PRESENT,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable William Lord Cavendish of Hardwyck, (commonly called Marquess of Hartington) Lieutenant General and General Governor of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

Whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) that the Bounties of three Pounds for every Able Scaman, of Forty Shillings for every-Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Ablebodied Landman, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that fuch Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the faid Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant March, to the Thirtieth Day of April . next, inclusive - Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.
