Malaga, November 12.

LAST Night the Conception Register Ship from Buenos Ayres, with a Cargoe valued at three Millions of Dollars, was forced in here by excessive bad Weather. She was luckily met without the Streights by a Spanish Man of War, who just saw her safe under our Guns, and then stood off to Sea. An Express was immediately dispatched to Court with this News, and it is imagined an Order will come from thence to unload the Money here. She has Tobacco and Hides on board, which must also be landed, to stop a Leak, and to repair other Damages, before the Vessel can leave this Harbour.

Madrid, Nov. 18. The Queen's having been a good deal indisposed with a violent Cold at the Escorial, occasioned their Majesties returning sooner than was intended to this Place, where they arrived on Wednesday last; since which, the Queen is much better. M. de Justiniani, the new Venetian Ambassador, arrived here about a Fortnight ago; but he has not, as yet, had his Audiences.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Francis Earl of Effingham, to be Colonel of the Regiment of Foot, late under the Command of Colonel Charles Ruffel, deceased.
