P R E S E N T,

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eleventh Day of this Instant March, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) that the Bounties of three Pounds for every Able Seaman, of Forty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Twenty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, should be paid to every such Seaman and Landman respectively, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this Instant, voluntarily Enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and that a Reward of Two Pounds should be also paid to any Person who should, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant, discover any Seaman, or Seamen, who should conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service—And whereas the Time thereby limited for paying the said Bounties and Rewards is now near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some longer Time: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant March, to the Thirtieth Day of April next, inclusive—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Algier, Dec. 29. The Dey has confirmed and put his Seal to the Peace, and to the additional Article made by Commodore Keppel, concerning the English Packet Boats.

Constantinople, Feb. 15. The Grand Vizir is deposed, and the Janizar Aga is made Caimacan, until another Vizir is named, who, it is expected, will be Aly Pascha Echim Oglu, for the third Time.

Constantinople, March 1. Aly Pascha is coming hither from Trebizonde, but the Roads are so bad, that it is thought it will be 10 or 15 Days before he can arrive. The Dey of Algier has sent hither several Christian Slaves, Blacks, and Wild Beasts, as a Present to the Grand Signor, who in Return has given him some Cannon and Ammunition, and assured him of his Protection.

Stockholm



Stockholm, March 14. The King has conferred on Baron Charles de Cederstrom, Counsellor of the Court of Justice of Abo, the Office of President of that Tribunal. The Departure of their Majesties, and the Royal Family, for Ulrichsdahl, is fixed for the 25th Instant.

Naples, March 4. Mount Vesuvius has begun to throw out greater Quantities of bituminous Matter than it did at the preceding Eruptions. We have received an Account, that on the 16th of last Month, two Maltese Men of War, having fallen in with three Tunisian Corsairs off Messina, a smart Engagement ensued, in which the Maltese sunk one of the Corsairs, and took the other two. There were 250 Turks on Board, whom they carried into Slavery. The frequent Tempests we had towards the End of last Month in these Seas, occasioned the Loss of several Merchantmen, amongst which a French Ship, from the Levant, was cast away not far from Gaeta.

Warsaw, March 15. Count Potocki, Great Cup-Bearer to the Crown, is appointed to compliment the new Grand Signior, in the Name of the King and Republick of Poland, upon his Accession to the Ottoman Throne, and he will accordingly set out for Constantinople immediately after the Ambassador from the Porte, who is at present at Count Branicky's at Byallystock, has had his Audience of his Majesty.

Copenhagen, March 22. Last Saturday the King honoured Field Marshal Count Schulenburg with his Company at Dinner. On Tuesday there was a Drawing-Room at Court, when Count Gisors took his Leave of the King and Royal Family, and on Monday next he is to set out on his Return to France. The Queen, who is perfectly recovered of her late Miscarriage, went to take the Air last Wednesday. The Count de Wedel Friis is preparing to set out on his Embassy to the Court of France.

Vienna, March 22. The Prince of Schwarzenberg, who has been for some Time indisposed at his Seat in Bohemia, is returned here, and has resumed the Functions of his Office of Grand Marshal of the Court. Their Imperial Majesties have appointed Count Koenbourg, Great Marshal of the Court of the Prince Archbishop of Saltsbourg, to be one of their actual Privy Counsellors. Count Konigsegg Erps, having been named President of the Tribunal of the Court, he was Yesterday installed into that Office by Count Khevenhuller, Great Chamberlain, who officiated for Count Uhlesfeld, Grand Master, the latter being slightly indisposed.

Munich, March 23. The Cardinal Prince Bishop of Liege, Uncle to the Elector our Sovereign, who arrived lately at Freysingen, being soon expected here to spend some Time, they are fitting up the Apartments appointed for his Reception. Yesterday died here; in the 69th Year of his Age, the Baron de Lerchenfeld, President of the States of Lower Bavaria, and Great Marshal of the Court.

Berlin, March 25. Preparations are making at Court for celebrating, on Thursday next, the Queen Mother's Birth-day. Prince Henry, who has been for some Days at Reinsburg, returned here last Friday; and Prince Maurice of Anhalt Dessau is set out on his Return to his Government at Strargard.

Paris, March 28. Yesterday, being Maunday Thursday, the King performed, according to Custom, the Ceremony of washing the Feet of twelve poor Men, and afterwards of serving them at Table. The Count de Chancelot, who officiated on this Occasion as Great Master of the Household, attended the Service, and the Dishes were carried by Monsieur le Dauphin, the Duke de Chartres, the Prince de Conde, the Count de Clermont, the Prince de Conty, and the Count de la Marche. At the same Time the Queen performed the Ceremony of washing the Feet of twelve poor Women, whose Ages put together made eleven hundred and forty four. Count Broglio, Ambassador from this Court to the King and Republick of Poland, arrived here a few Days ago from Dresden.

Paris, April 2. The Dauphin has been indisposed for some Time past, but not so much as to hinder his going Abroad or seeing Company. The Dauphiness, it is said, is again with Child. Count de Frize, the late Marshal Saxe's Nephew, died here last Sunday Morning of the Meazles.

Hague, April 2. The States of Holland and Westfrizeland have caused an Ordonnance to be published, by which their High Mightinesses suspend, from the 1st of April to the End of May, the Prohibition against bringing horned Cattle into this Province; on Condition nevertheless, that all Cattle from Denmark, Jutland, or any of the adjacent Countries, shall be brought only by Sea, and that the necessary Certificates be produced of their being in Health, and of their coming from uninfected Places.
