## A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

*For continuing the Encouragements to Seamen who shall enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War; For encreasing the Bounty to all such Seamen who entred before the 6th of February last; For continuing the Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves: And also for giving Encouragement to such Able-bodied Landmen who have or shall enter into His Majesty's Service at Sea.*

Whereas by our Royal Proclamation, dated the Twenty Third Day of January last, intituled, *A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War*, We were graciously pleased to promise, that every Able Seaman and every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the Twentieth Day of February last, in such Manner as in Our said Proclamation is required, should respectively receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our said Proclamation, (that is to say) every Able Seaman the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every Ordinary Seaman the Sum of Twenty Shillings—And whereas by Our subsequent Proclamation, dated the Sixth of February last, intituled, *A Proclamation for recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving further Encouragement to Seamen to Enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War;—and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves*,—We did further promise and declare, That all Able Seamen who should, on or before the Tenth Day of this Instant March, voluntarily Enter themselves in Our Service, in the Manner directed by Our afore recited Proclamation, should receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds, and all Ordinary Seamen so Entering themselves as aforesaid, the Sum of Two Pounds; and that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid for the Discovery of such Seamen who might conceal themselves—And whereas we are willing not only to continue the Encouragements and Rewards given by Our said last mentioned Proclamation for some longer Time, but to allow, that the said Encouragements to Volunteers should commence from the Twenty-third of January last, being the Date of Our first mentioned Proclamation; and likewise to give a Bounty to such Able-bodied Landmen who have or shall Enter into Our Service at Sea—We do therefore, by and with the Advice of Our Privy

Council, hereby promise and declare, That the said Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to all such Able and Ordinary Seamen, who shall Enter into Our Service, on or before the Thirty-first of this Instant March—And We do hereby promise and declare, that all such Able and Ordinary Seamen, who have Entred themselves into Our Service on or before the Sixth Day of February last, in Consequence of Our first Proclamation of the Twenty-third Day of January, shall receive the like Bounty with those who have Entered themselves subsequent to that Time, and that the Reward of two Pounds for every Able and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman be also continued to be paid to any Person, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first of this Instant March, discover any Seaman or Seamen, who may conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service by any of Our Sea-Officers employed for raising Men—And We do hereby further promise and declare, that all such Able-bodied Landmen, who have voluntarily Entered themselves into Our Service since the Twenty-third Day of January last, or shall Enter themselves into Our Service, on or before the Thirty-first of this Instant March, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; all which respective Sums are hereby required to be paid by the Persons and at the Times directed by Our aforesaid Proclamations.

Given at our Court at St. James's the Eleventh Day of March 1755, and in the Twenty-eighth Year of Our Reign.

*Algier, December 29.* This Government is preparing to send a Ship with Presents for the Grand Signior, as usual on a new Dey's Accession, and to desire of the Sultan the Investiture of the Caffan for him; as, till that is sent, the Dey is never looked upon to be absolutely confirmed in his Office, and it is never refused by the Porte. The new Dey has published an Edict, forbidding the Moors to wear Gold and Silver upon their Cloaths. The Spanish Missionaries for the Redemption of Slaves left this City, on their Return to Cartagena, on the 24th past, having settled the Cartel for the Exchange of Prisoners. About a Month ago, a Saletine Cruizer of 18 Guns, and 150 Men, enter'd this Port with a French Prize, and has been allow'd to sell both Ship and Cargo.

*Marseilles, March 10.* The Master of a Vessel, belonging to this Place, coming from the Levant, met, on the 26th past, an English Ship, having on Board the Imperial Consul at Algier, on his Return to Leghorn.

Paris.

Paris, March 19. Baron Gravenbrock, who was Minister from the Electors Palatin and Bavaria, had Yesterday an Audience of Leave, as Minister from the last mentioned Prince. M. van Eyck, Envoy Extraordinary from the Bishop of Liege, being appointed in his Room, has received Letters of Credence from the Elector of Bavaria, as Envoy Extraordinary to this Court, which he has notified to all the Foreign Ministers, but has not yet delivered them. M. de Gravenbrock remains as Minister Plenipotentiary from the Elector Palatin. Count Broglia, the French Ambassador to the Court of Saxony, arrived at Versailles last Saturday in the Evening.

