*Petersbourg, October 29.*

**T**HE publick Rejoycings for the Birth of Prince Paul Petrowitz, which end To-morrow, have been the most splendid and magnificent in Illuminations, Feastings, Masked Balls, Comedies, &c. that have been known in this Country for some Years past. On Saturday next Count Groushoff sets out for the Court of Anhalt-Zerbst, to notify in Form the Birth of the young Prince; from whence he is to go to Hambourg, to make the like Notification to the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein-Eutin. And the Chamberlains, Sievers and Soltikoff, are preparing to set out with the like Commissions to the Courts of Vienna and Stockholm. We have received an Account by our last Letters from Moscow, of the Death of the Countess of Saphonoff, Lady of Honour, and of Count Lalin, one of her Imperial Majesty's Chamberlains.

*Naples, Oct. 29.* Yesterday an Express arrived here from Madrid, whose Dispatches occasioned an extraordinary Council to be held this Morning. The Pope's new Nuncio at this Court labours with great Assiduity to bring about a Reconciliation between his Sicilian Majesty and the Great Master of Malta, but we hear some fresh Difficulties have started, which 'tis thought will protract that Business for some Time. His Majesty has appointed M. Atthieri, Canon of our Metropolitan Church, to be Bishop of Monopoli. The Duke de Saint Elizabeth, late Minister from this Court to that of Dresden, is daily expected here; and 'tis generally believed he will be soon after named Viceroy of Sicily, in the Room of the late Duke de la Vieuville.

*Genoa, Nov. 4.* The Marquis de Grimaldi, Ambassador from Spain to the States General of the United Provinces, set out Yesterday from hence for Paris, where it is thought he intends to stop some Days before he proceeds to the Hague.

*Milan, Nov. 6.* The Duke de Penthièvre, High Admiral of France, arrived here last Monday from Genoa, accompanied by the Duke of Modena his Father-in-Law, who went from hence about a League to meet him. As his Highness travels incognito, under the Name of Count Dinans, no publick Honours are shewn

him. After some Stay at this Court, he intends to continue his Route for Parma, Modena, Venice, Rome and Naples.

*Warsaw, Nov. 7.* The King expresses himself with great Concern at the unsuccessful breaking up of the Diet. The Time of the Court's Departure is not yet fixed, and 'tis thought their Majesties will not set out for Saxony till the End of next Month. His Majesty has conferred the Order of the White Eagle on the Castellan of Polock; and Count de Mnifzeck has a Government, said to be worth 40000 Crowns a Year, conferred upon him.

*Copenhagen, Nov. 9.* The King continues to take the Diversion of hunting in the Neighbourhood of Jagersbourg. This Week the Queen Mother proposes to leave Hirschholm, and to come here for the Winter. They are hard at Work in compleating two new Men of War which are near finished at the New Holm.

*Ratisbon, Nov. 11.* On Wednesday last the Ministers of the Evangelick Body held a long Conference, when the Saxon Minister, Director of that Body, read two Letters, one to the Emperor, and the other to the Empress Queen, beseeching their Imperial Majesties to cause the Religious Grievances of their Protestant Subjects in Austria, Hungary, and the Duchies of Carinthia and Styria, to be immediately redressed. These two Letters are already sent to Vienna, and 'tis imagined will have the desired Effect.

*Treves, Nov. 14.* On Monday last the Pope's Bull for confirming the Election of Baron Walderdorff, to be Coadjutor to our Archbishop and Elector, was published in our Metropolitan Church; after which the Prince Coadjutor assisted at High Mass, which was followed by Te Deum, during which three Discharges were made of the Canon upon our Ramparts. When Divine Service was over, he went in Procession to the Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided, which was followed by a Ball. And the Night concluded with Illuminations and publick Rejoycings throughout the City.

*Paris, Nov. 15.* The King has appointed the Marquis de Cursay, late Commander of the French Troops in the Island of Corsica, to be Governor of the City of Nantes and its District. Marshal de Noailles, who has been greatly indisposed for some Days past, is thought to be much better.

*The CASE of Master R. Pomeroy Gilbert.*

**M**aster R. Pomeroy Gilbert, a Child of Nine Years old, Son to Major Gilbert of Plymouth, was about the Middle of February last, seized with all the violent Symptoms of a Fever, particularly Giddiness in his Head, uncommon Thirst, and excessive Heat. In about five Days he began to be extremely delirious, and continued so, with some few Intervals, till April 2, and was all that Time so excessively thirsty, as to drink three or four Quarts of Liquor every Night. He was attended by a Physician of the first Eminence in those Parts, who, at this Time, together with his Father, and all about him, expected every Moment he would expire. *Hague, Nov. 21.* The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have this Day continued their Deliberations. M. Munckhausen has taken the usual Oaths, at an Assembly of their High Mightinesses, in Quality of Deputy from the Province of Overijssel to the College of the Admiralty of the Meuse. Last Night died at Haerlem, M. Schuylenbourg, one of the Burgo-Masters of that City.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that the Reverend Mr. George Tilson, Preacher to His Majesty's Chapel at Hampton Court, was, on Friday the 23d Instant, between the Hours of One and Two in the Afternoon, (being then in a One Horse Chair) in Richmond Park, in the County of Surry, attacked and robbed, by a Person on Foot, who presented a Pistol to him, and rifled his Pockets of what Money he had in them, being two Guineas and some Silver, which he took from the said Mr. Tilson: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person who so attacked and robbed the said Mr. Tilson, is, hereby, pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to any one who shall make Discovery of him, so that he may be apprehended and convicted of the said Facts; as also His most gracious Pardon to any one who may have been party to the said Robbery and shall make such Discovery of the Robber, as may cause him to be apprehended and convicted thereof: The said Reward of One Hundred Pounds in Money to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of the Robber.

Note, The Person who committed the said Robbery is a middle sized Man, and was in a light coloured old Coat, a light colour Wigg, and very dusty Hat;—was of a pale Complexion;—his Beard pretty long and black;—his Pistol was a very small one, and seemed to be very rusty.
