

*Berlin, Dec. 3.* The King has given his Consent to the Marriage of M. Blanckensee, Major General of Horse, and Colonel of a Regiment of Dragoons, with Mademoiselle Frederique-Louise de Boden, youngest Daughter to M. Boden, Minister of State and War. Last Week the Prince of Schaffgotsch, Bishop of Breslau, arrived here from Silesia, and has since been introduced to the King at Potsdam, who received him with great Marks of Esteem.

*Hambourg, Dec. 5.* The Magistrates of this City having given their Consent to the raising of Recruits for compleating the Swedish Regiments garrisoned in Stralsund, and other Places of Pomerania, a great Number have been enlisted and sent away within these few Days past. We hear from Petersbourg, that a Scheme is on Foot for erecting a University for the Education of young Gentlemen at Moscow.

*Brussels, Dec. 6.* The Deputies of the States of Hainault arrived here on Friday last, and the next Day waited on Prince Charles of Lorraine our Governor General, to whom they presented the Act of Consent of their Province to the Demands lately made by the Empress Queen. A few Days ago General Count Chanclos was seized with a paralitick Disorder, which deprived him of the Use of Speech, and he still lies in a deplorable Condition.

*Paris, Dec. 6.* Last Friday the King returned from Bellevue to Versailles; and on Tuesday his Majesty set out for Trianon, from whence he is expected back at Versailles this Evening. They write from Montpelier, that the States of the Province of Languedoc met there on the 28th of last Month.

*Hague, Dec. 10.* On Thursday last the States of Holland and Westfrizeland separated; and 'tis thought they will not meet again till after Christmas; but the Deputies of the several Colleges of the Admiralty of these Provinces, continue to deliberate on the Affairs of their Department.
