PURsuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the 26th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, that a Snow, called the Lee, whereof George Snow was Master, Burthen 160 Tuns, laden with 314 Hogheads of Tobacco, 11000 Pipe, Hogheads, and Barrel Staves, and 72 Walnut Planks, bound from Virginia to London, was, on the 19th past, stranded on the Back of the Isle of Wight, and the whole Cargo lost, but the Crew were saved.

Information has also been sent to this Office, that a Snow, called the Mary of Cork, whereof James Hartfield was Master, Burthen 100 Tons, laden with Beef, Butter, and Cheese, bound from Cork to Bourdeaux in France, was, on the 20th past, drove upon the Rocks at Seaton near East Looe, Cornwall, where she broke to Pieces, and the Crew, with great Difficulty, saved themselves; there has been since taken up Six Barrels of the Beef, Nineteen Firkins of Butter, and Three hundred Weight of Cheese.
