## A PROCLAMATION,

*For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving further Encouragement to Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.*

GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their native Countries: And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth, to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience, and exact Conformity. And we do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And we do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service, by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by us as Subjects of Great Britain. And Whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the Twenty-third Day of January last, intituled, A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, We were graciously pleased to promise, That every able Seaman, and every ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for our Service, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the Twentieth Day of this Instant February, in such Manner as in Our said Pro-

clamation is expressed, should respectively receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our said Proclamation (that is to say) every able Seaman the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every ordinary Seaman the Sum of Twenty Shillings, to be paid to them respectively by the Persons, and at the Times, as in Our said Proclamation is mentioned: and We being willing to encrease Our said Royal Bounty for the Purposes aforesaid, do hereby promise and declare, That all able Seamen who shall, on or before the Tenth Day of March next, voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, in the Manner directed by Our said recited Proclamation, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds, and all ordinary Seamen so entering themselves as aforesaid, the Sum of Two Pounds, to be paid in such Manner, and under such Rules and Directions, as are contained in Our said recited Proclamation. And We do hereby further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen so discovered and taken in and about London, by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out-ports by the Naval Officers (where there are any) and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Sixth Day of February, 1755, and in the Twenty eighth Year of Our Reign:

G O D save the KING.

*Lisbon, Jan. 24.* On Saturday last the King, attended by the principal Lords of his Court, went to the Monastery of St. Vincent in this City, and performed the Ceremony of legitimating the Infants Don Antonio, Don Gaspard, and Don Joseph, natural Sons of the late King; after which his Majesty set out for Salvaterra, accompanied by those three Princes. The Fleet bound for Rio de Janeiro, consisting of twenty nine Ships, under Convoy of a Man of War of 50 Guns, commanded by Captain Don Juan da Costa de Brito, sailed from hence a few Days ago with a fair Wind. Two other Ships, viz. La Notre Dame de Neceffite, bound for Angola, and la Notre Dame du Mont-Carmel, bound

bound for Maragnan, took the Opportunity of sailing at the same Time with the above Convoy.

*Naples, Jan. 28.* Their Majesties continue at Caserta with the whole Court. The Duke de Penthièvre, High Admiral of France, having seen every Thing remarkable in this City, is returned to Rome, where he intends to stay some Time. The young Prince Pignatelli and the Chevalier Gravina, who, on Account of a violent Quarrel, were lately arrested, by Order of the King, and committed, the one to the Castle of St. Elme, and the other to that of St. Oeuf, are both set at Liberty; but, to prevent any future Quarrels, his Majesty has ordered the latter to retire to Palermo, his own Country; and he is accordingly preparing to depart with the first Ship for Sicily. The Eruption of Mount Vesuvius still continues; but as it has greatly abated of its Force, the Fears of the neighbouring Inhabitants are in some Measure dissipated. We have received Advice, that the Barbary Corsairs have taken one of our Tartanes off the Island of Procida; and as an Account it arrived, that several of those Pyrates are cruizing in the Seas of the State of della Presidii, four armed Chebecks, commanded by Don Joseph Martinez, are sailed from this Port in Quest of them.

*Rome, Feb. 4.* The Pope has appointed M. Molino, Auditor de Rota for the Republick of Venice, to be Bishop of Brescia, in the Room of the late Cardinal Querini. The Duke de Penthièvre arrived here last Sunday from Naples, and took up his Residence at the Hotel of Count Stainville, the French Ambassador. On Sunday Night last an Express arrived here from Naples, with an Account of the Death of the Duke d'Atri, Brother to the late Cardinal Acquaviva. We hear from Anzio, that the late tempestuous Weather has almost destroyed all the Works that were carried on last Summer for repairing that Port.

*Copenhagen, Feb. 8.* 'Tis said that a Camp, consisting of several Regiments, will be formed next Summer in the Neighbourhood of this City.

*Madrid, Feb. 10.* The Queen has been slightly indisposed during the Beginning of last Week, but her Catholick Majesty being since perfectly recovered, there was an Opera performed at Court last Night; which Diversion is to be repeated To-day and To-morrow, being the two last Days of this Carnival. The Marchioness of Cuellar, Daughter to his Excellency the Duke of Albuquerque, was married on Sunday the 2d Instant, to his Excellency the Marquis of Sta. Cruz. The Ceremony was performed by Count Migazzi, Coadjutor to the Archbishoprick of Mechlin, and their Imperial Majesties Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court.

*Brussels, Feb. 23.* We hear that Prince Charles of Lorrain, our Governor General, proposes to set out soon after Easter for Vienna. The Marquis de Grimaldi, Ambassador from Spain to the States General of the United Provinces, passed through this City on Thursday Morning last for the Hague.

*Hague, Feb. 25.* The States of this Province are to open their Assembly To-morrow, for which Purpose most of the Members are already arrived. The College of the Committee of Council having, with the Approbation of her Royal Highness the Princess Governante, appointed the Sieur Enckhuysen to have the principal Direction of our Foundry of Cannon, he was Yesterday sworn into that Office before their High Mightinesses. We have received an Ac-

count from Groninguen, of the Death of M. Lynden de Cantes, Deputy from that Province to the Assembly of the States-General.