Hague, March 21. The States of Holland continue their Deliberations upon the Reports of the Admiralties concerning the Affairs of the Free Port. The Government here is expecting further News from Algiers; as the Report of a Rupture with the Republick differs so widely from the Accounts of the Dutch Consul there of the 18th of February last, in which he mentions his having renewed the Treaties with the new Dey.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, some Time in February last, the House of Mr. Harrington, of Great Tay in Essex, was broke open, and a Quantity of Money taken out, by five Persons, who answer the following Description: One young Man, five Feet three Inches high, full faced, pale Complexion, round visaged, brown Eyes, had on a dark drab Horseman's Coat, a light grey cut Wig, booted, rode a good black Horse or Mare, upwards of fifteen Hands high; the second a stout middle-aged Man, about five Feet six Inches high, full faced, fresh coloured, round visaged, had on a Scotch Plaid Waistcoat, a dark coloured Horseman's Coat, booted, rode a black Hobby, near fourteen Hands high, with a Hog Mane and short cut Tail; the third a round shouldered middle-aged Man, about five Feet four Inches high, small Visage, full eyed, ruddy Complexion, his Size small, had on a Plaid Waistcoat, a dark grey Wig, a Piece of red Cloth under his Chin, wore a very dark Horseman's Coat, and was booted, rode a very scrubby sorrel lean Horse, about fifteen Hands high; the fourth, a young Man, about twenty four Years of Age, pockfretten, long visaged, long Nose, thin faced, pale Complexion, about five Feet six Inches high, thin in Person, had on a Stock, an old surtout Coat, double breasted Coat with metal Buttons, very bad Boots, rode a good black Horse, with many silver Hairs on his Mane, Tail and Rump, and some spread all over him, about fifteen Hands and a Half high; the fifth, a young Man, under Age, near six Feet high, thin bodied, round faced, light brown Hair, curls very well, fresh Complexion, had on a bad Fustian Frock, a good dark coloured Horseman's Coat, booted, and rode a shabby Horse, about fourteen Hands high, of a bay Colour, short clipped Tail, hanging darkish Mane: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is pleased so promise His most gracious Pardon to any Person therein concerned, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so that he, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas about Eight o'Clock at Night of the 20th Instant, divers Persons, to the Number of Twenty Seven and upwards, armed and disguised, some having their Faces blacked, some with Caps, and others with Handkerchiefs over their Heads, did unlawfully, riotously, and tumultuously assemble in the Town of Deal in the County of Kent, and then attacked a certain House in the said Town, where a Press Gang, employed to press Seamen for His Majesty's Service, then kept their Rendezvous, and not only broke the Windows of the said House, but also wilfully, maliciously, and cruelly beat and wounded several of the said Press Gang in a very dangerous Manner, and did also afterwards, the same Night, attack another House in the said Town of Deal, being the Dwelling House of Lieut. James Cunningham, the Commanding Officer of the said Press Gang, and broke the Windows, Window Shutters, and Iron Bars of that House, and were proceeding to commit further Outrages there, had they not been prevented by the Assistance of the Civil Magistrates: And my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, judging it highly necessary that the Persons guilty of the above-mentioned Offences should be immediately detected and brought to Justice; I do therefore, in Obedience to their Lordships Commands, hereby offer a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds for the discovering, apprehending and prosecuting of all, or any three or more of the Persons who were principally guilty of the several Offences aforesaid; which Reward shall, upon the Conviction of such Three, or more of the said principal Offenders, be paid and distributed by Samuel Seddon, Esq; Solicitor of the Admiralty, unto and amongst the several Persons who shall be concerned in discovering, apprehending and prosecuting the said Offenders, in such Proportions as he the said Solicitor shall judge to be reasonable.
