A PROCLAMATION,

For continuing the Encouragements to Seamen who shall enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; For encreasing the Bounty to all fuch Seamen who entred before the 6th of February last; For continuing the Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves: And also for giving Encouragement to such Able-bodied Landmen who have or shall enter into His Majesty's Service at Sea.

X7Hereas by our Royal Proclamation, dated the Twenty Third Day of January last, intituled, A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, We were graciously pleased to promile, that every Able Seaman and every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should voluntarily enter themselves to ferve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the Twentieth Day of February last, in such Manner as in Our faid Proclamation is required, should respectively receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our faid Proclamation, (that is to fay) every Able Seaman the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every Ordinary Seaman the Sum of Twenty Shillings -And whereas by Our fublequent Proclamation, dated the Sixth of February last, intituled, A Proclamation for recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving further Encouragement to Seamen to Enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; - and for granting Rewards for difcovering fuch Seamen as shall conceal themselves,-We did further promise and declare, That all Able Seamen who should, on or before the Tenth Day of this Inftant March, voluntarily Enter themselves in Our Service, in the Manner directed by Our afore recited Proclamation, should receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds, and all Ordinary Seamen fo Entering themfelves as aforefaid, the Sum of Two Pounds; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid for the Discovery of such Seamen who might conceal themselves-And whereas we are willing not only to continue the Encouragements and Rewards given by Our faid last mentioned Proclamation for some longer Time, but to allow, that the faid Encouragements to Volunteers should commence from the Twenty-third of January last, being the Date of Our first mentioned Proclamation; and likewife to give a Bounty to fuch Able bodied Landmen who have or shall Enter into Our Service at Sea-We do therefore, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby promise and declare, That the faid Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to all fuch Able and Ordinary Seamen, who shall Enter into Our Service, on or before the Thirty-first of ,this Inftant March-And We do hereby promife

Seamen, who have Entred themselves into Our Service on or before the Sixth Day of February last, in Consequence of Our first Proclamation of the Twenty-third Day of January, shall receive the like Bounty with those who have Entered themselves subsequent to that Time, and that the Reward of two Pounds for every Able . and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman be also continued to be paid to any Person, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first of this Instant March, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who may conceal themfelves, fo that fuch Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service by any of Our Sea-Officers employed for raising Men-And We do hereby further promise and declare; that all fuch Able-bodied Landmen, who have voluntarily Entered themfelves into Our Service fince the Twenty-third Day of January last, or shall Enter themselves into Our Service; on or before the Thirty-first of this Instant March; shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; all which respective Sums are hereby required to be paid by the Perfons and at the Times directed by Our aforefaid Proclamations. Given at our Court at St. James's the Eleventh Day of March 1755, and in the Twentyeighth Year of Our Reign. GOD fave the KING. Westminster, March 20. -HIS Majefty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houle of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Affent to An Act concerning the Offices of Sheriff Depute; and Stewart Depute, in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland. An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollment of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers. An Act for taking away Mortuaries in the Archdeaconry of Chester, and giving a Recompence therefore to the Bishop of Chester, as Archdeacon of Chester, who holds and enjoys the said Archdeaconry in Right of his See. An Act for making navigable the River or Brook called Sankey Brook, and the three Several Branches thereof, from the River Mersey, below, Sankey Bridges, up to Boardman's Stone Bridge on the South Branch, to Gerrard's Bridge, on the Middle Branch thereof, and to Penny Bridge, on the North Branch thereof, all in the County Palatine of Lancaster; and also for adjusting the Measure of Coal, to be brought down the Said River or Brook, and sold within the Town of Liverpool, in the said County. An Act for establishing and maintaining a Ferry across the River Thames, between the Hamlet of Ratcliffe, in the County of Middlefex, and the Parish of Rotherhithe, in the County of Surry. An Act to prevent the holding of any Market, and declare, that all fuch Able and Ordinary for the Future, in the High Street, of the Borough

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An Act for establishing, maintaining, and well governing, a Nightly Watch, within the City of Bristol.

An Act for the better enlightening and eleanfing the open Plates, Squares, Streets, Lanes, Alleys, Passages, and Courts, within the Parish of Saint Bartholomew the Great, London, and regulating the Nightly Watch and Beadles within the faid Parifs.

An Act for explaining, amending, and making nore effectual several Acts of Parliament, relahig to the Maintenance and Employment of the Poor of the Town of Kingston upon Hall, and for better Paving, Preserving, and Gleansing the Streets, Squares, Lanes, and Alleys, in the faid Town, and preventing Obstructions therein, and i for preserving the Lamps, which shall be set up; to enlighten the Streets of the faid Town, and feturing the Property of Juch Lamps to the Owners.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of ; the Poor of the Borough of Dunheved, otherwise Latinceston, and Parish of Saint Mary Magdaten, in the County of Cornwall.

An AEt for erecting and building a new Chapel in the Town of Wolverhampton, in the Gounty of Stafford.

and regulating the Pavements, in the Town of County of Oxford, to Dorchester Bridge, and from Leeds, in the County of York. An Act for continuing and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of his prefent Majesty, intituled, An Act for continuing the Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one Sixth of a Penny Sterling, on every Pint of Ale and Beer that shall be wended or sold within the Oity of Glasgow, and for extending the same over the Villages of Gorbells, and Port Gla/gow, and Privileges thereof, for the Benefit of the faid City and Villages.
