*The CASE of Master R. Pomeroy Gilbert.*

**M**aster R. Pomeroy Gilbert, a Child of Nine Years old, Son to Major Gilbert of Plymouth, was about the Middle of February last, seized with all the violent Symptoms of a Fever, particularly Giddiness in his Head, uncommon Thirst, and excessive Heat. Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that the Reverend Mr. George Tilson, Preacher to His Majesty's Chapel at Hampton Court, was, on Friday the 23d Instant, between the Hours of One and Two in the Afternoon, (being then in a One Horse Chair) in Richmond Park, in the County of Surry, attacked and robbed, by a Person on Foot, who presented a Pistol to him, and rifled his Pockets of what Money he had in them, being two Guineas and some Silver, which he took from the said Mr. Tilson: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person who so attacked and robbed the said Mr. Tilson, is, hereby, pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to any one who shall make Discovery of him, so that he may be apprehended and convicted of the said Facts; as also His most gracious Pardon to any one who may have been party to the said Robbery and shall make such Discovery of the Robber, as may cause him to be apprehended and convicted thereof: The said Reward of One Hundred Pounds in Money to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of the Robber.

Note, The Person who committed the said Robbery is a middle sized Man, and was in a light coloured old Coat, a light colour Wigg, and very dusty Hat;—was of a pale Complexion;—his Beard pretty long and black;—his Pistol was a very small one, and seemed to be very rusty.
