Warfaw, Nov. 23.

L.L. the news at prefent here is, that Barr in the afrain is lurrendred to his Majelty, who is thereupon advanced with his Army towards caminisc, of which we mult expect a confirmation, before we can give any entire credit rhereunto. The Mefeovites, according to our last advices, are wholly retreated out of the Ukrain; and norwithstanding the many affurances, we have had, that the Czar would joyn his Forces with those of this Crown, that fotliey might act with greater vigor against the Turks; we plainly find that the Czar has had no intention to engage himfelf in an offenfive War, but only to divert the Ottomans front entring into any of his Territories, fo that being now freed from the apprehension thereof by the retreat of the Enemy, he has called his Forces home, leaving his Majeity to profecute the War by bimfelf, which he however is refolved to do, and to make his advantage of the present conjuncture, which seems to favor him; The Force his Majefly has at prefent with him, according to our beit information, confifts in 18000 Poles, and II or 12000 Lythuaners, all of them good and experienced Soldiers. The defeat of 1000 Turkish Horfe near Gassiniss, by the Weywode of Ruffia, is confirmed, with feveral circumstances, much more advantageous, then we heard at first ; fo that from this good beginning, we cannot but promile our selves a happy fuccets in what is to follow.

Milan, Nev. 21. On Friday laft our Governor the Plince de Vigne returned hither, having been to vifit some of the most considerable places in this Durchy, and to fee all things put into a fitting posture ; all diligence politible is ufed to haften the new Troops defigned for sicily; On Monday laft, one of the new raifed Regiments was multered for the first time at Alexandria, confifting in 600 Mrn, the next day they were to march from thence to Vador, in order to their embarkation; the Regiment railed by Count Fabio Vifconte will we hope, be in few days ready to march. From Nop'es we have advice, that the Marquis de Villa Franca, the new Viceroy of Sicily, was arrived with 22 Spanish Gallies at Melazzo from Spain, having brought with him large fupplies of Men, Moneys, and all other neceffaries. And that the Marquis d'Aftorgas, Viceroy of Naples, did daily fend from thence as well oldas new raifed Troops; and it is faid here, that the Meffineles begin to be fireightened, and to wont Provisions.

Fenice, Nov. 30. We liave Letters of the 15 Offeber from Conflattinople, but they make not any menzion of the march of the Persians, or in any fear the Turks are in for Baby lon, of which fo much noife hat been made, fo that after this, we fhall hardly be able to truft to any advices we receive from those remote parts. From Romethey write, that the differepce bezween the Ambaffidors and the Court, feens rather to encrease then admit of any amicable compo-

any more with the Cardinal Altieri, on this, or any other fubject, till they have fatisfaction in the Matter in controverly. Some Letters fay, that the Queen of Spain has dilapproved the proceeding of Cardinal Nitard, her Ambaffador, ih this affair, and that hes Majelly hath fent him Orders to resonable himfelf with the Court. Vienas, Dec. 1. The Ambaffador of Sweden not has ving received any fatistactory answer to the Proposale he has made here on the part of the King of Sweden, in order to a Peace, feens to prepare for his fuddain leaving of this Court; and his return home; though, as we are told, the Mipifters here are defirous he should stay till the return of the Courier, which was fent to the Court of Madrid, to carry thither the Propolitions of the faid Ambaffador, and to bring back her Majefties refolution in them, and more particularly, about a general cellation of Arms, but the Ambaffidor looking upon this proceeding to be only to amufit him, and gain time, appears refolved to depart forthwith, unleis he have speedily a more fayourable ana. fwer made him on the part of the Emperor, from whence he may with fome reafon promife himfelf fun-s cels in his Negoriarion here, in which cafe his Excellen cy will continue here fome time longer. We are told that the Emperor has written to the King of Denmarie defiring him to have his Forces ready, to be employ according to the Treaty between them and the other Allies, in cafe the Crown of Sweden shall enter into the War. The Rebels in Aungary being weatied with the ill fucceffes they have had of late, and the dit vision that is among themselves, begin to feek their fafery in retirements, and forreign Countreys,

Rasiboune, Dec. 6. Upon the reiterated inflances of the Elector Palatine, the Dyet has finally refolved, that the feveral Circles shall furnish double the number of men, &c. that was agreed formerly ; that the Prince of Baden Donelach, General of the Empire; fhall forthwith, with those Troops he can bring together, begin to block up Philipiburg, and that the other Troops of the Circles which are not yet ready, shall joyn him there, with all the freed that may bes The Prince of Sultzbach is made First Minister, and Great Chamberlain of the Elector of Bavaria's Court, in the room of Prince Herman of Furftenberg, deceafed; We hear that the faid Elector has of late given out many Commissions, for the making of new Levies, which occasions great jealousie, he having already above 10000 Men on toot.

Straiburg. Dec. 8.
