hague, Nov. 14. Yesterday the Deputies from Zealand were conducted in great State to the Assembly of their High Mightinesses, and began the Conferences in Relation to the Choice of a proper Person to fill the Office of President of the High Council of Holland.
