The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council,

His Majefty in Council was this Day pleafed to appoint William Stodart, of Degannwy, Efq; to be Sheriff of the County of Carnarvon.

. A PROCLAMÁTION,

For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from ferving Foreign Princes and States; for giving further Encouragement to Seamen to enter themselves on

His Majefty's Ships of War, We were gracfously pleased to promise, That every able Seaman, and every ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for our Service, who thould voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the Twentieth Day of this Instant February, in fuch Manner as in Our faid Proclamation is expressed, should respectively receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our faid Proclamation (that is to fay) every able Seamen the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every ordinary Seaman the Sum of Twenty Shillings, to be paid to them respectively by the Persons, and at the Times, as in Our faid Proclamation is mentioned a and We being willing to increase Our said Royal Bounty for the Purpoles aforelaid, do hereby promife and declare, That all able Seamen who shall, on or before the Tenth Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, in the Mannet directed by Our faid recited Proclamation, fhall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds, and all ordinary Seamen fo ent tering themselves as aforefaid, the Sum of Two Pounds, to be paid in fuch Manner, and under fuch Rules and Directions, as are contained in Our said recited Proclamation. And We do bereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman br Seamen who may secrete themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Out faid Service by any of Our Sea Officers employs ed for raising Men; the faid Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-ports by the Naval Officers (where. there are any) and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of Our Cuftoms, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the faid Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors refpectively, by the Perfon who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforefaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Num+ ber of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; the faid Certificate to be given by fuch Officer as may take fuch Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal them selves.

• WHEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Sea-_faring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby ftrictly charge and command all Mafters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Scamen, Shipwrights, and other - Seataring Mon whethever and wherefoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do ferve in any Foreign Ship or Veffel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit fuch Foreign Services, andre turn Home to their native Countries: And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men what sever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth, to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience, and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any fuch Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service, by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they fhall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Treasurer mortally wounded, by fix Soldiers, Great Britain. And Whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the Twenty-third Day of January last, intituled, A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themfelves on Board
